Lübon, Decemb. 12.

THE three Estates of the Cortes have approved of the Marriage of the Infanta with the Duke of Savoy, and have therefore consented to the dispensing with the Law of *Lamego* for this time only. The said States are very much concerned at the Interdict which still continues upon the Inquisition, by which means the Jews that are now Prisoners cannot be brought to their Tyals, and divers Proposals have been made on this subject in the several Chambers, which have not hitherto taken any effect.

Genova, Jan. 17. The 11th instant arrived here the Reserve, *Richard Boucher* Master, from *Marseilles*; and the 14, eight French Gallies, commanded by the *Sieur de Manse*, they were saluted with four Guns from the Foit, and with as many from the Patron Gally of this State, which the French returned with the same number: but not being able to obtain permission to winter in the Arsenal here, they sailed again yesterday morning for *Legorn* and *Civita Vecchia*. The Centurion and *Nonsub* frigats as yet appear not; but by the way of *Legorn* we have a notice, that they were sailed from *Alicant* for *Oran*, to carry some Monies thither for the Spaniards, and that the *Newfoundland* Convoy was put into *Cadiz*; so that it's hoped the one and the other will not now be long wanting.

Prague, Jan. 13. From *Hungary* we have an account, that 600 Imperial Horse had revolted, and were gone over to the *Poles*, taking their Horses and their Arms with them, which was occasioned by the discontent they were in for want of their Pay. The Duke and Dutches of *Saxe-Lawenburg* are returned hither, and we expect the Electoral Prince of *Saxony* who intends to pass the *Carnival* here. It is said that the Emperor is going to send Count *Lamberg* in quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to *England*. We have advice from several parts that the French are endeavouring to make the Dauphin King of the *Romans*; and, we are told, that this as well as other considerations makes the Emperor desire to have a personal Conference with the Electors and other Princes of the Empire, and that in order therunto he had writ to them to repair to *Ratibonne*, where he would meet them; but that they have answered, *That they are so impoverished by the late Wars, that they are not able to furnish the expence of such a Journey, or come attended as became their Dignities.*

Hamburg, Jan. 21. The Duke of *Zell* has received Bills of Exchange for 100 thousand Crowns from *France*; so soon as they are paid, *Carestadt*, and several other places in the Dutchy of *Bremen*, will be restored to the *Suedes*; but because the Bailage of *Tedinghusen* is by the Treaty of Peace, to remain to the Duke of *Zell*, the Velt-Marshal

Coningsmarke is at *Bremen*, to treat with the Bishop of *Munster* about his parting with the said Bailage, which he is now possessed of. The difference between the Elector of *Brandenburg* and the Duke of *Zell*, concerning the formers quartering his Troops in the Country of *Mecklenburg*, is not yet determined; but on the contrary we are told that the Elector is sending five Regiments more thither; and that Monsieur *Chauvet* General of the Duke of *Zell's* forces, will in few days pass the *Elbe* with two Regiments, and march towards *Mecklenburg*, and that more Troops will follow him, in order to the dislodging the said *Brandenburgers*.

Brussels, Jan. 21. His Excellency being very much dissatisfied with this City for its backwardness to consent to the Subsidies by him demanded, as well as upon other accounts, removed the Assembly of the States of *Brabant* to *Vilword*, and declared that he would go and reside in some place in *Flanders*, but his Excellency was afterwards prevailed with to recal the said States back hither. The preparations which we hear from several parts the French are making, fill us with apprehensions of their designs, and give his Excellency cause the more vigorously to apply himself for the putting these Provinces into a posture of defence. The standing Force which has been agreed by the several Provinces to be kept on foot, consists of 25000 Foot, and 5500 Horse. That part of them, which are maintained by the Province of *Flanders* are very well paid, and are in a good condition, but the like cannot be said of those in the other Provinces. We are informed that the French are drawing a Body of men together near *Tournay*; and that there are already 10000 men in that Neighborhood. The French set up daily new Pretensions, which do not a little disquiet us here. It seems the Prince of *Lislebunne* pretends that her Brother the Prince *de Valdemont* is owing to her 400 thousand Florens; and we understand that the Most Christian King has undertaken to procure her satisfaction herein.

