to defire that notice may be given accordingly to the Villages where he is to quarter in his March. We have advice that the French Troops in Burg ady and Lorrain are moving, that fome march towards Fiedmont and others towards Alfdee, having with them Cannon and Mortar Peices. From Treves we have an account that leveral Troops raifed for the French in Germany had palled by that City in their March for France.

Braffels, February 6. His Excellency has deferred his going to Gaunt till after the arrival of the next Spanifh Courier; by which he not only expects a confiderable Sum of Money, but likewife Orders to make a Reform in the feveral Councels, and the Chamber of Accounts, which are to be reduced to a much finaller number, then they confift of at prefent. A great Misfortune has happened to the Country of Wass, which puts thole Inhabitants to great Charges. The Great Dyke being lately broken through by the Waters in 17 feveral places, which endancered the overflowing of the whole Country. The French are preparing to quit Dimant, and have fent to the Elector of Cologne to acquant him therewith. The Countels de Soiffons is arrived as Namur.

Amflerdás, Feb. 6. From Utrecht we have an account that the States of that Province are feper rated, having first reloved not to enter into the Allya ce now offered by France; and fent Orders accordingly to their Deputies in the Affembly of the S ates General; whither it's believed the advices of all the other Provinces upon this matter will now be brought in few days. From Flanders they, write that the French are drawing a Body of men together near Tournay.

Hague, Feb. 6. This day the Deputies of the Provinces of Utrecht Guelderland, Frifeland, Over Ifle, and Groningen, in the allembly of the States Gegeral, gave in the advices of their refpective Principals concerning the French Allyance, which did all of them concur with the refolution of the States of Holland, not to enter juto the faid Alliance. This day likewife the States of Holland reaffembled, But feveral Deputies not being as yet arrived, they adjourned till to morrow without entring upon any buffnels. The laft Night dyed here Colonel Colliers. From Hamburg they write. That the French are upon the point of making an Alliance with the two Northern Crowns, and that Prince George the King of Denmark's Brother is to marry with a French Lady.

Weymouth, Fanuary 30. Laft night a finall Veffel, called the Little Fohn of Bourdeaux, laden with Wines for Dunkirke, was forced alhore by extremity of Weather, near Portland, all the Men being faved.

Tarmouth, Feb. 2. Four of His Majeflies Yachts, bound for Scotland, are now at an Anchor in this Road. They were on Saturday as far to the Northwards as Wells, but were forced off to Sea by a violent Storm, and yesterday came into this Road.

Deale, February 1. The laft Night we had a molt violent Storm, in which, three finall Veffels were forced alhore, two of them being bound home from O Porto in Portugal: And fome other Ships are miffing.

Deale, February 3. The Weather has been very Tempestuous, and in it several Vessels have been cast away upon the Goodwin, and near this place.
