

# The London Gazette.

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Venice, Oct. 12.

**P**rince Radzeville the Polish Ambassador is now at *Trevisa*, and after having performed a Quarantine there, will come hither, and make the same Propositions to the Senate he did to the Emperor; and it's probable he will find the same averfuels here, he did at the Imperial Court, to enter into a war against the Turks. The Duke of *Hanover* will be here two or three Months hence; and the Senate hath sent him a Mandate of health. The Duke of *Lorraine* has sent hither for several Musicians to come to *Innsbruck*, to assist at a publick rejoicing that will be made there for the birth of his Son, which the Queen of *Poland* his wife was lately brought to bed of.

*Prague*, Octob. 18. The Turkish Chiaus that arrived lately at *Vienna*, was as we are informed sent back with an assurance, That the Emperor will inviolably on his part maintain the Friendship and good Correspondence that is at present settled between the two Empires, and that therefore he had declined the offers that had been made him as well by the Polish as the *Moscovite* Ambassadors in order to the engaging him in a War against the Port. The Reform of the Imperial Troops goes on, according as was at first resolved, which many, who observe the proceedings of the French, as well in *Alsace* (which Country they have brought under their Subjection) as elsewhere are troubled at, fearing that when the Emperor is disarmed, not only the Empire but even his Hereditary Countries will be exposed to great danger; and it is said that General *Montecuculi*, when the matter was debated, gave his opinion that all the Troops, which the Emperor had in his Service at the conclusion of the Peace, should be kept on Foot, for some time at least, till the Empire were in a better posture than now it is.

*Sweden*, Oct. 16. The Magistrates of this City are sending four Deputies (who will part hence to-morrow) to the King of *Sweden*, to declare to his Majesty with how much joy and impatience they entertain the thoughts of their becoming his Subjects again, to represent to him the great miseries brought upon them by the War, and particularly by the oblate defence of their City, and to pray that they may not only be restored to all their antient Priviledges, but likewise exempted from all Duties and Taxes for a certain number of years, till their City has in some measure recovered its former condition, and that care may be taken, that the Swedish Souldiers, which are to compose the Garrison here, be not burthenome to the Inhabitants.

*Strasbourg*, Octob. 20. Monsieur *Vitry*, who goes in quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Most Christian King to the Emperor is passed through

this City, in his way to *Prague*. Our Magistrates think themselves at present so secure, that they have disbanded four Companies of this Garrison. On Tuesday last a Regiment of French Horse arrived at *Saverne*, the next day Two more, and this day and to-morrow Two more are expected there; It is said they are going into Winter Quarters, and that they will take them in *Sunigow*.

*Berlin*, Octob. 21. Our Elector is now with his whole Court at *Possdam*, where the Heer *Grook* arrived two days since, being sent by the Princes of *Lunenbourg*, to engage his Electoral Highness to join with them in favour of the City of *Hamburg*, in which there is the greater likelihood of his succeeding, for that matters between his Electoral Highness and that City (which has agreed to pay the Moneys demanded) are accommodated.

*Francfort*, Oct. 22. We are now confidently assured that the Marriage between the Dauphin and the Princess of *Bavaria* is as good as concluded, and that it will in a short time be consummated, to the great disappointment of those who promised themselves that the Death of the last Elector would have occasioned a change in the Councils of that Court, and that the French Interest would have lost ground there. The difference at the Dyet at *Raisbonne* between the Colledge of Electors, and that of the Princes, about some Formalities, is not yet composed, to the hindrance of all publick business, which is interrupted by this Controversy.

*Cologne*, Octob. 24. The French would oblige our Elector to buy the Magazines which they have at *Nuis*, and demand a very great sum for the same, for that they want Horses to take them away; but his Electoral Highness has answered that he has no need of those Magazines, and that they may remove or sell them to those that have more occasion than he has. The Troops of the Duke of *Hanover* continue to have their quarters in the Bishoprick of *Hildesheim*, notwithstanding all the endeavours that have been used by our Elector to remove them. The French Troops that were encamped on the *Saar*, under the command of the Count de *Bussy*, are partly returned for France, and the rest are gone into Winter quarters in the Bishoprick of *Metz* and in *Burgundy*. The King of *Denmark*'s design against the City of *Hamburg* is looked upon here to be of very great consequence and which may give rise to a new War, if that matters be not fairly composed.

