Madrid, Octob. 4.

ON Saturday the 23 past, his Majesty returned hither from *Toledo*, where he had been to visit the Queen. On the 25 his Majesty and the whole Court were entertained with a Bull Feast in the *Plaza Mayor*, which was performed by five Gentlemen, two of which were unhorsed. On the 26 the Marquis *d' Astorgas* Mayordomo Mayor, and the Dutcheſs of *Terranova*, *Camarera* Mayor, to the new Queen, parted hence to meet her Majesty on the Frontiers. Their Equipage was very numerous and splendid; that of the Marquis consisted of 16 Gentlemen all mounted upon fine Horses, and very well clad, 2 Trumpets, 20 Pages, 8 Grooms of the Chamber likewise on Horseback, 20 Lackeys, 12 Sumpter-men, 6 Grooms, with as many Led-horses, 8 Coach-men, 3 Littermen, 6 Chair-men Slaves, all in blew Velvet Liveries, garnished with Silver Lace, and made after the French Mode; 4 Running Footmen in Doublets of the same Velvet, with wide Breeches of crimson Taffata, 54 Sumpter-Mules, 30 of which, that carried all the ordinary Baggage of his Kitchen, Buttery, and Wardrobe, were covered with Sumpter Cloaths of Tapistry, with his Excellencies Arms upon them, and were attended by several Officers appertaining to them; the other 24 were covered with crimson Velvet, on which his Arms were embroidered in Gold and Silver, with a large Gold Fringe round; the Head of every Mule was adorned with 3 great Plumes and round broad Plates of Silver one hanging at each Ear, and another on the Forehead; besides 16 Mules belonging to his Gentlemen severally covered, with the Arms of the Person to whom they belonged, 4 very rich Coaches drawn by six Mules each, a Flying-Chair, as they call it, drawn by two Horses, and a rich Sedan. The Dutcheſs's Equipage, though very Rich, was not so Gay, because it consisted not with her Widowhood. The same day the Marquis *d' Effiat* arrived here from *France*, being sent by the Most Christian King to Compliment his Majesty upon his Marriage, and to acquaint him that his Queen was on her journey.

Hamburg, Octob. 19. This morning early two of the three *Lunenburg* Deputies returned hither from the King of *Denmark's* quarters at *Pinnenberg* (the third continuing there) and having made a very short stay here, during which they had a Conference with some of our Magistrates, they went on to give the Princes their Masters, an account of the success of their Commission: What it is we cannot certainly say; but the general speech about the Town is, that the King of *Denmark* continues to insist to have this City do him Homage; and this we are the more apt to believe, because the *Drunks*

have since the return of these Deputies, been beat here all this day for the raising more men; and all the Sluces of this City have been opened; so that all the low Grounds are set under Water. We have an account that nine Danish Men of War are come into the *Elbe*; and there is a report (which we doubt the truth of) that two or three others were cast away coming from the *Sound*. The King of *Denmark*, they say, expects several Troops from *Norway*, under the command of Monsieur *Guldenheue*, and that he will not attack us till they have joined his Army. The Dukes of *Lunenburg* are making a Bridge over the *Elbe* near *Tatenberg*; and if there be occasion, will send us 10000 men more.

Hamburg, Octob. 20. Last night returned hither the *Lunenburg* Minister, who had stayed behind the two others in the King of *Denmark's* quarters; and as we understand, brings new Propositions from that King, viz. That instead of the Homage he at first required, this City shall send him a Deputation of some of their Magistrates, and the chiefest of the Inhabitants, who shall make their submission to his Majesty, shall acknowledge him their Lord and Protector; and shall promise never to make any Treaty to the prejudice of his Majesties interests, and never to give any assistance to his Enemies: And as for the other Points in difference, his Majesty was willing they should be decided by the Mediators. But our Magistrates think these demands of the King to have too large an extent; and that in effect it would be an acknowledging him their Sovereign; and therefore they have answered, that they cannot consent to them; but at the same time have made other Proposals, which they pray the King to accept of. What the issue of all may be, a few days may show us; and we hope things will end in an Accommodation. In the mean time the King of *Denmark* has desired the Dukes of *Lunenburg* not to send any more Forces into this City, which they have promised to comply with him in, upon condition that his Majesty do not begin any Hostilities against us; and that his Merit of War come no higher than *Gluckstadt*.

Brussels, Octob. 20. We talk here much of having a new Governor, and after all it's believed the Duke of *Montalto* will be the person. This Court is not pleased with the News that the Marriage between the Dauphin, and the Princess of *Bavaria* is going to be concluded, fearing, that this Marriage will fix that Court in the French Interests. *Hague, Octob. 24.* In the absence of the States of *Holland*, and of the Prince of *Orange*, here passes very little worth writing. The Northern Letters give us some hopes again that matters between the King of *Denmark* and the City of *Hamburg*, may be accommodated. The Duke of *Monmouth* is at present at *Amsterdam* to see that City, and from thence he will go for *North-Holland*.

Pendennis, Octob. 13. Some days since arrived here the Prosperous of London, bound home from the Barbadoes; the Encrease of Bristol, bound for Bilbao, and the Benjamin of London, bound for Barcelona.

