*Marsailles, Sept. 12.*

THE 10th instant came into this Port seven Malta Gallies; they have been these three or four Months at Sea cruising; they will Wash and Tallow, and then take their course to the Westward, to look after the *Algierins* that are

abroad. The French Gallies are expected here about the end of this Month, when three or four new Gallies will be launched; the King resolves to make their number up to 40. From *Tripoli* we have an exact list of the Naval Force at present belonging to that City and Kingdom.

*Tangier, Aug. 15.* We have Letters from Vice-Admiral *Herbert*, dated on board the *Rupert*, the 10th instant, off of *Cape Frafalgar*, in which he advises, That he had given chase to two *Algierine* Prizes, the one a Dutch Ship laden with Wine, and the other an English *Barbadoes* Man, laden with Cotton, Ginger, and Sugar; the first run aboard under *Arzilia*, and was there lost; the other finding she had no other way to escape, was set on Fire in the night, two Leagues to the Westward of *Cape Sparta*, by the Turks themselves, who saved themselves in their Boat. The Moors continue still in the Field, though at a greater distance from this place than they were when we gave you our last account.

*Stetin, Sept. 11.* All our Cannon and Ammunition is removed from hence to *Castrin*; and we now expect very suddenly to return into the hands of the *Suedes*. We have within these three months been forced to raise 18000 Crowns, and are afraid the *Brandenburg* Soldiers will require yet more of us, before they leave us. The other day happened here a sad accident; a poor Soldier being thought dead, was buried, but making a hideous noise in the Grave where he lay, a Priest heard it, and caused him to be taken up; he was found to have yet life in him, but died some hours after, having beaten himself almost to piteés, and his Coffin being full of blood.

*From the French Camp before Homburg, Sept. 17.* The 14th instant the *Marschal d'Humiers* came, with the Forces under his Command, before this place; he immediatly summoned the Governor, who, after seeing the Trenches opened, and the Batteries raised, surrendered.

*Strasbourg, Sept. 15.* We have at the same time the account of the French having besieged the Castles of *Homburg* and *Bisch*, belonging to the Duke of *Lorraine*, and that they are surrendered to them.

*Strasbourg, Sept. 16.* All the Towns of the Upper and Lower *Alsace* have been obliged to take an oath of Allegiance to the Most Christian King; the City of *Schlestadt* did it on Saturday last; and the City of *Calmar* on Sunday: the latter made at first difficulty, but being threatened that if they refused, 5000 men should be sent to Quarter upon them, they thought it best to comply; and thus all *Alsace* is become subject to *France*.

*Hague, Sept. 26.* On Thursday last the Prince of *Orange* went hence for *Breda*, to meet the Princess there, in her return from *Aix la Chapelle*, as well as to see what forwardness the new Fortifications, that are making there, are in, and to take a review of the Troops in those parts. On Saturday their Highnesses came to *Honslaerdike*, and from thence they intended in few days to *Soestdike*, to pass most of the next Month there. The States of *Holland* adjourned last Saturday till this day. It is said that the Deputies of some of the Towns have proposed the sending of a Minister to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, to endeavour to accomodate matters with him, but that those of *Amsterdam* oppose it, they thinking the States have greater pretensions on the Elector than he upon them, and that to Secure themselves, against the Menaces as well of *Spain* as of his Electoral Highness, they ought to lay hold on the opportunity which now offers, to make an advantageous Alliance with *France*; but the rest of the Towns seem of another mind.

*Orleans*

Orleans, Sept. 23. The Queen of Spain, who parted from Fontainbleau the 20th instant, accompanied with the Duke and Duteneſs of Orleans, arrived here the 21 in the afternoon, and was received by the Magiſtrates in their Robes and by the Citizens in Arms, which conſiſted of 100 Companies, and formed four Battalions. All the Clergy Secular and Regular were likewise in their habits, and nothing omitted which might teſtifie the reſpects of this City. Yeſterday her Maſteſty repoſed herſelf here, and received the Compliments of all the Perſons of Quality, of this neighbourhood. And this morning ſhe continued her journey, accompanied by her Father the Duke of Orleans; and the Dutcheſs of Orleans who took her leave of her Maſteſty here, returning to Paris.

