

*Wesel* Sept. 3. There remains a French Garrison here and at *Lipstadt*, and they will doe so, till the places, our Elector is to restore to the Suedes, are evacuated, which will be done so soon as that Crown is able to send over any Troops to take possession of them. It had been happy for these Countries, the peace with our Elector had been made some months sooner, for they have suffered extremely by the march of the French Troops, which they will not quickly recover.

*Hague*, Sept. 8. The States of *Holland* will not be assembled this time above 8 or 10 days, having nothing of Importance before them, their deliberations concerning only some matters relating to the Revenue, which is the reason that the Prince of *Orange* will not be here till the latter end of the next week. Monsieur de *Louigny*, to whom the King of *Spain* has given the Government of *Messina*, arrived here some days since, with intention to take his passage, in the first Ship that went from these Provinces for the *Mediterranean*, but he is at present very ill. Two days since a person of quality, passing at midday through the streets, a man on horse back rides up to him, and said *I have long sought you, and am extream glad to meet you here*, and thereupon took out his pistol and discharged it at him; but by good fortune missed him, upon which the other set spurs to his Horse and escaped: this accident has occasioned much discourse here. From *Utrecht* we have an account that there has been some disorder at *Amersford*, occasioned by the placing of a Minister in one of the Churches of that Town. The preparations which the Elector of *Brandenburg* continues to make, creates great jealousies in his Neighbours, who cannot discover what the design of them is; there are those that think this State ought to be concerned at them, and say that the late Letters which his Electoral Highness writ to the States, do sufficiently demonstrate how much he is displeas'd with their proceedings in relation to the Peace, and that he pretends he ought to have satisfaction from them on account of the great prejudice and damage he hath sustained thereby; but these are only the fancies of some particular people, while the State has not any apprehensions of his Electoral Highness having any design against them. From *Nimeguen* of the 6th instant they write that the Imperial Ambassadors, and the *Sieur Olivecrans* one of the *Suedes* Ambassadors, were gone from thence, and that the *Sieur Oxensfern* would follow in few days.

*Bruges*, Sept. 10. The French have possessed themselves of a small place called *Wateruliet*, near the *Sas-van-Ghent*, pretending it belongs to the Jurisdiction of *Ipres*, when it belongs to the Jurisdiction of this City.

*Paris*, Sept. 9. We are assured that 20 Battalions and several Squadrons of Horse, of the *Marschal de Crequi's* Army are marching towards *Alsace*, where, together with the rest of the King's Troops, they will be commanded by the *Marschal d'Euemiers*; and the publick discourse now is, that they are not to besiege *Bitsch* and *Homburg*, as was at first pretended, but to restore the Bishop of *Strasbourg* to those Lands and Jurisdictions which it's said the City of *Strasbourg* derives from him, which it's believed will not be done without bloodshed. It is likewise said that the King will require

homage of such lands in *Alsace*, as heretofore were held in Vassalage of the Emperor, and that all Suites which concern the Inhabitants of that Country, shall not for the future be carried to the Imperial Chamber at *Spire*, but heard and determined without appeal at *Brisack*, which is a matter that may occasion new troubles in *Germany*. The Duke of *Orleans* has sent the *Marquis de Litt*, Master of his Horse to *Spain* to give that King an account that his Queen will begin her journey in few days.

*Falmouth*, Sept. 1. We have an account of three Towns in this County that have made the Election of their Burgesses, viz. at *Grandpound*, *John Tanner* and *Nicholas Hearie* Esquires are chosen, at *St. Michael's*, *Sir John St. Aubin*, and *Humphrey Burlace* Esq; and at *Tregony*, *Hugh Boscowen* and *Charles Trevanion* Esquires.

*Plimouth*, Sept. 2. The 30th past arrived here the *Thomas* and *William* of *London* *William North* Master from *o Porto*; and the next day the *Jacob* of *London*, *William Seng* Master, bound hither from *Norway*. Yesterday sailed hence a Fleet of between 70 and 80 Merchant Ships bound for the *Streights*, under the Convoy of the *St. David*, and another of His Majesties Frigats; and the last night they were forced, by contrary winds, to come in again. Yesterday arrived here the *Dartmouth* Frigate from *Cruising*.
