Genoua, Octob. 18.

HE 11th instant sailed hence 3 French. Men of War with a Fire-Ship, who arrived here about the beginning of this Month from Cagliari. They went away without Saluting, upon which occasion it is said this State has written to the Most Christian King to acquaint him with what has passed, and to submit the Point in controverly to his determination, being refolved in case he defire his Men of War, not bearing a Flag, shall be faluted Gun for Gun, to comply therein; but withall they represent to his Majesty the inconvenience hereof, feeing other Princes will then ex-pect the like. The effect of this compliance will be from upon the arrival of the next French Men of War that come hither. This States Convoy is arrived from Spain; some of the Officers report that the Charles Galley has taken an Algierine and deflroyed a Man of War belonging The Centurion and Nonesuch Frigats are impatiently expected here. We have had of late execute Rains in these parts, which has done great harm in Lombardy, so that Corn is risen to a great price, and like to rife higher. This States Galleys are gone for Corfica, whicher they carry several Families of Banditi, that are Baniti-ed thisher. The Venetians, it's said are raising men and Fortifying their Towns.

. Hambarg, Olt. 23. Yellerday in the afternoon the Mediators returned to the Danish Camp, with a Project to this effect, That this Mag stracy will, by a solemn Deputation, Congratulate bis Majesty upon the conclusion of the Peace, will welcom him into this neighbourhood, will assure him of their respect and of their diffe to live in his good Grace and Protection, and will observe a strict Neutrality in any difference be may have with any Prince or Potentate. This Lems to be their last resolution, in which the affurance they have of the Duke of Zell's firmness to a lift them with 18000 men does very much support them. The last Post from Prague gave an account to the Imperial Resident here, that four Letturs are preparing at the Court to be fent to him; the one commanding this City not to do Homige to the King of Dennak; the other to exhort the Princes of Lunenburg to affili it; the third to diswade the King of Denmark from his delign against it; and the fourth, to require all thole that are Subjects of the Empire to leave that Kings Service, in case he attack us. Monsie eur Rabenac parted not hence till this Afternoon, to go and confer with the Duke of Zell, and to acquaint him that the King his Master has written to the King of Denmark to offer him his Mediation, and to defire him not to begin any Hostility against this City. The French King has likewife written to this Magistracy, of which the following is a Copy

Dear Beloved and Good Friends.

Hereas We desire, that your particular Peace and Repose may not be troubled in the general Tranquility of the Empire, and having understood the demand which the King of Denmark makes of certain Rights which he pretends of you, at the same time that he complains of your Carriage towards him. We have thought sit, although we are not fully instructed in the nature of these Differences, to interpose for the determining them amicably. To this purpose we have written to our good brother the King of Denmark; And whereas we doubt not but you will receive, with great Satisfastion and Acknowledgmem, these Marks which we give you of our Affestion, we refer you to the Count de Rabenac, our Envoy Extraordinary and to the Sieur Bidal our Resident with you, to explain more particularly, to them, your Sentiments. And so we pray God to have you, our very Dear and Good Friends, in his Holy Keeping.

Hamburg, Ollob. 27. Yesterday the King of Denamark made a general review of his Army, which conhists in 16 or 17000 men. Four Dutch Vessels laden with Herrings have been stopt at Gluckstadt, and their Herrings disposed of, being sirit paid for. The 25th instant two Danish Yachts came very near this City, to view the small Island of Screvenbof, at which we were very much Alarmed, our Magistrates were assembled greatest part of the night; but the said Yachts attempted nothing, but having sired some Guns, returned from whence they came. Here is a report that 6000 Brandenburgs are marching towards Meck enburg, but that which troubles us more is, that that Elector has sorbid the bringing of any Corn hither from Macgdeburg.

Bruffels, Odob. 24. From Holland we have an account, that their Royal Highneres were Embarked for Brigland; and at the lametime we underly fland that Orders are come to fuch of their Royal Highness Servants as are Roman Catholicks, and stayed here, not to follow their Royal Highness shout to dispose of themselves as they think fit. On Sunday arrived our Spanish Letters, which gave an account, that his Catholick Majesty had met the Queen his Mother at Auranches, and from thence had conducted her to Madrid, where a separate Court is preparing for her, and that the 20th of this Month, the King intended to go and meet his Queen.

