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Whitehall, Novemb. 1.

**H**IS Majesty has been pleased to cause His Royal Proclamation to be Issued, For the more effectual and speedy Discovery and Prosecution of the Popish Plot.

CHARLES R.

**W**hereas the late Horrid Plot and Conspiracy of divers Priests and Jesuites, and other Papists, against His Majesties Sacred Person, and for the Subversion of the Protestant Religion and Government Established in this Kingdom, hath been so far Disccovered, that the sad Effects thereof have by His Majesties Care, and the Blessing of Almighty God, been hitherto prevented, and the most notorious Offenders therein, brought to Conduign Punishment, or are Secured, or fled from Justice; And His Majesty considering that nothing would more conduce to the lasting Safety of His Majesty, His Kingdoms, and the Protestant Religion therein Established, then that there might be a full and perfect Discovery of the said Conspiracy; And whereas it is to be suspected that many persons contrary to the Duty of their Allegiance, do still conceal their knowledge of the said Plot, and the Conspirators therein, presuming that at any time hereafter (though never so late) when they shall offer a Discovery, they may obtain His Majesties Pardon for all their Offences: Now for the more speedy and full Discovery of the said Conspiracy, and to Deter all persons whatsoever from Concealing any longer their knowledge thereof, His Majesty doth by this His Royal Proclamation (with the Advice of His Privy Council) stidly Require and Command all and every person and persons whatsoever, who know, or can make Discovery of any person or persons engaged in the said Conspiracy, or of any Matter or Circumstance relating thereunto, to Discover and make known the same to the Lords of His Majesties Privy Council, or one of His Principal Secretaries of State, or to the Lord Chief Justice, or one of the Justices of the Court of Kings Bench, before the last day of February next, His Majesty declaring That after that time His Pardon is not to be expected for any such Treasons or Misprisions of Treason.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the One and thirtieth day of October 1679. in the One and thirtieth Year of Our Reign.

Lisbon, Octob. 19. The Marriage between the Infanta and the Duke of Savoy being declared, the 6th Instant the publick Ministers and all the Nobility complimented the Prince Regent, the Queen, and the Infanta, upon it, and the three nights following, by order, Lights were hung out at every Window of all the Houses in the City, the Guns of all the Castles, Forts, and Ships, as well Strangers as Portugals, were fired thrice, the Ships be-

ing gloriously set out with Lights. The French Envoy to make a greater demonstration of his Masters satisfaction in this Marriage, entertained the Court on the third night with Fireworks on the Water. The Sunday following all the paid Soldiers and Trained-bands both Horse and Foot were drawn up in Battalia in the Place before the Palace, the Marquis de Fronteira being General, who was attended by many Reformed Officers, with a great deal of gallantry.

Copenhagen, Octob. 28. This day Elsenburg was restored to the Suedes. The 30 instant the like will be done with Landskron, and so with the other places that are by the Peace to be given back to the Suedes.

Hamburg, Octob. 26. The Mediators returned hither the last night with this account; That the King desists at present from requiring Homage, the decision of which Point he will refer to the Imperial Chamber, or to a Treaty; which shall be without prejudicing his Pretensions, or the Liberties and Immunities of this City; in the mean time, that he will expect a solemn Compliment from these Magistrates; and 500 thousand Crowns in Money.

Hamburg, Octob. 31. On Sunday last the Mediators went back to the Danish Camp with the answer of these Magistrates, who we hear have agreed to the Kings last Proposals, except that concerning the 500 thousand Crowns, instead whereof they offered 100 thousand, as the most they could do, Yesterday the Mediators returned hither again, with an abatement of the sum to 350 thousand Crowns, upon which the Council of 60 have been assembled to resolve what to do. It's believed they will not be brought to consent to that sum, though possibly they may come up to 200 thousand, if the King will relinquish the Pretension he has on this City for Winter-quarters, restore their Ships, promise their Commerce shall for the future be unmolested, and that Homage shall be no more mentioned by him or his Heirs till it be decided by the Imperial Chamber, or a Treaty. Count Anthony of Oldenburg, and Marshal Corbius are come hither this day in quality of the Kings Commissioners, to endeavor to adjust the Points in difference, of which we shall in few days see the issue. Sir P. Wycke, His Majesty of Great Britains Resident here, has been to wait upon the King of Denmark, and has obtained a discharge of the English ships stoop at Guekfiadt.

Hamburg Nov. 3. The Burghers of this City will not be brought to give the King of Denmark more then 150000 Crowns. Yesterday the Imperial Resident delivered a Letter to the Senate from the Emperor, wherein his Imperial Majesty promises them his assistance; while they consent to nothing derogatory to his and the Empires Interests, and to their immediate dependency on the Empire; and requires them to put a Clause into the

the Agreement they should make with the King of Denmark, That it must be approved by the Emperor and the States of the Empire; which the Senate has accordingly resolved to do, though it be likely to breed a new difficulty. The King of Denmark has made a second Review of his Army, which consists of 20000 Horse and Foot. The illness which begins very much to incommode them, Yesterday another Vessel belonging to this place richly laden from Archangel was stopt at *Gluckstadt*, which is the fourth or fifth that is detained there.

