Hamburg, Nov. 21. having in the name of his Mafter-demanded that a certain perfon, now an Inhabitant of this City, should be put into his hands, in order to his being fent to France, to be there punished for the Crimes he is charged with ; our Magistrates have put the faid perfon into Prifon, refolving not to deliver him up to the French Conful, without a particular Command from the States, but that Justice shall be done upon him here; he is acculed of having poyfoned feveral people. The States, to fecure the Peace lately made with Argiers, have ordered the feveral Admiraltics to confider of fome effectual way to hinder foreign Ships from paffing for Hollanders.

Hague, Nov. 25. Yesterday the States of Hol-land met, all they have yet done has been to nominate feveral perfons, to wit, three for each place that is vacant, of which the Prince of Orange is to choose him that is to have it. The Danish Envoy has given in a Memorial to the States General, wherein he acquaints them with the reconciliation between his Malter and the City of Hamburg, and fays, That that City had as a Mark of their fubmission, given his Master such a Sum of Money; which expression the Hamburg Relident here takes exception at. The Sieur Meinders the Elector of Brandenburgs late Minister at Paris, passed through this place the laft week, he was with the. Pentioner to follicite the payment of the Arrears of Subfidies due to his Mafter. Their Highneffes returned. hither laft Wednefday; and yefferday a great deputation from the States of' Holland, was with the Prince of Orange, from, 10 to 1r, who aftewards went to the Allembly of the faid States.

Hague, Nov. 28. The States of Holland have, not yet entred upon any matter of moment; it is thought they will fall upon the Militia, which they are defirous to reduce to a fmaller number, but many are of opinion that their flunding Force, which is at prefent 35000 men, ought by no means to be leffened. The Minister of the Elector of Colgne preff:s the States very earnelily to quit Mafeycke and Haffelt; but it's believed the States will first expect fome reparation for those Contributions which his Electoral Highnels exacted from their Subjects, without any pretence, during the War. The States feen refolved to pay the Princes of Lunenburg the Arrears of Subfidies due to them. But the Emperors Refident has not yet been able to obtain a fatisfactory Answer to his laft Memorial concerning the Arrears due to his Master, which we are told amount to about a Million Sterling. The Duke of Monmouth came hither on Sunday laft, intending to go and pals fume days at Cologne. It is faid his Grace means after his return, to refide for the most part in this Town. The French have quitted Aix la Chapelle.

In the Latitude of 38 the Portland took up a small Pink, of so Luns laden with, Fish from Newfoundland, having all her Sails abroad, but not one man in her, having, as is believed, been aban-doned by her Company, in the apprehention they may have had of fome Turks Man of War.

Deale. Nov. 21. Last night arrived in the Downes feven Merchant Ships from Smirna and Scandaroon with feveral others from the Streights. The Malaga Ships, did not flop in the Downes, but went directly on for the River.