Amboiſe, Sept. 26. The 24th inſtant the Queen of Spain, who parted from Orleans, the 23, and lodged that night at Chambort, arrived here, and to morrow continues her journey for Spain; and the Duke of Orleans, returns for Paris.

Paris, Sept. 27. This day the Queen of Spain takes her leave of the Duke of Orleans her Father, at Amboiſe, and ſo continues her journey for Spain. It is now again the general diſcourſe that the Captains of the Kings Ships have orders to make all Ships, they meet, to ſtrike, but the ſame having been formerly reported, and we having not yet heard that any ſuch orders have been put in execution, makes us doubt the truth of what is now ſaid. We hear nothing new from Germany ſince the taking the Caſtles of Biſch and Homburg, the only places which remained in the hands of the Duke of Lorraine. It is ſaid that the Mareſchal d'Humiers, who commands the Kings Forces in thoſe parts has orders to aſſiſt the Biſhop of Strasburg in the recovery of thoſe rights which, it's pretended, the City of Strasburg has uſurped upon him, but the truth of it time muſt diſcover.

Paris, Sept. 30. Two days ſince Count Morſtein, Ambaſſador Extraordinary from the Crown of Poland, had a private Audience of the King, in which he preſſed to know the Kings mind, as to the aſſiſtance that Crown is to expect from him in the War it is going to engage in againſt the Turks. On Thursday the Dutcheſs of Olnaburg, who has been here ſome weeks, parted from hence on her return for Germany. The Princeſs of Hanover is coming hither. Here are arrived Deputies from the City of Strasburg, and they have had Audience of the King; their buſineſs is to divert his Maſteſty from taking any reſolution in favor of the Biſhop of Strasburg, to their prejudice; but what ſucceſs they will have time muſt ſhew. The 11 inſtant the Marquis de la Porte, ſailed from Thoulon with five Men-of War, being appointed to attend the Sieur de Guilleragues, the Kings Ambaſſador to the Grand Signior.

Swanzey, Sept. 18. Thomas Owen Eſq; is choſen Burgeſs at Haverford-weſt in Pembrookſhire.

Corber Eſq; for the Town of Radnor, and Colonel Jeffrys for the Town of Brecon.

Plymouth, Sept. 19. On Wednesday laſt came in Sir John Holmes in the Captain, with the Ruby and Dartmouth Frigats; and this morning they ſailed again to Cruize. Sir Richard Edcomb and Francis Roberts Eſq; are choſen Knights of the Shire for Cornwall. Sir John Maynard and John Spark Eſq; Burgeſſes for this place, and Sir Nicholas Slanning

and Charles Smith Eſq; Burgeſſes for Penryn. Stockton, Sept. 19. From Durham we have an account that Colonel Blackiſton and Sir Richard Lloyd are choſen Citizens, to ſerve for that City in the approaching Parliament.

Whitehall, Sept. 24. This day His Maſteſty was pleaſed to Order the Publithing A Proclamation Declaring the Parliament ſhall be Prorogued untill the Thirtieth of October next.

Whereas the Kings Moſt Excellent Maſteſty hath Iſſued forth His Writs of Summons for the meeting of a Parliament at Weſtminſter upon the ſeaventeenth day of October next, His Maſteſty (for divers weighy reaſons) hath reſolved to Prorogue the ſaid Parliament until the Thirtieth day of the ſaid Month: And doth by this his Royal Proclamation declare His Royal Pleaſure to be, that the ſaid Parliament ſhall be Prorogued upon the ſaid Seaventeenth day of October, until the Thirtieth day of the ſame Month. Of which the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Knights, Citizens, and Burgeſſes are to take notice, and order their Affairs accordingly, His Maſteſty not expecting the Preſence of any of them on the ſaid Seaventeenth day of October, unleſs of ſuch, who being then in or about the Cities of London and Weſtminſter may be preſent at the making of ſuch Prorogation.
