Rome, Decemb. 16:

HE roth inflant died here Cardinal Francis Barberin, Nephew to Pope Urban the VIII. in the 83 year of his Age, and the 56 of his Cardinalate; By his death feveral great Offices and referments are become void; in that of Dean of he Colledge of Cardinals, he is fucceeded by Carlinal Fachemett, and in others by his Nephew Carlinal Charles Barberin. There are now 18 places vatant in the Colledge of Cardinals.

Madrid, December 14. The 30 past their Majelies arrived at Guadalajara; and the next day came O Forrejon, the Queen Mother, who arrived there ome time before, went from her Apartment, to meet them; the King no sooner saw her, but he ran to her, embrac d her, and kissed her hand, the Queen dvancing at the same time likewise to kisher hand, which the Queen Mother would not permit, and embraced her with great tenderness, treating her with the Stile of Majesty. Being come into the Palace, the Queen took the Queen-Mothers hand by force, and kissed it several tim s, praying her to treat her as her Daughter. Then the Queen-Mother pooc iving that the Queen was without a Muff, the gave her hers, on which was a Knot of Diamonds, and then tyed about her Wrist a Bracelet worth 2000 Pistols, instead of a Ribon she took thence. The next day their Majesties came to the Buen Retiro (one of the Royal Palaces at the end of this Town) amidst the acclamations of the people, who flocked thither to fee them. The Preparations for her Majesties publick Entry into this place, are ordered to be finished against the 22 instan, and if they cannot, that Solemnity will be deferred till after Chrismass. The Queen will not make her Entry on Horseback, as was at first intended, because it is believed she is with Child. Don Emanuel de Lyra, has taken possession of his Place of Secretary of State for Italy.

Genoua, Dec. 20. The Senate has refolved to fend an Envoy to France, to represent to that Court the reasons which obliged them to deny the French Gall es a room in their Arsenal. It is much seared that Casal will at last fall into the hands of the French, no body now doubting but that the Duke of Manroua has sold it to them; for we have seen here a Copy of the Instrument made between them on that occasion. In the mean time the state of Venice, and that of Milan, are Arming, being resolved, as is said, to hinder the French from be-

ing Masters of that important place.

Marfeilles, Dec. 19. The Chevalier de Nodices is returned hither with the 8 French Gallies under his command from Genoua, that Senate having not thought fit to permit them to winter in their Arfenal. The Sicur d'Opede will sail in few days with

8 other Gallies to try the Senate once more in this matter. The Corfairs of Tripoli have taken a French Merchant Ship laden with Merchandiles to the value of 100 thouland Crowns.

Prague, Dec. 23. This place, God be thanked, continues in very good health. The Emperor has resolved to raise this Winter several Regiments of Horse and Foot; and Count Starenberg is sent with 50000 Gilders to Philipsburg, to see that place put into a persect condition of desence.

Copenhagen, Dec. 19. The King of Sueden we hear has granted several great Privileges to the City of Landscroon, making it a free Staple, and exempting the Inhabitants from paying Excise, and other laxes, and from Quartering of Soldiers, Ge. That King has caused a Placaet to be published, promiting Pardon to such of his Subjects that deserted his service during the War, as shall now return into it. Our King is going to reduce his forces.

Strasburg, Dec. 26. The French make great Levies in these parts, as if they were entring into some great War. And at the same time they work hard on the Fortifications of Hunningen. And Monsieur Vaubun the great Ingineer is arrived at Homburg, to add new Fortifications to that place.

Francfort, Dec. 31. The French are raising ment here, and the Commissaries that are employed therein tell us, that they expect Orders to go on more vigorously with these Levies then yet they have done. From Augsburg we have Letters, giving an account, that the Duke of Hanciter, who arrived there in his way to Italy, died very suddenly on the 28 past.

