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Genova, Dec. 21.

THE *Nonfuch* and *Centurion* Frigats, which have been so long expected, are not yet arrived; but we have advice of six Ships that have been seen off of *St. Remo*, standing to the Eastward. Our Letters from *Marsailles* give an account, That 8 Gallies were sitting out there, being designed hither, to try if our Senate will upon second thoughts permit them to Winter in their Arsenal.

Genova, Jan. 3. Not any Ships have arrived here these Holydays; neither have we as yet any News of the *Centurion* or *Nonfuch*, so that there is Insuranc upon them at 4 per Cent. This Senate is sending an Envoy Extraordinary for *France*, to represent to that Court the reasons that have induced them to refuse the leave which was demanded for the French Gallies to Winter here.

Marsailles, Jan. 3. Eight French Gallies are sitting out here, with all diligence, for *Genova*. The *Chevalier de Valbelle* is sailed with 3 Men of War from *Thoulon* for *Tripoli*, to endeavour to oblige that Government to a Peace. The *Argierines* have of late taken 11 or 12 French Vessels, some of them very rich.

Venice, Dec. 21. Prince *Radzeville* the Polish Ambassador continues at *Pontieba*, and will do so till an Expres he has sent to *Poland* be come back. In the mean time this Senate has let him know, That they cannot give the Crown of *Poland* any Assistance against the Turks, seeing it would draw a new War upon them, who have not yet recovered what they suffered in the last, nor paid the Debts they then contracted.

Dantzick, Dec. 25. It is about a year since that great disturbances happened here among the Commonalty, in the hear of which they fell upon the *Carmelite* Friers, offered some Violences to their persons and plundered their Cloister, which might have gone farther, but that the Care of our Magistrates put a stop to the disorder, some of the Ring-leaders being committed to Prison, who were afterwards all discharged except two or three of the most culpable. The King of *Poland* resented the thing highly, writ a Letter to our Magistrates, requiring them to punish exemplarily the Authors of this Riot, and to make satisfaction to the Friers; but nothing was done thereupon, and in this state this matter has ever since continued, which is now brought upon the Board again; for the last week came hither the *Weywode* of *Pomeran*, in quality of the King of *Poland*'s Commissioner, to examine this matter, and to require Justice to be done upon the Offenders; and we are told that our Magistrates, to satisfy the King, have resolved that the Criminals that are now in Prison shall be brought to condign punishment.

Hamburg, Jan. 5. The *Danes* have not yet evacuated *Wijnar*, on account of some Aricars Contributions that remain owing to them. Count *Comingsmark*, Governour General of *Pomeran* for the King of *Sueden*, continues still here, and will do so till the Moneys which are to be remitted hither from *France* are ready to be paid to the Duke of *Zell*, who upon payment thereof will restore to him the Dutchies of *Bremen* and *Verdun*. The Bishop of *Osnabrug*, who was on his way to *Italy*, is, upon the News of his Brother the Duke of *Hanouer*'s death, coming back to take possession of that Dukes Territories, which, in pursuance of a contract made between the three Brothers, fall to him; and when the Duke of *Zell*, who has only one Daughter, which by the Laws of the Empire has no Right of Succession, comes to dye, the Bishop of *Osnabrug*, or at least his Son, will become yet more considerable by the acquisition likewise of what that Duke is now possessed of.

Strasbourg, Jan. 2. These Parts are full of Complaints against the proceedings of the French, who have not yet suffered the poor Inhabitants to enjoy any effects of the Peace, but on the contrary continue to oppress them with those excessive Contributions they now demand of them, and particularly of the Country of *Brisgow*. The *Suisse* Cantons are extremely concerned that, notwithstanding their repeated instances at the French Court to the contrary, the Fortifications at *Huningen* are still continued, and will be suddenly finished, which they look upon to be intended for a Bridle upon them.

Hague Jan. 12. To the Memorials of the Imperial and *Cologne* Ministers demanding the Evacuation of *Hassel* and *Maseyck*, the States have Answered, That they are ready to comply with his Electoral Highness's desire therein, provided he give this State satisfaction in the pretentions they have upon him, as well on account of the Contributions and of what his Electoral Highness owes to the Inhabitants of *Deventer* and *Swol* for Merchandizes bought of them, as of the exactions made on the said Inhabitants, at the time those places were evacuated by that Electors Troops, contrary to the express Articles of the Treaty of Peace. From *Wesel* they write, that the French would suddenly quit the Duchy of *Cleves*, but that they pretended first to have paid them 219000 Crowns. The Elector of *Brandenburg* has given the Government of that Country, which Prince *Maurits* of *Nassaw*, lately Deceased, had, to the Electoral Prince his Son.

Paris, Jan. 17. On Saturday last the Duke de *Crequi* parted hence for *Munick*, whither he is sent by the King in quality of his Ambassador Extraordinary to assist at the Ceremony of the Marriage, which it's said will be performed on the 28th instant, and to conduct the Princess hither. The King and Queen part from St. *Germain* the
