Madrid, Sept. 7.

N the 31 paft, about 4 in the Afternoon, the Peace between Spain and France was folemnly fworn by his Catholick Majefly. The Ccremony was performed in the Salon Doxado (as they call it) a spacious and beautiful Hall of the Palace, at the upper end whereof was erected a Stage 2 or 3 fleps high, very well hung, and co-vered with rich Carpets; in the middle of it was placed a Canopy and Chair of State for the King; at the foot of the Stage, on the right hand, a Chair was put for the Cardinal Portocarero Archbishop of Toledo (who was fworn of the Council of State 2 days before) and overagainst the same, on the left hand, a bench covered with Velvet for the French Ambaffador; below the Cardinal, another long bench was placed for the Grandees, joyning to his feat; and behind his Chair flood Don Antonio Benallides Patriark of the Indies and feveral other Perfors of Quality. The Cardinal and Am-ballador being in their places, and the 4 Kings at Arms, in their Coats, ftanding clofe to the Wall on the Kings left hand, with the 4 Mace-bearers in their proper flations, the King, accompanied with feveral Grandecs and Gentlemen of his Bed-chamber, came in, to whom all the Company made a reverence, and his Majefly putting off his hat to the Cardinal, went up and fat in his Chair, from whence making a fign to the Cardinal and Am-Eaffador that they should fit, those that followed his Majesty retired; then Don Pedro Coloma Secretary of State read aloud his Molt Christian Maj .flies Commission. Authorizing, the Marquis of Villars his Ambailador to be prefent at, and Wit-nels of this Solemnity. After which, the Cardi-nal read the formular of the Oath, which his Majefty on his knees fwore with his hand on the Holy Golpel, the Patriark of the Indies as cheif Almoner, having laid before him a Mils-Book and Crucifex for that purpofe; this done, the Kirg flood up, and the Ambailador, advancing up the fleps, made a Compliment to his Majefty in the Spanish Language, expressing the refolution with which his Mafter had intended to take the fame Oath on the fame day, religiously to observe the Pcace between the two Crowns, and to Cultivate the fame by all the Acts of a firm Friendship that might be correspondent to the new bond of Confanguigity and Alliance contracted by the Marriage; and having spoken to this effect returned to his place. The Ceremony thus ending, the King retired accompanied as at his entrance; and foot after the May-ordomo Mayor, with feveral Grandees and oth? Perfons of Quality came back into the Hall, complimented the Ambaffador on the occasion, and consucced him out of the Kings Quarter. hrom 644 diz of the 27th they write, That the Centurion was

Hamburg Sept. 19. Theie Magistrates have not yet (notwithlianding what has been faid) been able to accomodate matters with the Elector of Brandenburg, they offering him only thirty three Thousand Crowns, which comes far short of his demands; but to bring them to a compliance, the Elector has promited to reftore all the Vefkista-ken, by his Privateers, fince the 15th of August laft. And on the other file our Magistrates have refol-ved to pray, the Molt Christian King to be Arkitrator in these differences. We are told that the Succes are not pleafed with the manner of conclu-iding the Peace between them and the Danes, which was dene at Paris, and the Trea y racified by France, before any Minifler of Denmark had figned the Articles. The Duke of *Holfein* thinks he ought, befides being refored o his Countries, to have expected fome recompence for the damages he has fustained, and at least to have had back the Carinton (beirg too brass Peices, as good as any in Lurge) which were taken out of Tunningen when it was leized and difinantel d by Denmark. The Minilters of the Crown of Suedan, and of the Dukes of Lunenburg are met at Lunenburg, with a good prospect of determining the points in con-troverly between them. The faid Princes are disbanding, a d three Regiments are railing in these parts for the service of Sueden.

Declaring that they are and mill be, at all times so vigilant and matchful for the preventing of all dangers, that if any, the scalf, hall at any time appear, they will all be ready, to the utmost of their power, with their Lives and Fortunes, to endeavour the prefervation of Hin Majesties Person, the True Protestant Religion, and the Peace, Safety and Wellfare of the faid City.
