to thore, were fince forced to unlade and carine ; others were in great danger of perishing; but onely one sunk, which proved a Vessel of this place. Here is since arrived, the Noftra Signora de Rofario, with Puglia Oils, upon the account of some Merchants of this place, but intended for Oftend; as also a Barque with Soldiers from Spain, bound for the fome place.

The Duke of Savey hath establish'd a free Port at Nigga, Willa Franca, and Sando Hofpisio, to invite the Merchants chither : and 'tis faid, has put a confiderable Stock into the hands of some Merchants, to trade into the Levant; which kis believed, may in time, much prejudice the neighboring.

The Promotion of Signior Spinola, his Holineffes Nunrio in Germany, has occasion'd much joy in this City; where the Signior Cavalier Gio. Carlo Spinola, his Brother, Segnora, Maria, Aurelia his Sister, with his Nephew Gio. Bastilia Raggi, have not been wanting by Fire-works, Vollies of Shot, Lights, Musick, and other Divertisements, to express the fatisfaction they receive by that welcome snews, Treating all the great Personages of both Sexes, that flocks to their Houses in great numbers, to congratulate the Pro-

Venice, April 1. Our latest advices from Zante tell us of the arrival there of the Marques Villa, where he attends General Morosini, and the Orders brought by him from this Republick, as likewise from his Highness the Duke of Savoy s being as yet doubtful whether he shall still continue the service in Candia, against the common enemy, or else return homewards to his own Countery, to affift the Duke

in his Wats against Geneva.

The Marquels has also informed the Senate of the excellent flate of affairs in Candia, where they have learnt not to fear the menaces of the Turks, or any of their attempres and that they are plentifully flored with all necessaries for a long Siege, and encouraged by a great number of excellent Officers and Soldiers: and that Signior Grimani and taken three Turkish Vessels, laden with Provisions for Ganes, and

funk another, laden with Artillery.

At the writing of these Letters from Zant, they had intelligence, that General Morofini, had raised several Companies of Soldiers at Ceffalonia, and reformed several Ban-diti, who were contented to enter into service aboard the Armada, and had lifted others at Corfu, from whence they

supposed him already parted.

The other Convoy designed for the Armata, is fitting up and failing, amongst others, one called the Arms of France, having taken in a proportion of Flower and Bisket for the Fleet, intending afterwards to Confiantinople upon Merchants, account with a confiderable quantity of Corn and other Commodities which she had aboard her, was by the violence of a storm, driven ashoar in the Port, the Vessel much bruised, and the Goods damnisted: several other ships that came in from Verena, having had their parts of the ftorm, and run the fame hazard.

The weather beginning now to fettle fair, the Galley defigned for the fervice of General Morofini, with other intended for the Levant, lies ready to fail, and with her,

Vatiere, the General of the three Ifles.

From Otrante we are advised of the arrival of a Tartane there from Tunis, with two Christian Slaves that made their escapes, with a Turkish Girl that came away with one of them; affifting them in their flight, carrying with her many Jewels, intending to marry and turn Christian. They inform us of feveral Vessels that should have been sent thence for the Turkish service, but were cast away, or much damaged by storm, in coming out of the Port, and that four of their Corfairs had been lost about the Streights. We hear likewise of feveral others of them, that have run the fame fate in ether places. However, they keep fome Squadrons always eruifing; this Tartane being for fome time chaced by them, and with fome difficulty put into Otranto.