Whitehall, Octob. 15. This morning His Majesty in Council took into consideration a Complaint made against Sir Thomas Williams, and upon Examination of several Witnesses, it plainly appeared, that the said Sir Thomas had not only carried several False and Dangerous Messages between his Royal Highness, and Mr. Titus Oats, and Mr. Titus Oats, and his Royal Highness, without either of their Directions or Privity. But when he found himself discovered and like to be questioned for the same, had declared to the said Mr. Titus Oats at his Chamber in Whitehall, that he knew Enough of the Plot to break the Neck of his Royal Highness, and all his Party; and if Angred by the Duke, would discover the same: And being required to discover what he knew to the Council, he denied that he ever spoke any such words, or knew any thing concerning the Duke: But the said words being proved upon him by three several Witnesses, the said Sir Thomas was thereupon committed Prisoner to the Gate-house, there to remain till he should be discharged by due Course of Law; and Mr. Attorney, and Mr. Solicitor General, were ordered to prosecute an Information against him for the said Misdemeanors.

Whitehall, Octob. 16. This day the Lieutenantcy of the City of London, consisting of the Right Honorable the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and several other eminent Citizens of the said City, came in a Body to Congratulate His Majesties Happy and Perfect Recovery of His Health; and His Safe Return from Newmarket to this His Royal Palace. The Lord Mayor in the Name, and at the Desire of the said Lieutenantcy making a most Acceptable, Hearty, and Loyal Speech to His Majesty. First returning hearty Thanks to God Almighty for restoring His Majesty to perfect Health, and earnestly praying for the long continuance of it; Then declaring to His Majesty, the Loyalty, Duty, Sincerity and Resolution of all and every one of His Majesties Lieutenantcy of London: who neither had, nor would abuse that great Trust which His Majesty by His Commission of Lieutenantcy had Reposed in them. And that they were resolved to hazzard all things that were most Near and Dear to them, for the Preservation of His Majesties Sacred Person and Government, and of the True Protestant Religion, as it is now established by Law against all Conspiracies and Attempts whatsoever.

Whereunto His Majesty was most Graciously pleased to return in Answer, That He was very sensible of the Loyalty, Duty, and Affection of the City of London, which on several Occasions they had freely expressed unto him; and of the same Loyalty, Duty, and Affection of this His Lieutenantcy in particular; And that He was very glad to see the Faces of so many of them at this time and place, where He had the opportunity to give them the Assurances of His Affection and Zeal for the preservation of that His Beloved City in Peace and Tranquility; And assuring them that neither they, nor any person whatsoever could or would be more ready to hazzard themselves, then His Majesty is, and always will be, to Preserve, Maintain, and Defend the Peace and Safety of the City, the Established Laws of the Realm, and the True Protestant Religion, as it is now by Law Established in the Church of England.

Then His Majesty admitted them the Favour of Kissing His Royal Hand, and they returned back with great Satisfaction.

Whitehall, Octob. 17. This morning the Parliament, pursuant to His Majesties Writs of Summons, met at Westminster, and were Prorogued by Commission to the 26 of January next.

Whitehall, Octob. 19. Here is lately arrived the Sieur Morstein, Chamberlain to the King of Poland, in quality of His Envoy Extraordinary, and has had Audience of their Majesties, their Royal Highnesses, and the Lady Ann, being conducted thereunto by Sir Charles Cotterel, Master of the Ceremonies, in the usual manner.

Bristol, October 15. This day arrived in this Port a small Ketch, who brings News that he met with the Ship Angel Gabriel, of Bristol, burthen about 350 Tuns, about 20 Leagues West South-west of Cape Cleere, and found no man on board her, her Main mast cut by the board, her Rigging, Cabes, Anchors, Sails, and Guns, excepting two, taken out of her; she is very Stanch, and may swim these three Months. It is desired that if she shall be driven afloat, or shall be taken up at Sea, and brought into any Harbour, that she may be secured for the Owners, Mr. Anthony Swimmer and Company of Bristol, and those that take her up, shall have their Charges, and a Reward of 50 l. upon notice given of her being in any Port. It is believed that a Turkish Man of War hath carried away her Men.

ON Friday the 10 instant a Robbery was committed by six or about three Miles beyond Huntingdon, one of them in a Purple Campaign Coat, with silk and gold Buttons and Lapes on each side, with a dark brown Perriwig, a long Vase, a ruddy complexion, and pite with the Small pox; another in a light coloured Suit, with an old Campaign Coat lined with red, a well set man, full faced. Short black hair, black eye brows; A third with a fair Perriwig, and a pale face; A fourth with a full face, black eye-brows, and short dark brown hair, not curling; A fifth with a dark brown Perriwig, a black man, with a ruddy complexion; The sixth with a fair Perriwig, and a pale face; Their Horses were two of them Gray, three bay, and one black one. The Horses they took away were a bay about 13 hands and an half, a little white on his two hind-fetlocks and a Marsh head, a black mane, and a black tail, all his paces, dockt very short; Another bay, about 14 hand and a half, one white foot behind, and a burnt mark on his near shoulder, all his paces. The other a gray with half his mane shorn, about 14 hands, a very thick strong Horse, all his paces, all of them about eight or nine ears of each. And two silver Powder-boxes, with a large Buckle engraven on the Lid of each of them. A bay bald Gelding, 14 hands high, his hind feet white, six or seven years old, a bob tail, his mane half shorn, trots well, paces indifferently. Whoever gives notice to Mr Robert Clarke at St. Joes in Huntingdonshire, or to Captain Richardson Keeper of His Majesties Gaol of Newgate, and the Reward for he that Apprehends the Men or any one of them Five pound, and Twenty shillings apiece for the Horses.
