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Prague, Nov. 1.

**C**ount Lobcowitz, whom the Emperor is sending to the Court of Bavaria, will be dispatched in a day or two. It is said he will propose a Marriage between the Elector and the Emperors Daughter, or at least endeavor to prevent that Electors marrying with a French Lady. What was said of Chancellor Smidt, and other of the Electors Officers who are lookt upon to be favourers of the French Interests, being disgraced, is not confirmed.

Prague, Nov. 4. This Court is much alarmed at the news a Courier sent by the Duke of Lorraine brought them, which is, that the French demand 700 thousand Florins of the Country of Brisgaw, four whereof they pretend to be due before the Peace, and three since; a Sum that Country is in its present ruin'd condition altogether unable to pay. We are told that the Emperor has resolv'd in the present posture of affairs, not to intermeddle in this matter, and to leave the Country to make the best composition it can; but in the mean time most people are of opinion that if the French proceed after this manner the Peace cannot last long.

Ratisbonne, Nov. 7. On Friday last arrived here the Marquis de Vitry Envoy Extraordinary from the Most Christian King to the Emperor, and the next day continued his journey, intending to pass through Bavaria. The same day came thither Count Lobcowitz, from Prague, who understanding that Monsieur Colbert the French Ambassador was arrived at Muncken, the Elector of Bavaria's Court, immediately hasten'd his journey thither.

Frankfort, Novemb. 8. Yesterday the Chapter of Mentz made choice of the Baron of Ingelheim to be their Archbishop and Elector. The same day the Prince of Furstemberg parted hence for Mentz.

Hamburg, Nov. 12. By the Interims Reces between the King of Denmark and this City, it is agreed,

I. That his Majesty and this City shall remain unprejudiced in their severall Rights and Pretensions; and that the Point of Homage shall be amicably determined, by Treaty, or by an ordinary Process before the Chamber of Spire; and that in the mean time this City shall enjoy a Neutrality and free Commerce as formerly.

II. That this City with a thankful Acknowledgement of His Majesties good Will towards them, shall remain in an humble devotion towards him, and shall to the utmost of their power further his good, and prevent any evil they know likely to happen to him.

III. That for greater manifestation of this their Devotion, this City shall send a formal Deputation to his Majesty.

IV. That this City, in consideration of his Majesties being pleased to receive them again into his favour, shall pay him 220000 Crowns at four Terms, the first Payment to be made immediately after the Ratifying the

Reces; the second within six Months after; and the third, and last at the end of the other six Months.

V. That his Majesty shall quit all his Pretensions upon any Lands, which this City at present holds, in particular or in common with the City of Lubeck; shall release the Ships stop'd at Gluckstadt, and shall raise this Reces within eight days.

Hamburg, Nov. 14. On Saturday last the Deputies of this City were to wait upon the King at his quarters at Pirnenberg, and being admitted to Audience, spake to him in the following words,

Most Serene, and Most Potent King, Most Gracious Lord.

**W**HEREAS your Royal Majesty is by the Mercy of God, happily arriv'd in these your Dukedom, and consequently in the Neighborhood of this City of Hamburg, and hath caused Proposals, consisting in three Points, to be made to the said City, and hath desired their Resolution thereupon: And whereas the first Point, through the shortness of the time, and for other Reasons, could not be determin'd at present; and that your Majesty hath therefore been graciously pleas'd to refer the same to an amicable Agreement, or to a legal Determination; and in the mean time to remove the displeasure you had taken against the said City; and by an Interims Reces graciously to agree, That as well the Rights and Pretensions of your Majesty, as of the said City, shall remain unprejudic'd; The Burghermasters, and Raodts Deputies, do in the name of themselves, and of all the Burghers, appear before your Majesty, and do promise faithfully to observe the said Interims Reces in all its Points and Clauses; and particularly to bear your Majesty most humble and becoming Devotion; That to the utmost of their power, they will further your Majesties Good, and hinder all ill and detrim't from happening to your Majesty. Pray'd this City be left in a quiet and undisturbed enjoyment of their Neutrality and Commerce, and of all their Rights and Priviledges; and that the Rights of his Imperial Majesty and the Empire be maintained.

To which the King return'd a very kind Answer; Assur'd them of his good Will; and that he would punctually observe on his part this Agreement. After which the Deputies were treated at Supper by the Court-Marshal, and so return'd hither. This day our Magistrates made a noble entertainment for the Mediators; and Sunday next is appointed for a Thanksgiving day. The Danish Army is march'd towards Flensberg, where will be held a general Rendezvous.

Hamburg, Nov. 14. The Danish Army is gone into Winter-quarters, without talk of disbanding any, except some Officers, and making the Dragoons Musketeers. Some report that new Regiments are to be rais'd in the Spring, and that the King has some further designs in his thoughts. The Deputies of this City when they were to wait upon the King, presented him with a Band of his City

had of the King his Father for 4000 Crowns. The Duke of *Holslein* remains still here, not having taken any notice of the King of *Denmark* during the whole time of his being in this Neighborhood; which it's said that King takes ill, and that therefore he has not yet restored him his Counties.

*Strasburg*, Nov. 10. The French have lately changed their Garisons in *Lutzelslein*, *Lichtenberg*, and *Dachsburg*; and it's said they intend to quit and raze the two latter; While they work every day harder and harder on the Fortifications of *Hunwigen*, *Schlestadt*, *Bitsch*, and *Homburg*, and receive great Sums of Money from *France* for the encouragement of that Work. Several persons of quality have lately passed through this City on their way from *France* to the Court of *Bavaria*, where the Marriage between the Dauphin and that Electors Sister is treating, and as every body believes is as good as concluded. The French that pass through here say, the Dauphin will come as far as *Nancy* to meet his Brother, and that he will reside there, the King giving him the Government of *Lorraine*, *Alsace* and *Burgundy*.

*Brussels*, Nov. 14. The States of *Brabant* cannot hitherto be prevailed with to grant the 1200 thousand Florins which his Excellency has demanded of them, and it's said they defer taking a final Resolution therein till they see whether any supplies come from *Spain*, without which, they think the Monies these Provinces can raise will signify little. The Letters from *Liege* give a large description of the misery of that Country, that many Villages are wholly deserted of Inhabitants, and that more will be, in case the French winter there, as according to all appearance their intention is; at the same time the Elector of *Cologne* has sent some of his Guards to quarter in the District of *Franchimont*, to oblige those Inhabitants to pay the Arrears of Contributions due to the Imperialists, which his Electoral Highness was forced to make good to them before they quitted *Bonne*. From *Cologne* they write, that the French are so far from leaving that Diocess, that they have summoned the Inhabitants to bring in to their several Garisons, which they augment daily, great quantities of Forage and Wood. Monsieur *Colbert* the French Ambassador is arrived at the Court of *Bavaria*, whither the Emperor has likewise sent Count *Lobcowitz*; we shall quickly see which of the two will be the most successful, though people here generally believe the French Interests will prevail, and that the Marriage between the Dauphin and the Princess of *Bavaria* will be concluded.

*Hague*, Nov. 17. The States of *Holland* are now summoned to meet on the 22<sup>d</sup> instant, against which time the Prince of *Orange* is expected here. The Duke of *Monmouth* has spent several days with his Highness at *Dierich* and at *Soestdike*, and when his Highness comes hither, his Grace goes back to *Utrecht*. The Actions of the *East India* Company, which within these few days fell from 350 to 330, are now come up again to 335. The French give out that at the meeting of the States of *Holland* an Alliance between this State and *France* will be proposed, which a few days will show.

*Plymouth*, Nov. 21 Yesterday His Majesties Ship the *Swallow*, Captain *Fowler* Commander, came into this Port with the rest of the Merchant Ships

bound for the *Canaries* and other parts, who are now expecting a fair wind to pursue their several Voyages.

*Plymouth*, Nov. 9. This evening the Fleet of Merchant Ships that was here, consisting in above 100 sail, put to Sea with their Couvoy, the Wind being very fair.

*Tork*, Nov. 8. On Thursday in the evening their Royal Highnesses came hither, having been received at their entering into this County by the High-Sheriff, and many of the Nobility and other persons of quality, and met by several others on the Road. Four miles from hence our Sheriffs met their Royal Highnesses, and waited upon them hither. Upon their arrival they were saluted with 21 great Guns from the Castle; the Trained Bands were in Arms to pay their respects to them; and our Lord Mayor was to wait upon their Royal Highnesses at their Lodging. This day our Archbishop has invited his Royal Highness to Dinner, (his House being three miles from hence) whither a great many persons of quality are preparing to attend him. On Monday their Royal Highnesses part hence again; will lie that night at *Rippon*, on Tuesday at *Richmond*, and on Wednesday at *Durham*.

*London*, Nov. 10. There are Letters from the *Canaries* dated the 28 of *September*, which wholly contradict the Report of the Matter of a Vessel put lately into *Fa-mouth*, concerning the plentiful Vintage he said they had there; and on the contrary assure us, that the Vintage would in all probability be very late, and not begun till the latter end of *October*, and that it was the general belief there would not be so much Wine made this year by a fourth part as was the last.

*Whitehall*, Nov. 10. The last week the Marquis *d'Aranches* Ambassador Extraordinary from the *Crown of Portugal*, had Audience of their Majesties, whom his Excellency acquainted in the name of the Prince Regent and Queen of *Portugal* with the Marriage concluded between the Duke of *Savoy* and the Infanta of *Portugal*.