Brussels, Fans 3. Some days since his Excellent cy sent several Troops to quarter in Chieure, a place belonging to this Government, to prevent the French quartering there, of which Monsseur Calvod having notice, he sent to the Spanish Commander to r quire him to retire with his Troops, which he did accordingly, and the French entred sitte the place. We are told that his Excellency has received assurances from Spain of his continuing in this Government for some time longer. Yesterday the young Prince of Osnabrug passed, through this place on his way to Paris. From Alface we have an account, that the French have sinished the Canal between Kasenboltz and Schlestadt, which will be of greatuse to them; and that the success of this Work has put them upon a design of turning a Branch of the Rhine by Brisar; that Monsseur Fauban the French Ingineer is by the Kings command gone to Homburg to begin the Fortifications there, and from thence he is to go and visit all the places on the Saar, to see if any are not so be fortified. That the French

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King had commanded all persons who hold any Lands within the Bishopricks of Thoul, Mets, and Verdun, to repair within a limited time to the new Chamber at Metz, to pay their Homage, and Enrol their names as Vassals to his Majesty, in default whereof they are threatned with a confiscation of their Estates, which will concern some of the Electors, and several other Princes on the Rhine. It is believed that what has lately happened at Geneva to the French Resident, may bring that City into some trouble. On Sunday last his Excellency received Letters from Madrid, assuring him that the 600 thousand Crowns formerly mentioned should be re-

mitted hither by the next Ordinary. Hague, Jan. 2. The French Ambassador has sent the Gentleman of his Horse to Paris with Letters giving an account of what has been transacted here, and defiring farther Instructions against the return of the States of Holland, on the oth instant. In the mean time the Imperial Minister here has received directions to join with Mr. Sidney, His Maiesty of Great Brittain's Envoy Extraordinary, in oppoling the Alliance propoled by the French Ambassador, in which the endeavors of the latter have already had all the fuccess that could be expected. The States General seem much concerned at the difference arisen between the Elector of Brandenburg, and the Duke of Zell, about the formers quartering some Troops in the Country of Mecklenburg, and have on occasion thereof written very obliging Letters to both those Princes, and have at the same time lent strict orders to their Ministers in their respective Courts to use their utmost endeavors to compose this matter, that so those Princes, having established a good understanding between themfelves, may be able to perform the parts of good Allies towards this State, if there should be occasion for it. The Elector of Brandenburg has restored all the places he was possest of in Pomeren to the Suedes, and yet the French Troops, have no orders, that we can hear of, to quit Wesel and the Dutchy of Cleves. The French we hear are buying up in several parts of Germany great quantities of Corn, both for Horse and Men, some of which they bring to Flanders, and lay up the rest in their places in Alface, which with other preparations they make, gives people cause to think they are designing a new War. By a Veffel arrived from Surinam, the States have Letters from the Governor of the 16 of October, in which he gives them an account that the Indians continue to do the Planters much harm, ruining their Plantations, burning their Mills, killing their Negro's and Servants, &c. and that without a speedy and considerable affishance from hence, it would be impossible for him to preserve that

Hague, Fan. 5. The French Ambassador Monfieur d'Avaux, continues very zealous to promote the Interests of his Master, and in order thereunto makes frequent Visits to several Members of the States, letting them know that he expects a positive answer to the Overtures by him made concerning an Alliance between his Master and this State in few days. We are told that the States have Letters from Copenbagen, which inform them that the French Ambassador there had proposed an Alliance between his Master and that Crown; but they are better pleased with the account they have from their Minister at the Elector of Brandenburg's Court,

that he has great hopes of composing matters between his Electoral Highness and the Duke of Zell, upon the formers withdrawing his Troops out of the Dutchy of Mecklenburg.

Paris, Jan. 3. On the 15 or 16 instant the Prince of Conti will be married to Madamoiselle de Blois, to whom the King gives a Million of Livresfor her Portion, a yearly Pention of 100000, and a Gift of 150000 to desray the Charges of the Wedding; and in consideration of this Marriage, his Majesty has augmented the Prince of Conti's Pention, which will be now 75000 Livres; as likewise that of his Brother the Prince of Rocke-sur-yon, which will be 60000. The Chamber set up for the punishing those accused of Poysonings, have lately caused several persons to be seized; and we are told that they are framing two or three Processes of Consequence.

Portsmouth, Dec. 30. The Woolwich, Bristol, and the Merchant Ships under their Convoy, are still detained here by contrary Winds.

Deale, Dec. 30. The Merchant Ships in the Downes have weighed two or three times, and many of them failed, but the same or the next day were forced back again by contrary Winds.
