

*Utrecht, Oct. 7.* To-morrow the Duke of *Monmouth* goes to the *Fier Zulejlein's* house, about 4 Leagues from hence, where he will stay three or four days, and towards the end of the Week will go for *Amsterdam*, and thence for *North-Holland* to see that Country. His Grace has been somewhat indisposed, but is well again.

*Hague, Octob. 13.* On Wednesday last the States of *Holland* met again, the several Deputies being come back from their respective Towns, which they had been to consult concerning the Alliance with *England*. And yesterday the said States adjourned themselves till the 15th of the next Month, when that matter will be resumed. The Duke of *Monmouth* has settled his Residence at *Utrecht*, having hired a house there, he has been indisposed by a Cold he took, and has had some Symptoms of an Ague. The States have appointed the *Sieur d'Ameyongen* to go to his Envoy Extraordinary to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, to endeavour to compose matters. From *Amsterdam* we have an account that two of their *East-India* Ships were arrived in the *Texel*, and the Wind being now very fair, it's believed the rest of the Fleet will soon appear.

*Hague, Oct. 17.* Yesterday arrived here their Royal Highnesses, with the Lady *Ann* and the Lady *Isabelle*, from *Brussels*; it's believed their stay here will be only for a day or two, and that they will embark on the Yachts that attend them in the *Meuse*, in order to their passing over for *England*. From *Hamburg* they write, That there were great Hopes that the Differences between the King of *Denmark* and that City would be accommodated.

*Hague, Oct. 17.* There have of late been several Memorials presented to the States General, concerning the City of *Hamburg*. One by the Danish Envoy, wherein he sets forth, that he is commanded by the King his Master to acquaint them, That though his Majesty has just cause to show the City of *Hamburg* his Resentment; for that notwithstanding so many friendly Remonstrances, they have always made difficulty, to yield as well to the King deceased as to his Majesty, the Homage they were obliged to by former Practices, and several particular agreements; and besides have committed several Hostilities upon his Subjects; yet his Majesty is rather desirous to make use of gentle means to bring them to their duty, requiring no more of them than what they have done to his Ancestors, which if they shall continue obstinately to refuse, he cannot doubt but the States will approve of his Resolution to oblige them thereunto by his Arms, and that they will not concern themselves in this affair, and the rather seeing his intention is only to do himself right, and not to ruin the said City or disturb its Commerce. On the other side, the Ministers of the Dukes of *Lunenbourg* have represented to the States, that they are obliged, by a Treaty they made with the City of *Hamburg*, to assist it, in case the King of *Denmark* should attack it. The Resident of *Hamburg* has in like manner presented a Memorial to the States, shewing the great danger that City is in, and desiring them to joyn with the Dukes of *Lunenbourg* to mediate an accommodation, or if that succeed not, to assist them.

*Marselles, Oct. 10.* The French Gallies, 28 in

number, are returned into this Port. The seven *Maliba* Gallies, which we formerly advised you of, having been cruising off of the Isles of *Corfica*, in search of the *Algierins*, arrived here three days past, and departed again this morning for *Maliba*.

*Paris, Octob. 14.* The Kings Regiment of Guards is on its march hither from *Alsace*, so that its believed there will be no more action on that side this winter. Our Letters from *Spain* tell us, that *Don Juan* before his death, had desired to be reconciled to the Queen Mother, and that as a mark of it he had given her half his Jewels, and the other half to the New Queen, that he dyed very rich in money, which after several Legacies, he had given to the King, and that he had appointed the Cardinal *Porto Carero*, the Duke de *Medina Celi*, the Almirante of *Castile*, and two Ecclesiasticks, his Executors: The King has named the President *Colbert* to go his Ambassador to the Elector of *Bavaria*, which gives occasion to renew the discourse at Court concerning the Dauphin's Marriage with that Electors Sister. We are told that to the demand of Succours made by the Polish Ambassador here, against the Turks, the King has answered, *That he will do proportionably to what he shall see oiber Princes do.* The *Sieur de la Cordonnier*, *Maitre de Camp* General of the light Horse, is dead, and the King has given that Command to the Baron de *Monclar*, who now commands his Troops in *Alsace*. The 4th instant the Queen of *Spain* arrived at *St. Jean d'Angeli*, and purposed to stay a day or two there.

*Pendennis, Octob. 6.* The Wind continuing all the last week at E. and E. N. E. several Ships came into this Harbour, amongst which were the *Friendship of London*, *John Williams* Master, bound home from the *Barbadoes*, who sailed from hence again on Thursday, with 4 other Vessels from *Newfoundland*; but the Wind changing the next day, the *Newfoundland* Ships were forced back hither, and the *Barbadoes* Man, as we hear, into *Plimouth*.

*Plimouth, Octob. 7.* The 4th came in here the *St. Paul of London*, *Thomas Long* Master, bound for *Cape de Verde*; the *John and Lawrence of London*, *Robert Hunter*, from *Bilboa*; the *Alletta* and the *Lenna*, both of *Amsterdam*, the first bound for the *West-Indies*, and the latter home from *Bilboa*, with some other Vessels. On Saturday came into this Port the *Diamond* Frigate Captain *Wood* Commander, bound to the Westward to Cruise.

*Deale, Oct. 10.* On Wednesday Sir *John Holmes* in the *Captain* came into the *Downs* from Cruising. There are at present above 100 Sail of Merchant Ships outward bound.

*Whitehall, Octob. 12.* This Evening their Royal Highnesses, with the Lady *Ann* and the Lady *Isabelle*, arrived here from *Holland* in their way to *Scotland*, whither His Majesty has given their Royal Highnesses leave to go.
