Genoua, Sept. 20.

HE French Gallies failed from hence this morning, for Marfeilles. Their General the Duke deVivonne, after the first Compliment made him on the part of the Senate, was not fo much taken notice of, as the French expected, which made him keep on board, while the Gallies were in this Port, though he was indifposed. We are told that at Thoulon they are fittin g out 12 Capital Men of War. The State of Milan, 'tis now faid, arms in good earfield, with intention, as fome report, to take Verona, Cremona, Bergamo, and Brefeia, from the Venetians; but others fay (and that's more probable) 'tis in ord r to hinder the French from making themselves Masters of Cazal, which it's not doubted but they are endeavouring to do, great numbers of French Troops being already come to Pignerola. The Spanish Galleons arrived the 20 past at Cadiz, and the New Spain Fleet is expected there fome time this month; Some French Ships they fay made a descent near Sanda Crux, but were repulsed.

Prague, Sept. 16. The 14 inftant their Imperial Majeffics, with the young Archduke Foleph, arrived here; in their)ourny hither from Vienna, many perfons of their Family died, not without fulpition of the Plague, which is broken out in several places of this Kingdom, and fome fay that the Emperor for that reafon intends to remove from hence very fuddenly, to Nurenberg, Ratisbonne, or Francfort.

Vienna, Sept. 23. The Plague encreases still here, above 18000 perfons are faid to be already dead of it. All the Officers of Jultice, and of the Chancery, are gone into the Country, and feveral perfons of quality who would retire into Bobemia, are not permitted by the Magistrates of the Places they would go to.

Strasburg; Sept. 29. The Erench go on with the Fortress they are making at Husningen, which is a g cat cyclore to the Suiflers, whose Deputies at the French Court have it's faid at last obtained a Promife, that that work shall be given over, and that the King will content himself with raising a small Fort at Mulbeim, two Leagues from Bafel, on the

ther fide of the Rhine. Lipstate, Oftob. 4. This day the French Troops that were in Garifon here, after having first removed the Magazine, Cannon, and Ammunition, marched from hence, leaving the Inhabitants well pleafed to be rid of these Guels, and the rather for that they feared they should have been troubled with them all Winter.

Zell, Odob. 7. Part of the Forc s of the Duke of Hancuer, are joined with those of our Prince, and are marching towards the Elbe. Those of Wol-

Hamburg, which is now threatned with a Siege to fall into the hands of the King of Denmark, though before they come to extremities, they will fee if matters may be composed.

Cologne, Ollob. 6. We are fill afraid that the French intend to winter in these parts. They are making great provision of Forage at Linnich, which is near Fuliers. Our Letters from Vienna lay, that the Plague begun to abate, there dying now not, above 100 day, whereas before there had died 200 daily.

Hamburg, Ostob. 7. On Tuesday last the King of Denmark came to his quarters at Pinnenberg, which are about two Leagues from hence; and the next day fent orders to his Refident here, to acquaint this Senate, that he expected they should fend to him Deputies, whom he would let know what he required of this City. Yesterday the Common-Council met to confult of this matter; and refolved to fend five Deputies to the King (who ac-cordingly parted this morning, and are expected back again to morrow) and declared that as they are willing to give the King of Demnatk all reasonable fatisfaction in any just pretentions he may have upon them; fo they are likewife unani-moufly refolved not to give up any part of their liberty, but rather to venture all. The Imperial liberty, but rather to venture all. Refident here received fome time fince Letters from the Emperor, which if things came to extremity he was to find forward to the Duke of Zell, and the Bishop of Munster, whom his Imperial Majesty does thereby require to affift this City with all their force; wh ch Letters the faid Refident dispatched away yefterday; and in the mean time we have an ac-count that the Duke of *Hamouer* hath not only sefufed the King of Denmark the 2000 men he had promiled him, but has ordered all his Forces to march. towards the Elbe, to join with those of Zell, Wel-fembuttel, and Ofnabrug. Colonel Mell, who has leaved as Major-General in the Army of the Duke of Zell, came hither two days fince with 600 Horfe, and his Regiment of Foot, confifting in 1000 men, is expected here in a day or two; he has taken an Oath of Fidelity to our Magiltrates, who have likewife railed what men they could; fo that we shall have a pretty good Garifon; but our great fear is of the Enemies Bombes and Firebals, of which they have made great Provision. The Danilh Carifon, except only 200 men, is marched out of Wilmar, to join the Army, and 6000 men are expected from Schonen. It is just now reported that the Danish Men of War are come into the Elbe, but without any certainty.