Erussels, Octob. 31. We are told that some overtures have been made to the Duke of Newburg, concerning his taking upon him the Government of thest Provinces. Don Pedro de Ronquillo has received orders to hasten into England. And Don Bernardo de Salinas is going Envoy Extraordinary to the King of Denmark. His Excellency has sent a Gentleman to Paris, to acquaint the French King, that he has nominated the President Symm ard Monfeur Vaux o be his Commissioners for the adjusting the simils between the Spanish and French Territories, and that they shall part hence the 4th of the next Month, to meet the French Commission rs at Courtray. Three days since the Dutche's of Modena arrived here from Evolland, the will make but a thort stay, intending very

fuddenly for Italy.

Hayne, Ottob. 31. The Most Christian Ki g, to gratific these people has taken off the extraordinary impelition which lay upon their Trade in France, reducing it to what it was in former. times. The Sieur d'Amerongen is sill at Unecht, where he is taking his leave of the States of that Province, in order to his journey to the Elector of Brandenlug's Court. The Prince continues still at Soeldake, where there is a gr at confluence of people that refort thither about bunnels. This Evening Mr. Sidney goes thither to take his leave of their Highnetics, and will Embaik for England about the latter end of this Week. We were in hopes here that the French would have quitted Wesel, but instead of that, the Marquis de aounds, the Governor, has Orders to pr pare winter quarters for a greater number of Ferces, forhat there will be no 1. s than 10000 men in those parts all this Winter, which people here do not like, b. lieving the Delign of it is to awe this State.

Hague, Nov. 3. There being no very urgent aff irs here at present, and the Prince of Orange being willing to continue his Divertisements in tre Country, the meeting of the States of Holland is put off from the 14 to the 21 instant. The I reach are not only making preparations at Wefel for the quartering a great number of Sculdiers there this Winter, but are likewise providing great Magazines at Liege. The Duke of Monmouth is gone from Enckuysen for Frizeland. The arrival of all our East-Ind.a Ships has made the Actions of that Conjuny rife from 400 to 450. A great bleet of Merchant Ships is likewise arrived in the Texel from the Streights. The Letters from Germany say, that there had happened a great Fire at Vlenna, which had destroyed the Emperors Palace and half the Town.

Paris, Odob. 28. Great preparations are making at the Louvre for the entertainment of the Court, which it's said will pass part of the Win er here, on the occasion of the Dauphins Marriage, which every body believes to be concluded. On Wednelday last Mont eur le Grand and the Duke of Grament were by the Kings Order, sent Prisoners to the Bastile, upon a quarrel they had, but it appearing to have been wholly accidental, without any premeditation, and that there had not passed any Challenge between them, they were releated agein the rext day, which was so ordered, that as they passed the Greue, they saw two men hang there, for having fought a Duel. Our Letters from the North lay, That the King of Denmark had accepted our Kings Mediation, and that there

Whitehall, October 24. Complaint having been made to His Majesty in Council of great 'disturbances that have happened in the Burrough of Saitain at and fince the Election of their tate Major Alr. Stephens, by a Rabble of unjusorn Inhabitants of the said Burrough, having no Right of Election, who being stirred up and encouraged by some Gentlemen of that Country, did in a Riotcus and Mutinous manner proceed to the choice of one Skelton to be Mayor, & person uncapable thereof, being discharged from the Office. of Alderman for not taking the Ouths prescribed in the All For Regulating Corporations; to whom, to colour his Usurpation, they without any Authority Administred the said Oaths, by means whereof His Majesties Peace was disturbed, and the Government of the said Town in great Confusion. And several Affidavits baving been read, making good what was aliedged by the Cemplamants, His Majesty was pleased to order that the said Gentlemen should be summoned to appear at the Board on Wednesday the third of December next, and that several of the Inhabitants who have been notorious Promoters of and Actors in the oforesaid Tumults and Riots, be taken into Custedy, to Answer the Premises; Hu Majesty declaring that He was well satisfied and doth take in good part the care which the said Mr. Stephens, Mr. Kellway, Mr. Tyocke, and other Aldermen, Burgesses and Inhabitants of the said Surrough have shewed to preserve the publick Peace in this great disorder.

Whitehall, Oft. 29.
