

Conquillo is returned hither fr. m *Charleroy*, where he has been to give orders for the repairing the Fortification of that place, and the providing quarters for 1500 Foot, who are to come thither from *Luxemburg*, where their room will be supplied by certain German Troops, which are taken into the service of this Crown.

Amsterdam, Sept. 14. We have Letters of the 21 of *July* from *Martenico* in the *West Indies*, which give us an account, that the Count *d'Estree* arrived there about the beginning of the month with ten Sail; that he was gone again from thence, and that he would be back in three months, but that it was not known whether he took his course. The Elector of *Brandenburg* has written a second Letter to the States dated at *Posidam* the 4th instant, in which he tells them, that he expects from them a compensation in money for the damages his Countries have sustained in the War, which this State thinks there lies not any obligation upon them to give. What the consequence of this his Electoral Highnesses pretensions may be, time must shew.

Hague, Sept. 19. This day the Prince of *Orange* parted hence for *Breda*, to meet the Princess of *Orange*, who is returning from *Aix la Chapelle*. A great many people die at *Amsterdam*; the last week the number of the buried were 322, which is much more than usual, though there appears not any contagious Distemper. Many people apprehend there will arise differences between this State and the Elector of *Brandenburg*; He now demands the Arrears of Subsidies due to him, and has desired the assistance of *France* herein; and besides, has summoned the Provinces, who were conquered by the French in the late War, to pay their quotas of the said Subsidies (the other four Provinces having declared they have paid theirs) and in default thereof, threaten them with Military execution.

Paris, Sept. 20. This day the Queen of *Spain* took her leave of the King and Queen, and begun her journey for *Spain*, and lodges this night at *Nemours*. The Dutchess of *Hanover* intends to pass the Winter here, and will be lodged in the Palace of *Luxemburg*. There is much discourse at Court concerning the Duke of *Mantua's* putting *Casal* into our Kings hands.

Falmouth, Sept. 8. This day passed by this Harbor a Fleet of about 80 Merchant Ships, with their Convoy, bound for the *Streights*. We have an account of these following Elections.

Plimouth, Sept. 9. The 7th instant arrived here the *Stephen* and *Edward* of *London*, *Sebastian Kinzey* Master, bound home from *Virginia*. Yesterday came in the *Hawke* of *London*, *Benjamin Thompson* Master, from *Guinea*; and this day the *Nathaniel* of *London*, *William Stannard* Commander, from the *East Indies*;

and we are to'd that another Ship from the *East Indies* is past by to the *Eastward*. On Sunday last sailed from hence *Sir Richard Munden* in the *St. David*, and another of the Kings Frigats, with about 80 Sail of Merchantmen under their Convoy.

Portsmouth, Sept. 11. Yesterday was Lanch'd here a Third Rate Frigate; she is a very fine Ship, but not yet named. There are now two Second Rates upon the Stocks. The *Swifsure* is still at *Spithead*, and the *Lark* in the Harbour.

Rye, Sept. 9. It is much wonder'd at here, that it hath been printed in the *Domestick Intelligence*, that *Sir John Dorrel*, and *Mr. Frewin*, were Elected Burgeses for this place, when as the Election is not yet made, and that it is uncertain who will be chosen, which it's desired may be publickly taken notice of, to disabuse the World, which has of late been very much imposed upon in this kind.

Windsor, Sept. 12. The King has thought fit to take from the Duke of *Monmouth* his Commission of General, His Majesty at present not thinking that Command necessary.

London, Sept. 13. *Mr. Raymond* having been some time since chosen one of our Sheriffs; and the Citizens proceeding this day to the choice of another, several were in nomination, but *Mr. Lewis* and *Mr. Fenkes* had the most hands, and upon the Pole betwixt them, *Mr. Lewis* was chosen, having 347, and *Mr. Fenkes* but 221 Voices.

London, Sept. 13. It having been printed in the several Domestick Intelligences, that *Mr. Fox*, (whom they reproach with the name of a Steward) had had Papers found with him of most dangerous consequence concerning the Plot, and that he was committed to the Gatehouse; He desires that for his Vindication from so great a Scandal, the World may know that not one of those three particulars, is true, he having indeed been put to the vexation of having some Papers examined, which when they were brought before His Majesties Justices of the Peace were found very inoffensive, and to be only Errors from the Duke of *Norfolk*, relating to private Business, as by a Certificate under their hands does appear.
