

has likewise signed at *Paris* the third instant by *Mon-*
neur de Lomoz, and the Danish Envoy. The Elector
of *Brandenburg* has written a second Letter to the
States in answer to their reply to his first, of which
we do not as yet know the contents. There came
a report two days since from *Amsterdam*, that the
Spanish Galeons were arrived at *Cadix*, which since
proves a mistake. The Count *de Solmes*, Colonel
of the Princes Regiment of Guards, is returned hi-
ther from *Germany*, and came very opportunely to
Reprive a poor Soldier, who was condemned yester-
day by the Council of War to be shot to death,
for having been out of his Lodging after Ten a
Clock at night, contrary to his Highnesses orders.

Fontainebleau, Sept. 7. After the solemnization
of the Marriage on the 31 past, the Queen of *Spain*
saw a very fine Firework, and then supped with
the King and Queen, being seated between
them on the Kings right Hand. The next morning
the Queen of *Spain* went to visit the Queen,
and in the afternoon she received the Visits of
Madamoiselle d Orleans, the Great Dutchess of *Tusca-*
ny, and *Madam de Guise* (who had Elbow Chairs
set for them) and returned them. That evening
there was a great Ball at Court, and the King danced
with the Queen of *Spain* the first Courant. The 2d
instant she received the Compliments of all the
Foreign Ministers, and was visited by the King,
the Queen, and the Dauphin; and in the evening
went with the King and Madam in his Calèche to
Hunt a Hare. The 3d the Prince *de Conti*, the
Prince *de la Roche-sur-Yon*, the Cardinal *de Bouil-*
lon, and the Cardinal *de Bonzi*, were to visit her,
and had Stools with Backs set for them. And the
4th, being accompanied by the Duke and Dutchess
of *Orleans*, and attended by 100 of the Kings Guards
du Corps, her Majesty went to *Paris*, where she will
pass some days.

Paris, Sept. 9. The 4th instant the Queen of
Spain came hither from *Fontainebleau*, and lighted
at the Palace Royal, where several Companies of
the Regiment of Guards were drawn up. The next
day her Majesty received the Visits of the Prince
of *Conde*, and the Duke *d Anguien*, who had Stools
with Backs given them. The 5th she was compli-
mented by the Provost des Marchands, and receiv-
ed the Presents made her by this City; after which
she went to the Opera, and in the evening gave
Audience to the Duke *de Pastreana*, who presented to
her the King of *Spain*'s Picture, set round with Dia-
monds of very great value. The 6th her Majesty
received the Compliments of our Archbishop at
the head of his Chapter. The 7th, she gave Au-
dience to the Parliament, the Chamber of Accompts,
&c. and at night was entertained very magnificently
by the Marquis *de los Balbases*.

Paris, Sept. 9. The Queen of *Spain* having pass-
four or five days here, went yesterday with her
Father the Duke of *Orleans* to *St. Clou*, from whence
her Majesty will return hither on Monday next;
and then go back to *Fontainebleau*, in order to her
beginning her journey for *Spain*. In our last we gave
you an account that the Peace between this Crown,
Sweden, and *Denmark*, was signed on Sunday last;
we are told, that by it the King of *Denmark*, obliges
himself to restore all he has taken during this War,
as well in *Schonen*, as elsewhere; That the Duke of
Holstein Gotorp is to be re-established in his Coun-
tries, and acknowledged Sovereign of the Coun-

try of *Slewick*, according to the Treaty concluded
at *Copenhagen*, 1661. And that the King of *Sweden*,
even before the Exchange of the Ratifications of this
Treaty, may transport his Troops to *Germany*, to
Garrison the places in *Pomerania* and *Bremen*, that are
to be restored to him by the Elector of *Branden-*
burg, and the Princes of *Lunenburg*. Some days
since was verified in the Parliament a very severe
Edict of the Kings, not only against those that Fight
Duels, or send Challenges, but likewise against such as
give any provocation by Blows, or by giving the Lye,
or other Language unfit for a Gentleman to
speak.

Bridlington, Aug. 28. On Monday last came into
this Harbor a Dutch Ship, being a Hospital to their
Herring Busses, which are now Fishing to the Num-
ber of 400. Yesterday the said Vessel sailed again.

Plimouth, Aug. 29. The 26th instant arrived here
the *Richard* of *London*, *Thomas Fowles* Master, from
New England; and the *William and John* of *Tarmouth*,
from the *Canaries*; and the next day came in His
Majesties Ships the *St. David* and the *Greenwich*, with
a great many Merchant Ships under their Convoy,
bound for the *Streights*;

Stockton, Aug. 29. On Tuesday last *Mr. Bowes*
and Captain *Kenderson*, were chose Knights of the
Shire for the County of *Durham*.

Portsmouth, Aug. 31. Yesterday came into this
Harbor the *Bristol*, and the *Kings Fisher* from *Spit-*
head, to be laid up, and will be paid off to-mor-
row. Our Governor Colonel *Legg*, and Colonel
Norton, are Elected Burgessees for this Town.

Chester, Sept. 1. This day *William Williams* Esq;
and *Sir Thomas Grosvenor* Baronet, were Elected
Members to serve for this City in the ensuing Par-
liament.

Bambury in *Suffex*, Sept. 1. The 24th past, *Hen-*
ry Sydney Esq; and *Henry Goring* Esq; were chosen
Burgesses for this Borough.

Windsor, Sept. 2. The King continues, thanks be
to God, so well, that He has been this morning to
see the Queen, and walks up and down the House;
so that in all appearance His Majesty is out of dan-
ger of the return of His Distemper.

This morning his Royal Highness the Duke of
York arrived here, contrary to expectation, and
told His Majesty, that hearing of His indisposition,
he thought he could do no less, than come to wait
upon Him, and see how He did; adding, that he
was ready, as soon as His Majesty pleased, to re-
turn to *Flanders*, or any other part of the World
His Majesty should command him to go to.
