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Moscow, Dec 13.

HE Turkish Envoy has had leveral conferences with some perfons appointed by the Czar, on the Frontiers, where he is obliged to make a Quarantine. And we are told, That, amongst other things, he demands that the Czar fhould yeild all he is now posses that the Czar to the Grand Signior; but this is lookt upon as a very extravagant Proposal, and the Czar has resolved to fend Ambassadors to Poland, to make a League Offensive and Defensive with that Crown.

Rome, fan. 13. The Ambaffador of Maltha has acquainted the Pope, That the Grand Mafter had refolved to fend 500 men to the Affiftance of the King of Poland, and to maintain them there. And we are told that the Pope has fent Orders to his Nuncio in Poland to declare to that King, That he will pay him 500000 Florins upon the day he enters into War againft the Turks, and that during it, the Tenths raifed upon the Clergy of *Italy*, as well Regular as Secular, fhall be applied to that fervice.

Marfeilles, Fan. 16. At Thoulon 15 Men of War are fitting out with all Diligence; fome fay that they are defigned against the Tripolins, others, that they are to Transport the Duke of Savoy to Portugal.

Prague, Jan. 16. From Poland our Letters affure us, That that Crown is going to enter into a War against the Turks, and that in order thereunto a great Council of War and a general Dyet are appointed to meet this month at Warsaw; there has been a difcourse here at Court, that the Emperor had refolved to joyn with the Poles in the War, and that he had sent instructions to his Minister at that Court to make an Overture of a Defensive and Offensive League, but this is a Piece of News that people cannot easily give credit to, at a time when it is known the proceedings of the French do give this Court great diffurbance; for we are not only informed of the Levies and other Preparations they are making, but what more neerly concerns this Court, of the endeavours they are using in order to the making the Dauphin King of the Romans. We are told that the Emperor has given out Commissions for the raising three new Regiments of Foot.

Hamburg, Jan. 26. The Dutch Minister at the Elector of Brandenburg's Court has laboured very earnestly to compose the matter in difference between his Electoral Highness and the Duke of Zell, but hitherto his endeavours have wanted the fuc-

cefs that is to be wifhed they might have; and the Elector on one fide not only continues his Troops in the Country of Mecklenburg, which is the caufe of their difference, but has lent more thither; and on the other fide the Duke of Zell, as Director of the lower Saxony, has cauled feveral Regiments to march under the Command of Monfigur Chauves, to remove them, though after all it's hoped things will not come to extremity between them. From Copenhagen they write, That the French Ambaffador there is endeavouring to joyn the two Northern Crowns in a close League together, and when he has succeeded therein, it's believed France will likewise defire to become a Party in it. The King of Sueden was gone for Stockholm, but not to make any flay there, but to return to Schonen, to confummate his Marriage at Helmstadt or fome other place in those parts.

Bruffels, Fan. 30. Several Expresses have, wi hin this week, passed to and from Cologne, whither we told you in our last his Excellency had fent the Count d' Archisto, to Treat with that Elector about his quitting Dinant, in lieu of which a Sum of Money and fome other place, it's faid is offered him, though it's feared he will be prevailed upon by the French not to accept thereof, of which we may in few days be able to give you a farther atcount. The News from Helland of the States having rejected the Allyance proposed by the French Ambaffador is very acceptable to this Court, and we are told that his Excellency has written to the States General to acquaint th m with the perplexity he is in concerning Charlemont, which the French politively demand by a day, and which he cannot deliver to them without particular Orders from Spain. We have Letters of a very fresh Date from Cadiz, which fay, That according to the last account they had there from Tangier, that place was in a very good Condition, and that they had not heard of the Moors fo as to give then any diffurbance fince the time they retired in November.

Amsterdam, Feb. 2. We are now expecting in a thort time to hear that the Dutchies of Bremen and Ferden are reflored to the Suedes, the Duke of Zell having already received part of the Muneys that are to be paid to him in confideration of the faid Reflitution. Confiderable fupplies will be fent to Surinam, which may put that Colony into a condition of D.fence against the Indians, who have of late made great Havock in fome, and quite destroyed other Plantations.

Hague, Feb, 2. At the realfembling of the States of Holland, which will be on the 6 Inflant, the principal matter before them will be the Regularing