Brussels, Jan. 28. On Saturday last the Count *de Montbrun* returned for *Tournay*. Leaving this Court in great perplexity concerning the affair of *Charlemont*; and this day the Count *d'Archino*, one of our chief Ministers was dispatched by his Excellency to *Cologne*, to endeavor to persuade that Elector to part with *Dinant*; and at the same time an Express was sent to *Madrid* to inform the King of this matter. Deputies are come hither from *Gheub*, and the Country of *Waes*, to represent to his Excellency the great damage they have sustained by the high Waters, which have broke through the Dikes in several places. Our Letters from *Strasburg* give us an account, that they are preparing for the reception of the Dauphiness, whom they expect there about the middle of the next month with a Train of 350 persons.

Amsterdam, Febr. 2. The great concern and discourse of people here of late has been concerning the Alliance proposed by the French Ambassador at the *Hague*; the matter was warmly debated, and all the Arguments that could be used *pro* and *con*, stily insisted on, but at last the States, to the great satisfaction of all people, have pursued their true Interest, and resolved not to embrace the Proposals of the French, who have carried this matter so high as to seem to threaten us with little less than a War, in case the States refused the said Alliance, which they have now done.

Hague, Jan. 30. The States of *Holland* adjourned themselves last Wednesday till the 6th of the next month, having first unanimously resolved, as we told you in our last, to reject the Alliance proposed by *France*; and ordered their Deputies to declare the same in the Assembly of the States General, from whom the formal Answer to the French Ambassadors Proposals on this subject must come; and in order thereunto this matter will now be brought before the other Provinces in their respective Assemblies, who, we may be confident, will follow the example of *Holland*. In the mean time we are told that the French Ambassador gives out, *That he shall be very suddenly called home, and that the King his Master will order all his Subjects to quit the Service of this State.* Notwithstanding which the people are extremely pleased with the Resolution the States of *Holland* have taken in this important Affair. And most of the Foreign Ministers have repeated their Compliments to Mr. *Sidney* upon his success therein. The Deputies of the States, and those of the Admiralties have agreed upon the building of 18 Men of War, for the strengthening their Naval Force. They have likewise resolved to send some Forces to *Surinam* to put that Colony into a posture of defence. The Elector of *Brandenburg* has signified to the States General that he has a design to buy 200 pieces of Cannon in this Province, and desires their leave for the transporting of them; which they have taken into consideration. The *Sieur Van Zier* is designed Ambassador to the King of *England* in the room of the *Sieur Van Leeuwen*, who has desired to be recalled.

Hague, Febr. 2. The Spanish Minister here has presented a Memorial to the States General, wherein he acquaints them with the demand made by the French of having *Charlemont* delivered to them by the 25th instant; and we are told that the States have resolved to write to their Ambassadors in *France* about this matter. The Prince of *Orange* went yesterday morning to *Soestdike*, to divert himself with Hunting for four or five days. From *Amsterdam* we have an account, that *Monsieur Van Beuningen* late Ambassador from this State in *England*, is chosen one of the four Burghermasters of that City for this present year.

Paris, Febr. 3. On Monday last the Princess of *Tingry*, the Dutchess of *Bouillon*, and the *Marchalle de la Ferte*, appeared before the Chamber, according to the Summons they had received, and after examination, were dismissed again. The Duke of *Luxemburg* is removed from the *Bastile*, to *Vincennes*. By an Express from *Bavaria* we have advice, that the Ceremony of the Marriage between the Dauphin and that Princess has been deferred, upon some difficulties arisen concerning the Renunciation which it's said that Princess is to make of all

the Right she may have of inheriting any part of the Goods or Estates of the late Elector her Father.

Whitehall, Jan. 26. This morning the Parliament met at *Westminster*, His Majesty went thither by Land; and being come into the House of Lords, in His Royal Robes, and Seated in His Throne, and the Commons attending, His Majesty made a Gracious Speech to the Two Houses, and then commanded the Lord Chancellor to Prorogue them till the 15th of *April* next, which was done accordingly.

Whitehall, Jan. 28. His Majesty was pleased this afternoon to declare in Council, that He had sent for his Royal Highness, not having found such an effect from his absence, as should incline Him to keep him longer from Him. That some Questions had been started of late of such a nature, and of so great Concern to the Duke, as made it reasonable to have him present at the next Sessions of Parliament, and that though His Majesty would take care to preserve his Right, yet it might be for his satisfaction to be here himself. That His Majesty was so well assured of the Dukes Compliance, that He could answer his return should have no ill influence upon the Publicke.
