HE defensive Allyance between this Crown and Sueden was concluded the 7th of the laft Month at Lundun. By it is agreed, That in cale either King be attacked, the other fhall affift him with 2000 Horfe, 4000 Foot, and to Men of War, and thefe numbers to be doubled in cafe need require it. The General or Admiral of the King affifted fhall command. In all Fights the Auxiliary Troops fhall, as far as may be, be posted by themselves. Their Ports fhall be open to the Ships of both Crowns. And this Allyance thall laft ten years. From Sebonen we hear that the King of Sueden is gone for Calmar, And from Helmstadt comes a report that ten Dutch Merchant, Ships have been loft in the Katte-Gaut.

Stetin, Dec. 15. On Wednefday laft the Brandenburgs quitted this place, as they did likewife Dam, and the fame day Count Cosping/mark, Governor General of Pomeren, for the Kinglof Sueden, attived here, and was received by the Burghers in Arms, to whom his Excellency Ihewed great Civilities, highly commending them for the brave defence they made, and affuring them that the King of Sueden would, in due time, recompence their Services.

Aix la Chapelle, Dec. 15. This morning part of the French Troops that were in Garilon here marched from hence, and we are told that Monfieur Calvo will follow them in a day or two with the reft.

will follow them in a day or two with the reft. Bruffe's, Dec. 19. This morning we had our Spanish Letters, dated the 2 instant at Madrid, which give an account that their Majeflies arrived that day at Buen Retiro; that the Queen Mother had visited her Majefly the day before four Leagues from Madrid, and had måde her a Prelent of a very great value; that their Majeflies would not make their publick entry yet in fix Weeks, for which great preparations were making, that a supply of Goo thousand Crowns would be remitted hither by the next Ordinary, and that that would be followed by a Million more, to be paid in 10 Months, which gives great life to things here. There has been some about certain Taxes layd upon them by their Magistrates, whereupon his Excellency has fent thither Don Francifco de Velefco, their Governor, to endeavour to compofe matters.

yernor, to endeavour to compose matters. Bruffels, Dec. 22. The Letters from Spain affure us that we fhall have a new Governor in the Spring, fome fay that the Count de Monterey, our former Governor, may be the Person; others again speak of the Duke of Lorrain, and of the Duke of Newburg, but we may now in a flort time expect to be informed with more certainty. The Duke de Villa Hermosa will go, after the holidays, with his

Dutchefs and most of the Court, to Ghent, and will pass Tome short time there. Our Letters from Liege of the 20th tell us, That the French would quit Aix la Chapelle as yesterday, and Huy and Ferviers as this day. From Strasbourg they make great Complaints of the French, who not only go on in the rigorous exacting of Contributions, but have feized the Papers and Records belonging to several Princes and States of the Empire who have any Lands in Alfase, which have been kept above these 200 years at Croon-Wiffeny burg, and have carryed them to Metz. The Letters add that the French are making great Magazines in several places in Alface.

Hague, Dec. 22. The chief discourse here at prefent is concerning the propolal made, fome time fince, by the French Ambassador, of a defensive Allyance between the King his Mafter and this State, which he continues to prefs with much earnefinefs, and Mr. Jidney as vigoroufly to oppose. The States of Holland, fince their meeting, have refumed the debate of this important matter, which was much influenced by the letter from the Heer Leeuwent the Ambassador of this State in England, and the Memorial prefented by Mr. Sidney, which having been both read, the farther debate concerning the faid Allyance was let fail, only with this resolution, that the farther confideration of it should be referred to a Committee, with orders to find Copies of the faid Letter and Memorial to the feveral Provinces; fince which there has been no more notice taken of this great matter, which the French Ambaffador not being fatisfied with, he has been with the Pentioner Fagell to let him know that he expected a politive Answer in 15 days, and that accordingly his Mafler would take his Measures, which however it is believed the States will not comply with him in, and that if they do, their Answer will not be to his fatis-faction. This Morning we have advice of the death of Prince Maurice of Naffaw, Great Unkle to the Prince (f Orange; He was one of the Velt-Marfhalls-under his Highness, and Governor of Cleves for the Elector of Brandenburg, and dyed in his soth year. The East-India Company has made the Prince of Orange their usual Annual Prefent, to the value of 6000 Pounds flerl. Since these Rumors of an Allyance with France, the Actions of that Company have fallen, but at prefent, upon the appearance there is that the fame will not. take effect, they begin to rife again. Last Wednefday there was a very magnificent entertainment at the Heer Odyk's, for the Prince and all the Court with a Ball that lafted till five in the morning.