*Hamburg*, Oct. 25. Yesterday the Sieur *Rabenac*, the French Minister, parted from hence, in pursuance of the Orders he had received from the King his Master, which obliged him to repair to the Danish Camp, and to offer the Mediation of the Most Christian King for the composing the present differences between the King of *Denmark* and this City. We doubt not but it will be effectual.

*Amsterdam, Octob. 27.* There are Letters from *Hamburg* of the 25th instant, which say, That they hourly expected to hear that the Mediators, which are the French Minister, and those of the Princes of *Lunenbourg*, had agreed the matters in Controversy with the King of *Denmark*, who seemed to yield in some things, which he had at first very justly insisted upon. The Elector of *Brandenburg*, in the mean time, do s not appear in this whole Affair, so that it's believed what was said of his intention to joyn his Troops with those of *Denmark* in the Siege of that City, was without ground.

*Hague, Oct. 27.* The Minister of the Elector of *Brandenburg* continues to press the States to give him after satisfaction in the matter of the Arrears of Subsidies which he pretends of this State, which according to all appearance he will obtain, for the States seem desirous to live in Friendship with his Electoral Highness; to whom they have therefore sent the Sieur d' *Amerongen*, whose main business is to remove all misunderstandings, and to settle a good Correspondence between his Electoral Highness and this State. The Minister residing here on the part of the City of *Hamburg* hath prayed the States to concern themselves in the present differences between the King of *Denmark* and them, which the States have promised they will do, as having an Interest in the welfare and preservation of that City.

*Bridlington, Oct. 20.* We have of late had very bad Weather in these parts, though, God be thanked we hear not of any Ships lost. Our Herring Busses have had a very bad Fishing, having caught very little. By a Vessel arrived from the *Elbe* we have an account, That there lay 14 Danish Men of War at *Gluckstadt*, and that they lost all Vessels bound to *Hamburg*, but that it was believed this interruption of Trade would not last long, there being great appearance that the differences between the King of *Denmark* and that City would be accommodated, especially since the French King had interposed therein, and had ordered the Sieur *Kabenac*, his Minister, to go immediately to that King to offer his Mediation, and to let him know how glad he should be that all extremities might be avoided, and things amicably composed.

*Plimouth, Octob. 21.* The 18th instant arrived here the *Golden Fleece* of *Dover*, bound home from the *Barbadoes*; the *Coaster* of *London*, *John Kerse* Master for *Guinea*; the *White Ram* of *Amsterdam*, for *Alicant*. The 20th came into this Port the *Happy Return*, Sir *William Pool* Commander, and the *Assistance*, Captain *Barber*, with the *Andeluzia* of *London*, the *Benjamin* of *Topsham*, both from *Cadix*, and the *Mary* of *London*, from *Tangier*: And this day the *Concord* and the *Amity* of this place from *Newfoundland*.

*Deal, Oct. 24.* The *Happy Return* and the *Assistance* Frigats are arrived, with the Merchant Ships under their Convoy, in the *Downs*; they have, as we understand, brought a great deal of Silver. There is now a Fleet of near Four score Merchant Ships in the *Downs*, bound for the *Canaries*, *Virginia*, *New-England*, *Barbadoes*, and other parts.

They failed two days since, but were forced back again by contrary Winds. There are at present 8 of His Majesties Ships in the *Downs*; and the Captain *Rides* Admiral.

*Whitehall, Oct. 25.* His Majesty having been pleased to make the Right Honourable the Earl of Radnor President of his Privy Council, his Lordship this Afternoon took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Sir *William Jones*, His Majesties late Attorney General, having humbly besought His Majesty, that he might resign his place, which the Affliction lately befallen him in his Family, and the Distempers of Body which he hath contracted by a sedentary life, rendered him unable longer to serve His Majesty in: The King has been pleased to gratifie him therein, and to permit him to quit that Employment, with an assurance of His being very well satisfied with the good and faithful services performed by him while he was in it.

And His Majesty has been pleased to make choice of Sir *Creswell Lewins*, one of His Majesties Council learned in the Law, to be His Attorney General.

*Whitehall Oct. 26.* To Morrow their Royal Highnesses part hence on their Journey for *Scotland*, and intend to lye that night at the Earl of *Salisbury's* at *Hatfield*.