Bruffels, Ottob. 10. On Saturday his Royal Highnels arrived here: and in the evening all the No-bility and Ministers of this Court, were to pay their Respects to his Royal Highnos. The Princels of fembuttel and Ofnabrug are doing the like; These Orange was expected here, to visit their Royal Princes being refolved not to suffer the City of Highnesses, and particularly her Sister the Lady Ann.

Ann. before her return for England, but is now prevented, by their Royal Highneiles intending to go within a day or two with the Lady Ann to the Lague; and the States Yachts will be ready to recove them at Animerp. The -Duke-de-Filla Hermofa is expected back from Gaunt on Thursday next, having fetled matters there to his fatisfaction, and obtained of the States of Flanders 22 thousand Rations, at 5 Stivers a day, which will amount to two Millions of Florins. We have an account that 2000 Italians are arrived at Oftend. This Court is already in Mourning for the death of Don Fuan of Aufria, which we expect will be followed by great changes in the Court of Spain; We are affured that Don Fuan, if he had recovered, was refolved to have quitted the World, and to become a Carthu*fian* Fri^fr.

Hague, Odob. 10. On Friday in the evening the Duke of Monmouth arrived here, and lodged at Mr. Sidney's, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majefty of Great Bri tain, and the next d.y went to wait upon the Prince and Princels of Orange. On Sunday his Grace and Mr. Sidney dined with the Prince; and the next morning his Grace parted hence for Orrecht. The States of Holland will be allembled again to morrow, when they will, it's believed, take a final Refolution in the great matter now before them; In the mean time the proceedings of the French Ambaflador (who it fcems no fooner heard what was doing, but went to the Houfes and Lodgings of the feveral Deputies of the States of Holland, to diffuade them f. om it, and in order thereunto, told them the refeatment his Malter would have of it) is much fpoken of, as a very unufual thing, there being to Precedent that ever any foreign Minifters addreffed themfelves in this manner, it being always the Cuftom for them to make their application either to the States General in their Affembly, to the Prince, or to the Penfioner; and we are told that none of the Deputies returned his Vifit, exceptthose of Amsterdam, and they did it not, till his Excellency had been thrice with them at their houses; and that fome of them answered the Ambassador very refolutely, faying they had in vain fought fo long for their liberty, if they must now be thus imposed upon. From the North we have an account that the King of Denmark had owned to the Minifler of the Duke of Zell, his defign against Hamburg, and that it was not a Sum of mony he aimed at, but the obliging that City to do him Homage, as their Soveraign, and therefore declared, that he should deem all those his Enemies that should give them any affifiance. Accordingly that King is emptying all his Garifons, to reinforce his Army, with which he will attack that City, while the Elector of Brandenburg, with his Forces observes the motions of those of the Princes of Lunenburg, who are, it seems, retolved to fland by the Hamburghers, and to defend them with all their power. It is generally believed that France favors Denmark in this defign, which it's to be feared may be the rife of a new War.

Paris, Ottob. 7. Our Spanish Letters give us an account of the death of Don Juan of Austria on the 17 pail. He was born in the year 1629, and soon after his Mother received the Habit of a Religious from the Nuncio then in Spain (who was afterwards Pope Innocent X.) In 1642, he was owned the Kings Natural Son, was made Great Prior of Caltie of the Order of Maltha, and fent against the Portuguele, with the Title of Generalifimo of all the ded, that have 40 sa Reward, befides their Charges

Kings Forces by Land and Sea. In 1647, he was teclired the Kings Vicar-General and Plenipoten-tlary an Italy, and fubdued Naples then in Rebellion. In 16,6, he was fent into Flinders to comm. nd the Spanith-Troops there, and after the Peace of the Pyreneans, was made General of the Army against the Portuguese. As foon as the late King was dead, he-retired to Confuegra, and lived very privately till he was called to Court in 1676, from which time till his death, he had the management of the affa rs of that Monarchy, as first Minister of State, in which it is rep rted he will be fucceeded by the Duke de Medina Celi. The 30 past the Queen of Spain arrived at Railliers where the received the news of the death of Don Juan, and was much troubled at it.
