

In a day or two the Danish Army will decamp, and the King return to *Copenhagen*.

*Hamburg, Nov. 11.* At length, God be thanked, matters are agreed between the King of *Denmark* and this City, which latter is to pay his Majesty 20000 Crowns, 10000 to the Queen, and 10000 to Prince *George*, the Kings Liothor. This Accord is called an *Interims Receis*, because it leaves both Parties in the same Rights they had before. The Danish Army decamps to morrow or next day, and is to march to *Hensburg*, where will be held a general Rendezvous, and several Troops will be disbanded and the rest sent into Winter Quarters.

*Cologne, Nov. 10.* It appears every day more and more that the French Troops intend to Winter in these parts. They have now again commanded the Inhabitants to send Straw, Hay, Oats, and Wood to the several places where they quarter; and we are told that the several Gari ons they have at present in this Diocesis and the Country of *Fuliers* will be reinforced.

*Brussels, Nov. 10.* The Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, having settled in the several Provinces the matter of the Subsidies to be paid by them for the maintaining the Army it's thought necessary to keep constantly on foot for the defence of these Countries; the Officers have now received orders to raise the men, which they are allowed a certain time to do. The Commissioners which his Excellency is to send to *Courtray*, to meet there with those of the French King, for the adjusting the Limits, are not as yet parted from hence, though it was said their first meeting ought to have been on the 8th instant. The Letters we receive from the *Rhine* give us an account that the French, who are now in the Diocesis of *Cologne*, the Duchy of *Fuliers*, &c. intend to Winter there, and that they are making provisions accordingly. Last night arrived here an Express with News that the Baron of *Ingelheim* was chosen Archbishop and Elector of *Menz*, who having formerly received some disobligation from the Imperialists, will it's imagined by some, incline to the French Interest. We are here with great impatience expecting to know who is to be our present Governors Successor, for the time of his Government is near expiring; The Duke of *Newburg* and the Prince of *Parma* are most spoken of, and most people are of opinion it will be the latter, who is assisted in his pretention by the Queen Mother.

*Amsterdam, Nov. 10.* Here is much discourse of what happened some days since in *Zealand*, where an eminent Merchant was, while he was at Church, robbed by his three Sons of money and other things to a great value which having done they fled; but the Magistrates having sent in pursuit of them, the Eldest, being first much wounded, was taken, and the other two escaped. Our Letters from *Hamburg* give an account that that City has finally accommodated matters with the King of *Denmark* they paying him 220000 Crowns at 4 payments: As for the Kings pretention of Homage, this agreement leaves him the same Right to it he had before, which if he please he may pursue before the Imperial Chamber of *Spire*.

*Lague, Nov. 10.* The French Ambassador has presented a Memorial to the States General in which he demands the release of a Ship taken by the *Zealanders* a little after the conclusion of the Peace. The States have resolved to gratifie his

Excellency therein, and have sent orders to the Admiralty of *Zealand* to that purpose. The Resident of the Dukes of *Lunesburg* has represented to the States, That his Masters, in case they should be attacked for their adhering so firmly to the City of *Hamburg*, in this conjuncture, expects the States will assist them, pursuant to the Treaty between them. The Elector of *Brandenburg* we hear carries all the Cannon and Ammunition out of the places he is to restore to the *Suedes*, and the French it seems intend to do the like at *Wejel* and other places in those parts. The Chapter of *Menz* has chosen the Baron of *Ingelheim* to be their Archbishop, a person very much esteemed by all.

*Paris, Nov. 11.* From *Brest* we have an account of the loss of two great Men of War, one Squadron commanded by the Chevalier de *Esfourville*, who were coming home from *Lisbon*; There were on Board them above 50 Gentlemen of Quality, and above 800 Seamen, who were all drowned; a third was in great danger, having sprung a leak, but she got into Port. The 8th instant the Deputies of the City of *Strasbourg* took their leave of the King, who assured them that he had not any Design to attack their City, but wished them to agree amicably the matters between them and their Bishop. Our Letters from *Hamburg* say, That it was not doubted but an agreement would be made in few days between the King of *Denmark* and that City, and that the French Minister had assured the latter of the protection of the King his Master. The 26th the Queen of *Spain* arrived at *Bayonne*, and on the twentieth the King her Husband parted from *Madrid*, intending to advance, with his whole Household, as far as *Vitoria*, in *Biscay*, and from thence to come privately, attended only with 4 or 5 Grantees, to Iron on the Frontiers, to see his Queen there.

*Plimouth, Nov. 4.* Yesterday came into this Port the *Adventure* Frigate, bound for the *Streights*; and the *Narwich*, for the *Canaries*, with part of the Fleet of Merchant Ships under their respective Convoys, the rest remaining as yet behind, the Wind at N. W.

*Doncaster, Nov. 5.* On Monday their Royal Highnesses came from *Newark* to *Welbeck*, where they were very kindly and splendidly treated by the Duke of *Newcastle*. On the Borders of this County their Royal Highnesses were met by the High Sheriff, several Noblemen and Gentlemen of Quality, making a Body of above 200 Horse. This night their Royal Highnesses lodge at *Pemfret*, and to morrow hope to reach *Tork*.

*Whitehal, Nov. 7.* This afternoon *Thomas Curtis*, *Margaret Jenkins* and *Neville alias Paice*, were examined before his Majesty in Council, upon those parts of *Mr. Dangerfields Information*, wherein they are named; They acknowledged several Circumstantial matters, which strengthen his Evidence. Then *Mr. Dangerfield* declaring he had no farther Information to give against any Person, and praying he might have the liberty of the Prison, his Majesty was pleased to Order *Capt. Richardson* to allow it him.

His Majesty has been graciously pleased to grant His Pardon to *Mr. Serejant a Secular Priest*, who by his Majesties Command came lately over from *Holland*.

*Whitehal, Nov. 9.* His Majesty has likewise been pleased to grant *Mr. Dangerfield* his Pardon.