Whitehall Dec. 21. His Majesty, out of his continual care of the Protestant Religion, having thought fit to appoint a Committee of the Lords of His Privy Council to confider of the molt effectual means for putting the Laws in execution against he Papills, and for the suppression of Popery, and their Lordships having at feweral times met and reported their opinions, in this behalf, to His Majefty in Council, the Julices of the Peace of Middlefex and Westmirster have received Orders (in purivance of the late Proclamation against Papilis refding in or near London) to caule Lills to be forthwith taken of all Houfe-keepers, and efpecially fuch as let Lodgings within the Bills of Mortality, and of all Midwives, Apothecaries, and Phylicians that are Papi'ls or fulp cted to be fuch, and to return the Liffs to the Council Pourd for their effectual Profecu ion; And that no Papift may be harboured, or thought to receive Protection within any of His Majeffies houfes, a Commiffion is preparing for the Officers of the Green-Cloth to tender the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, and to offer the Tell unto all fuch Papifts and fulp ded Papills as shall be found in Whiteball and the Precinct thereof, who are theseupon to be proceeded against according to Law. And the Mcl'engers and Knight-Martial's men are ordered to feize and carry them before the faid Offi-cers. And a Reward of ten pounds is to be paid to the Difcoverer of any Papilt or fufpected Papift who shall be harboured in any of his Maj flies Houfes, and the Officer who harbours them shall be turned out of his place.

The Juffices of the Peace are likewife permitted to fearch Somerfet-Houfe, at any time in the Queens absence, as also St. Fames's, for Pricils and Papifts.

And that no Popills Reculant may expect any Favour or Connivance for their flaying in Town,

His Maj fly hath declared His resolution not to grant them any Difpendations or Licences to that effect.

And for the preventing the refort of all perfons to the Chappels of Ambaffadors and foreign Minifters of the Popifh Religion, except they be their Menial Servants, the Jultices of the Peace, are directed to impart the Lift of fuch Servants to the Constables and Beadles of their respective Parishes, who are, upon Sundays and Holychys, to feize all erfons who shall be found unduly reforting thither, that they be profecuted according to Law.

A Proclamation is likewife preparing to warn all His Majefties Subjects of the danger they incur by their being feduced to the Popifh Religion, and to encourage all Perfons to discover those that go about to feduce them, or are feduced to that Religion, as also fuch as are or have been bred in Popish Seminaries, and fuch others as shall fend any maintainance to them.

, And that no encouragement may be wanting in order to the Conviction of Papilts, a Privy Seal is paffing to enable all the Judges to reward according to their diferentions, all Perfons that shall profecute fuch Popifh Recufants before them, to be paid out of the Effates or Forfeitures of those who shall be convicted by their Profecutions.

And for fuch perfons as are already imprifoned any where, upon fulpition of being Popish Priess, it is further ordered that they be forthwith prefecuted to an Attainder.

And whereas the Lords of the Committee have recrived Copies of the Lifts of the Papifts and reputed Papifts of England and Wales, which had been loaged in the Houle of Commons by the Knights of the respective Shires, the Lord Chancellor is directed to caufe Committions to be prepared forthwith (in which the faid Lifts are to be inferted) impowering and requiring the Juffices of the Peace of each County to tender the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy to the perfons particularly named therein, and, upon their refulal, to proceed against them according to Law, in order to their speedy Conviction; which Commissions are to be accompanied not only by fpecial Instructions for the better direction of the faid Juffices herein, but also with Letters from the Council I oard, requiring and encouraging them diligently to execute the faid Committions, and to return an account of their proceedings in purfuance thereof, as allo to fend up the names of all others whom they shall know or suspect to be Papills, not mentioned in the faid Commission.

And the Lifts of fome Counties having been formerly withdrawn, or not delivered to the Clerk of the Houle of Commons, Letters are written from the Lords of the Council to the Knights of the Shires who ferved in Parliament at that time, to remit them to the Council Board, that thereupon Commissions may be prepared in like manner as is already directed in refrect of the other Courties.
