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Genoa, Sept. 20.

THE French Gallies failed from hence this morning for *Marseilles*. Their General the Duke de *Vivonne*, after the first Compliment made him on the part of the Senate, was not so much taken notice of, as the French expected, which made him keep on board, while the Gallies were in this Port, though he was indisposed. We are told that at *Thoulon* they are fitting out 12 Capital Men of War. The State of *Milan*, 'tis now said, arms in good earnest, with intention, as some report, to take *Verona*, *Cremona*, *Bergamo*, and *Brescia*, from the Venetians; but others say (and that's more probable) 'tis in order to hinder the French from making themselves Masters of *Casal*, which it's not doubted but they are endeavouring to do, great numbers of French Troops being already come to *Pignerola*. The Spanish Gallions arrived the 20 past at *Cadix*, and the *New Spain* Fleet is expected there some time this month; Some French Ships they say made a descent near *Santa Cruz*, but were repulsed.

Prague, Sept. 16. The 14 instant their Imperial Majesties, with the young Archduke *Joseph*, arrived here; in their journey hither from *Vienna*, many persons of their Family died, not without suspicion of the Plague, which is broken out in several places of this Kingdom, and some say that the Emperor for that reason intends to remove from hence very suddenly, to *Nuemburg*, *Ratisbonne*, or *Francfort*.

Vienna, Sept. 23. The Plague encreases still here, above 18000 persons are said to be already dead of it. All the Officers of Justice, and of the Chancery, are gone into the Country, and several persons of quality who would retire into *Bobemia*, are not permitted by the Magistrates of the Places they would go to.

Strasburg, Sept. 29. The French go on with the Fortress they are making at *Huningen*, which is a great eyesore to the Swissers, whose Deputies at the French Court have it's said at last obtained a Promise, that that work shall be given over, and that the King will content himself with raising a small Fort at *Mulheim*, two Leagues from *Basel*, on the other side of the *Rhine*.

Lipstadt, Octob. 4. This day the French Troops that were in Garrison here, after having first removed the Magazine, Cannon, and Ammunition, marched from hence, leaving the Inhabitants well pleased to be rid of these Guests, and the rather for that they feared they should have been troubled with them all Winter.

Zell, Octob. 7. Part of the Forces of the Duke of *Hanover*, are joined with those of our Prince, and are marching towards the *Elbe*. Those of *Wolfenbuttel* and *Osnabrug* are doing the like; These Princes being resolved not to suffer the City of

Hamburg, which is now threatened with a Siege to fall into the hands of the King of *Denmark*, though before they come to extremities, they will see if matters may be composed.

Cologne, Octob. 6. We are still afraid that the French intend to winter in these parts. They are making great provision of Forage at *Linnich*, which is near *Fuliers*. Our Letters from *Vienna* say, that the Plague begun to abate, there dying now not above 100 day, whereas before there had died 200 daily.

Hamburg, Octob. 7. On Tuesday last the King of *Denmark* came to his quarters at *Pinnenberg*, which are about two Leagues from hence; and the next day sent orders to his Resident here, to acquaint this Senate, that he expected they should send to him Deputies, whom he would let know what he required of this City. Yesterday the Common-Council met to consult of this matter; and resolved to send five Deputies to the King (who accordingly parted this morning, and are expected back again to morrow) and declared that as they are willing to give the King of *Denmark* all reasonable satisfaction in any just pretensions he may have upon them; so they are likewise unanimously resolved not to give up any part of their liberty, but rather to venture all. The Imperial Resident here received some time since Letters from the Emperor, which if things came to extremity he was to send forward to the Duke of *Zell*, and the Bishop of *Munster*, whom his Imperial Majesty does thereby require to assist this City with all their forces; wh ch Letters the said Resident dispatched away yesterday; and in the mean time we have an account that the Duke of *Hanover* hath not only refused the King of *Denmark* the 1000 men he had promised him, but has ordered all his Forces to march towards the *Elbe*, to join with those of *Zell*, *Wolfenbuttel*, and *Osnabrug*. Colonel *Meck*, who has served as Major-General in the Army of the Duke of *Zell*, came hither two days since with 600 Horse, and his Regiment of Foot, consisting in 1000 men, is expected here in a day or two; he has taken an Oath of Fidelity to our Magistrates, who have likewise raised what men they could; so that we shall have a pretty good Garrison; but our great fear is of the Enemies Bombs and Fireballs, of which they have made great Provision. The Danish Garrison, except only 200 men, is marched out of *Wismar*, to join the Army, and 6000 men are expected from *Schonen*. It is just now reported that the Danish Men of War are come into the *Elbe*, but without any certainty.