*Hague, Nov. 7.* The Prince of Orange is gone to *Dieren* to keep the Feast of *St. Hubert*; and the Princess has been incognito at *Amsterdam*, where she lodged in the house of one of the Burgermasters. The Affairs of *Hamburg* will doubtless be accommodated by the means of Money, notwithstanding the Emperor has by his Letters to that City commanded it not to comply with the King of Denmark even in this point of Money, and has promised to assist it in such things come to extremity; but the Hamburgers have no great reliance thereupon, and in the mean time suffer very much by the interruption of their Commerce, for the King of Denmark seems resolved not to be over hasty in a matter wherein he finds so many Princes concern themselves.

*Ferisy, Octob. 17.* Here is arrived a small Vessel of this Island, where *Jean le Grot* is Master, who in his Voyage hither from *Biscaye*, about 50 Leagues from this Island, saw a great Ship sink, the men in her all perishing, except 28, which he took up, and has brought hither: they give an account that the said Ship was a French Man of War, called the *Conqueror*, mounted with 74 Guns, and 500 Men, that they came with some other Ships from *Lisbon*, and were bound for *Brest*.

*Plimouth, Octob. 24.* There are now in this Port about 15 or 16 Sail of Merchant Ships outward bound; and the *Swallow of London*, *Evan Sire* Master, bound home from *Guinea*. By a French Vessel come from the *Canaries*, and put into *Eastmouth* we have an account, that they have had there a most plentiful Vintage, so that they can hardly get Cask enough for their Wine, which is so scarce that it is worth forty shillings a Pipe.

*Swansey, Octob. 27.* We have had of late great Floods and Rains, and the highest Spring Tides that have been known in these parts in the memory of the oldest man living, which have done much damage to several persons, both in drowning their Lands and Cattle. We have advice from *Milford* that the *Garland* Frigate is there bound for *Bristol*; and that there is likewise in that Haven a *Barbadoes* Man (whose name we do not hear) bound home.

*Yarmouth, Octob. 29.* The weather has proved so temp'rous this Fishing season, that this Town is like to suffer very much by it. Several Ships have sustained great damage, and we fear we shall hear of many lost, for very much Wreck is floating upon this Coast. Two or three days since a great Flyboat was put ashore near this Town and lost. The last night was cast away upon these Sands a small Pink, but the men saved. The last night likewise about midnight came upon our Sands a Ship of between 20 and 30 Guns; about 7 or 8 men saved themselves upon Pieces of the Wreck, and about 30 others are said to be lost; she was a Dutch Ship laden with Stockfish, and designed to

fill up with Red Herrings here, and so to go for the *Streights*.

*Deale, Octob. 30.* There are now in the Downs the *Happy Return*, the *Assistance*, the *Swallow*, the *Oxford*, the *Adventure*, the *Normich*, and the *Soldados*. The Merchant Ships, of which there is a very great Fleet outward bound, cannot yet stir.

*Huntington, Oct. 30.* On Tuesday night their Royal Highnesses lay at *Biggleswade*, where the Earl of *Ailesbury*, with a great many Gentlemen of Quality were to pay their Respects to them. Yesterday in the evening their Royal Highnesses came hither, they were met about five miles from hence by most of the Gentlemen of the County, were received here with the ringing of Bells, and making a Bonfire in the midst of the Market place, were complimented by the Mayor and Aldermen, and most nobly entertained, with all the Nobility and Gentry that attended them, by Sir *Leo. Walden*, at whose House they lay, and brake their Fast this morning, after which they departed for *Stanford*, where their Royal Highnesses will lie this night, to morrow at *Grantam*, and on Saturday at *Newark*.

*Whitehall, Nov. 2.* Mr. Thomas Dangerfield, alias Willoughby having been Examined the 27th past by the Lords of His Majesty's Privy Council, concerning certain Dangerous and Treasonable Papers, seized in Colonel Rodricke Mansell's Chamber, which it appeared to their Lordships had been by him conveyed thither, was thereupon, by order of the Board, committed to Newgate; and having since given in an Information to the Lord Mayor of London of several Treasonable Practices against His Majesty's Person and Government, and of his having been prevailed with by several of the Popish Religion, to counterfeit the above-mentioned, and other Letters and Papers, by which divers Noblemen and other Protestants, were to have been brought under a suspicion of carrying on a Plot against His Majesty's Government; and the said Information being yesterday morning brought to His Majesty by the Lord Mayor, and by His Majesty sent to the Council Board, Mr. Dangerfield was sent for, and farther examined by their Lordships, who thereupon the last night committed the Earl of Castlemain to the Tower, and Mrs. Celier to Newgate; and did this day likewise commit Mr. Gadbury to the Gatehouse, and Mr. Rigaut to Newgate; several other persons accused, being in the Custody of His Majesty's Messengers; and their Lordships have appointed the farther Examination of this matter on Tuesday next.
