Whitehall, Novemb. 6.

HIS Majesty has thought fit by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 24 of September last past, with the advice of his Privy Council, to Declare, That His Majesty has by his Letters Patents, Dated the 9 of December 1678, appointed *Anthony Row*, *Nabanael Johnson*, *Conrad Bradshaw*, *Robert Noris*, and *Thomas Duke of London* Esquires, to be Collectors of His Majesties Revenue arising by Fire-Hearths and Stoves as shall become due at and after *Michelmas* 1679 for the term of 5 years to be computed from Lady-day 1679; And that therefore His Majesties Will and Pleasure is, that His said Revenue, due at and after *Michelmas* 1679, during the said Term of 5 years, shall be Collected by the Persons above mentioned, their Deputies, Agents, and Substitutes: And that all Arrears of the said Revenue due at or before Lady day last past be Collected by *John Pory* and *Edward Buckley* Esqrs; surviving Farmers of the said Revenue, pursuant to His Majesties Letters Patents to them. And His Majesty doth strictly require; all Justices of the Peace, chief Magistrates, Headboroughs, Constables, and all other Officers to be aiding and assisting to the persons abovementioned, their Deputies, Agents and Substitutes, in the Collecting the said Revenue and the Arrears thereof. And His Majesty doth command all his Subjects to permit and suffer his said Collectors, their Deputies, Agents or Substitutes, according to the Acts of Parliament in that behalf made, time to time to enter and make perfect surveys for the numbering all Fire-Hearths and Stoves within each County, City and Place in *England*, *Wales*, and *Berwick* upon *Tweed*, and in case of any refusal, His Majesties Officers abovementioned are required to be aiding and assisting to them, that such Views and Surveys may be duly and thoroughly made. And His Majesty doth farther require that all illegal and undue Certificates be forthwith Discharged, to the end no person may thereby pretend to be exempted from the said Duty, which he ought to pay by Law. And that all Persons that shall oppose or injure the said Collectors or any of their Officers in the due execution of the said Acts of Parliament, be punished according to Law.

Warsaw, Oct. 20. *Hanenko*, who designed to have betrayed our Army to the *Tartars*, has been tried by a Council of War here, and Sentenced to have a Stake run through his body, and so fixed to the Earth, and in that miserable condition he is to continue till he dye. Our Ambassadors continue still at *Moscow*, but we cannot say what success the Treaty they have in hand will have.

Danzick, Nov. 1. The Treaty between the Turks and the *Moscovites* is broken off, which without doubt will advance that depending between *Poland* and *Moscow*. The King of *Poland* has appointed a Dyet to be held the 8th of *January* at *Warsaw*, by which time the Ambassadors now at *Moscow* will be returned, and able to give an account of the Sentiments that Court is in with relation either to Peace or War. Here are great differences among the Inhabitants of this City, which give very much disturbance to Trade.

Genoua, Nov. 1. The *Centurion*, *Nonsuch*, and other Ships which are impatiently expected from *Cadiz* do not yet appear. The Senate has not yet resolved what Answer to return to the Demand

of the Most Christian King concerning his Galley Wintering here. The Spanish Gallies under the Command of Duke *Doria* are at *Barcelona* in their return from *Cadiz*, and are expected here.

Marseilles Nov. 7. The *Greenwich* Frigate, with several Merchant Ships under her Convoy, bound for *Genoua*, *Legborne*, *Venice*, and other parts of *Italy*, arrived two or three days since at the Isles of *Eris*, where it's supposed they are still detained by contrary Winds. The *Turkey Merchant*, Captain *Twaites* Commander, from *London*, and a small Vessel of *Bristol*, who came with this Convoy, arrived here yesterday Morning. The 8 French Gallies, designed for *Genoua*, put to Sea yesterday, but were the same day forced back again by the ill Weather. Six Men of War and two Fire-Ships are fitting out at *Theodon*, who are to go for *Tripoli* to make a Peace with those Corsairs, or else to commit what Hostilities they can upon them.

Prague, Oct. 28. The Emperor has sent young Count *Lobcowits* to the Elector of *Bavaria*, to propose, as is said, a Marriage between him and the Arch-Duchess, of *Austria* the Emperors Daughter. There is still a discourse of the Emperors going to reside at *Ratisbonne*.

Ratisbonne, Nov. 2. From *Bavaria* we have advice that that Elector is going to reduce his Forces to 7000 Foot and 1000 Horse.

Stralsfond, Nov. 3. We have just now advice that 6 Suedes Men of War are come in with 6 oldiers to *Garison* the places that are to be restored to that Crown.

Stralsfond, Nov. 7. Yesterday Count *Coxingmark* landed with two thousand Suedes on the Isle of *Rugen*, of which our Governor sent immediately an Express to *Berlin*, to give the Elector an account, and to desire his orders concerning the delivering thsi place to his Excellency.

Codenhagen, Nov. 4. On Tuesday last *Landf. roon* was delivered up to Lieutenant General *Sperling*, who was commissioned by the King of *Sueden* to receive the same. The same day *Elfenburg* was likewise evacuated. The Sieur *Eusckovius* is come hither on the part of the King of *Sueden* to adjust matters concerning the releasement of the Swedish Prisoners that are here.

Hamburg, Nov. 10. The last night was finally concluded and signed at the House of the Sieur *Bidal*, the French Resident, the agreement between the King of *Denmark* and this City, by which the latter promises to pay His Majesty 220000 Crowns at 4 Terms, in Consideration whereof the Ships Ropt at *Gluckstadt* are to be immediately releas'd, and the Subjects and Inhabitants of this City to be undisturbed in their Trade and Commerce for the future. To morrow our Deputies go to wait upon the King at his Quarters at *Pinaenburg*, to confirm the said agreement, to thank him for it, and to assure him of the Respects of this City:
