

*Saint Jean de Luz, Nov. 5.* The instant the Queen of Spain came to a house prepared for her near the River *Bidasoa*, which separates *France* and *Spain*; there the Marquis d'Alborge, her Mayor, waited on her; at his first Audience the Queen commanded him to be covered, as Gracee of *Spain*, as likewise the Prince of *Barcourt*, who, after some Compliments had passed between him and the Marquis, committed the Queen to his care, a formal Act having been first read to that purpose in French and Spanish. The same day the Queen parted from thence, and on this side of the River found the Dutches of *Terranova* her Camara Mayor, who having kissed her Majesties hand, presented to her several Spanish Ladies. Having passed the River, at Iron her Majesty found all the Officers of her Household, from whence she parted yesterday for *Vitoria*, where the King expects her.

*Copenhagen, Nov. 10.* The affairs of *Hamburg* being accommodated, we are expecting our King back here in few days. The King of *Sueden* is still in *Schonen*; he has sent the Baron *Wachmester* to compliment the Queen Mother and the Princess *Elenor*, upon the Peace, which strengthens the opinion most people have that the Marriage between that King and the Princess will have its effect.

*Paris, Nov. 18.* It is the discourse of the Court that the King intends to take a journey for *Lorraine*, some say farther, but the time of it is not yet fixed. The Marriage of the Dauphin begins to be spoken of with some uncertainty, for if the Marriage proposed between the Elector of *Bavaria* and Mademoiselle de *Valois*, the Queen of *Spain's* Sister, do not take effect, that between the Dauphin and that Electors Sister, it's believed, will not be gone on with; and it is said that the King has sent Monsieur de *St. Mesne*, to *Florence*, to propose a Marriage between the Dauphin and the Princess of *Tuscany*. We are very much afraid that we shall hear of the Loss of a third Man of War, which if true, will be but ill for the Intendants of the Marine, who are already sent for up, to give an account of several matters, which the King is dissatisfied with them about. On Thursday next the Prince de la *Roche-guyon*, and the Daughter of Monsieur de *Louvois* are to be married. The King gives the latter 100000 Crowns towards the making up her Portion, and has made the Prince her husband Duke and Peer of *France*.

*Paris, Nov. 22.* The King has removed Monsieur de *Pompe* from the place of Secretary of State, and on Saturday last Monsieur *Colbert* was sent by the King to acquaint him therewith. No body does yet certainly know the cause of this his disgrace, whatever it is, the King has given him a yearly Pension of 20000 Lixres, and 700000 Livres in ready money; and the President *Colbert*, who is now the Kings Ambassador at the Court of *Bavaria*, will succeed him in the place of Secretary of State. It is very confidently reported that the Treaty between the King and the Duke of *Mantoua*, concerning *Casal*, is finished, and that that place will very suddenly be put into the Kings hands. This day the Peace between this Crown, *Sueden*, *Denmark*, and *Brandenburg* was published here with the usual Solemnity, to morrow *Te Deum* will be sung at *Notre Dame* on this occasion.

*Plymouth Nov. 11.* Yesterday the *Adventure*, *Phoenix*, *Norwich*, with about 70 or 80 Merchant Ships

under their Convoy, sailed from hence to the Westward, but were the same day put back again by contrary Winds, and remain still here. This day arrived here His Majesties Ship the *Dartmouth*, having left the *Diamond* and *Ruby* Frigates twenty Leagues to the Westward of the *Lands-End* cruising.

*York, Nov. 12.* On Monday their Royal Highnesses parted hence, and lay that night at Sir *Richard Graham's* at *Norton-Conyers*.

*Durham, Nov. 11.* This day our Bishop and Lord Lieutenant set forward from hence to his Castle at *South-Aukland*, whence he intends (accompanied with the high Sheriff and Gentry of the Country in their Coaches, and with the County Troop) to set forward to morrow morning early for *Peirce-Bridge*, 14 miles distant from this place, there to attend the coming of their Royal Highnesses, and to wait upon them higher. Some Companies of the Militia are ordered to be in a readiness to lye the streets on both sides from the Suburbs of the City to the Castle Gates. His Lordship hath made great preparations for the entertainment of their Royal Highnesses during their stay here.

*Whitehall, Nov. 16.* His Majesty having, some weeks since given *Henry Sidney* Esq; His Envoy Extraordinary to the States General of the United Provinces, leave to come over upon some private affairs of his own, has commanded him now to return forthwith to his Residence at the *Hague*, and accordingly he goes from hence to morrow.