Brussels, Octob. 10. On Saturday his Royal Highness arrived here: and in the evening all the Nobility and Ministers of this Court, were to pay their Respects to his Royal Highness. The Princess of *Orange* was expected here, to visit their Royal Highnesses, and particularly her Sister the Lady

Ann. before her return for *England*, but is now prevented, by their Royal Highnesses intending to go within a day or two with the *Lady Ann* to the *League*; and the States Yachts will be ready to receive them at *Antwerp*. The *Duke de Villa Hermosa* is expected back from *Gaunt* on Thursday next, having settled matters there to his satisfaction, and obtained of the States of *Flanders* 22 thousand Rations, at 5 Stivers a day, which will amount to two Millions of Florins. We have an account that 2000 Italians are arriv'd at *Ostend*. This Court is already in Mourning for the death of *Don Juan of Austria*, which we expect will be followed by great changes in the Court of *Spain*; We are assured that *Don Juan*, if he had recovered, was resolv'd to have quitted the World, and to become a *Carthusian Friar*.

Hague, Octob. 10. On Friday in the evening the Duke of *Monmouth* arriv'd here, and lodg'd at Mr. *Sidney's*, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Britain*, and the next day went to wait upon the Prince and Princess of *Orange*. On Sunday his Grace and Mr. *Sidney* dined with the Prince; and the next morning his Grace parted hence for *Utrecht*. The States of *Holland* will be assembled again to-morrow, when they will, it's believed, take a final Resolution in the great matter now before them; In the mean time the proceedings of the French Ambassador (who it seems no sooner heard what was doing, but went to the Houses and Lodgings of the several Deputies of the States of *Holland*, to dissuade them from it, and in order thereunto, told them the resentment his Master would have of it) is much spoken of, as a very unusual thing, there being no Precedent that ever any foreign Ministers address'd themselves in this manner, it being always the Custom for them to make their application either to the States General in their Assembly, to the Prince, or to the Pensioner; and we are told that none of the Deputies return'd his Visit, except those of *Amsterdam*, and they did it not, till his Excellency had been thrice with them at their houses; and that some of them answer'd the Ambassador very resolutely, saying they had in vain fought so long for their liberty, if they must now be thus impos'd upon. From the North we have an account that the King of *Denmark* had own'd to the Minister of the Duke of *Zell*, his design against *Hamburg*, and that it was not a Sum of money he aim'd at, but the obliging that City to do him Homage, as their Sovereign, and therefore declared, that he should deem all those his Enemies that should give them any assistance. Accordingly that King is emptying all his Garrisons, to reinforce his Army, with which he will attack that City, while the Elector of *Brandenburg*, with his Forces observes the motions of those of the Princes of *Lunenbourg*, who are, it seems, resolv'd to stand by the *Hamburgers*, and to defend them with all their power. It is generally believ'd that *France* favors *Denmark* in this design, which it's to be feared may be the rise of a new War.

Paris, Octob. 7. Our Spanish Letters give us an account of the death of *Don Juan of Austria* on the 17 past. He was born in the year 1629, and soon after his Mother received the Habit of a Religious from the Nuncio then in *Spain* (who was afterwards Pope *Innocent X.*) In 1642, he was own'd the Kings Natural Son, was made Great Prior of *Castile* of the Order of *Malta*, and sent against the Portuguese, with the Title of *Generalissimo* of all the

Kings Forces by Land and Sea. In 1647, he was declar'd the Kings Vicar-General and Plenipotentiary in *Italy*, and subdued *Naples* then in Rebellion. In 1656, he was sent into *Flanders* to command the Spanish Troops there, and after the Peace of the *Pyreneans*, was made General of the Army against the Portuguese. As soon as the late King was dead, he retir'd to *Consuegra*, and lived very privately till he was call'd to Court in 1676, from which time till his death, he had the management of the affairs of that Monarchy, as first Minister of State, in which it is report'd he will be succeeded by the Duke de *Medina Celi*. The 30 past the Queen of *Spain* arriv'd at *Reuiliers* where she received the news of the death of *Don Juan*, and was much troubled at it. The fifth instant the Sieur *Meyerseem*, Envoy of *Denmark*, had a private Audience of the King.

Pendennis, Sept. 29. The Wind continuing Westly all the last Week, not any Ships, worth giving an account of, arriv'd in this Port. Yesterday sail'd hence the *Katherine* of *London*, bound for *France*, as did this morning the *Samuel* of *London*, *John Clarke* Master, for the *Barbadoes*.

Plimouth, Sept. 30. Yesterday arriv'd here the *Burpee* of *London*, *John Mason* Commander, from the *Barbadoes*; and the *John* of *London*, *Samuel Jones* Master, bound home from *Jamaica*. On Sunday last in the morning the *Ruby* and *Dartmouth* Frigats, sail'd from hence, to the Westward to Cruise. *Bernard Greenville*, and *Nicholas Courtney* Elquires, are chosen Burgeses for *Salisbury*.

Lime, Octob. 1. Yesterday was our Election of Burgeses, and *Henry Henly*, and *Thomas Moore* Esquires, were chosen.

Newmarket, Octob. 4. His Majesty continues, thanks be to God, very well, having already found benefit by this Air, in the confirmation of his Health. This week the Vice-chancellor of *Cambridge*, accompanied by the Proctors and Doctors, and others of that University, came hither, and complimented the King upon the recovery of his health, and were very graciously received by His Majesty.
