He Alcaide of Alcafar, according to the pest account we yet have, having drawn his Army into their Parts for no other murpose then to oppose the landing of a French Army; and for that reason having made a Truce with us for two months, has according to their barbarous Principles, broke it; for on the 25th palf about midnight, he alarmed us with the appearsh of his whole Army, within Mus-het-shoe of our Lines, and some of their parties advanced to the Lines, where while some diverted our Forms with their shot, others made two Breaches in our Lines between Ame and Fames Forts, and Fames and Monmonth I orts, through which about 30 Horse might march abreath; which treatherous design of the Alcaide, was not so cunningly carried on, but his Excellency had some notice of it, and had time to reinforce the Forts with Men and Nee staries. We suppose that after they had made the Breaches, they advanged with their whole Army very usen to Annes Lane-end: for we plainly heard their shouts, and the noise of their Drums; but they finding us well prepared, and the sols they fustained in the last accempt upon our Forts, being fresh in their memory, we suppose the Leaders could not make their men advance farther; for they came on and drew off Liveral times, and attempted nuthing. On the 26th they let us rest. On the 27th a Levant Wind came up, which gave us the opportunity to fet the Country on fire, which raised feveral Ambushes within Musket-Ihot of our Forts. Theat night they alarmed us again, and made another Breach in our Line between Monmouth, and where Tork Fort, flood; where we conclude they lost flore of men, for we found our Cannon Balis the next day in the very Breach whene they had been at work. The 21th we heard one great Volly of shor in their Camp. Wednesday we heard nothing of them, but perceived they had, removed their Ching; and yesterday a Moor came in with a Flag of Truce, about private business of his own, who assistes us the Camp is withstrown, and that the Alcaide is gone to Alcajar. Vice-admiral Herbert hes with the Ships under his Command in our Bay, and had allotted use good Refer we of svell disciplined men.

Genoua, Sept. 6. The King of Denmark, at the desire of the Most Christian King, promises to restore to the Duke of Holflein Gottorp all his Countries, Towns, and Places in the state they now are; and the Soveraignty thereof, which he claims by vertue of the Treaties of Roschild, Copenhagen, and Westphalia, which Treaties are now confirmed. This restitution to be made to the faid Duke within a Fort-night after the Exchange of the Ratifications.
