Hamburg, Febr. 16. The 8th inflant died the Princess Elizabeth, Sister to the Elector Palatine, Abbess of Herford; the young Princess of Anbalt succeeds her. The Bilhop of Munster has appointed a general review of his Troops near Coesfelde, with what delign we know not. We have an account that the Dauphiness is arrived at Ausburg in

her way to France.

Hamburg, Febr. 20. The Elector of Brandenburg has finally been prevailed upon to draw his Troops out of the Dutchy of Meckienburg, and thereupon the Duke of Zell has likewise recalled his. The Suedes are expecting that Stade will be delivered to them in very few days; but they are like to find the place very bare, for the Duke of Zet is taking away all the Cannon, &c. The French pretend that the late Duke of Hanouer did not make good the Conditions, on account of which he received the Subfidies from them, and demind fatisfaction of the Bishop of Osnabrug, now Duke of Hanouer. From Denmark they write as if there were some disturbances in Sueden, and that the King had caused his Forces that were in Schonen to march towards Stockholme, of which we must expect to hear far-

Cologne, Febr. 6. The Count d'Archinto the Spanish Envoy, who came hither some days since, has not as yet had Audience of the Elector. The States of this A chbishoprick have granted his Electoral Highness the Sum of 100 thousand Crowns to be disposed of as he thinks fit. Our Letters from Metz of the second Inflant tell us, that great quantities of Ammunition were brought thither from Verdun and other places, and laid up in the Magazines there; that there was an intention of adding some new Portifications to that place, and that Monfieur de Louvry was expected there, to confer with forme of the most eminent Engineers about it. Cologne, Febr. 19. The 7th the Count d'Archinto had Audience of the Elector, and fince he has been in frequent Conferences with his Ministers. are told that Monsieur Sourdin who commands the French Troops in the Country of Cleves, has received orders to quit Wesel, so soon as the Arrear's of Contributions are paid, and that thereupon the States of that Country have given him Bills of Exchange for 13000b Crowns, payable at Paris, and for 40000 at Amsterdam, a Sum which will very much impoverish that Country. ces, was expected at Wefel the 7th inflant:

Bruffels, Febr. 23. Yesterday Monsieur Mombrun came hither, and in the afternoon had Audience of his Excellency, whose orders he demanded for the delivery of Charlement, which his Excellency told him he should have, and assured him, That the King of Spain, as he defired nothing more than that the Peace established between the two Crowns might be every day more and more confirmed, so be thould always be very pursual on his part to do all things that might tend thereunto, and partitularly would faithfully perform whatever was stipulated by the Treaty of Peace. His Excellency added, That the march of the French Troops made some of the Provinces uneasie, fearing they intended to come and quarter upon them, and therefore defired they might remove fariher from their borders? Which Monieur Mombrun assured his Excellency they thould do, and that the Most Christian King will strictly observe the Peace, and that it will not be his fault, if the differences about the Limits be not speedily adjusted. He farth r told his Excellency, That the King would be at Valenciernes the 1\$ of May next, and that he intends to pass part of the Summer in visiting his new Conquests. The morning Monsieur Mombrun, who the last night sentant xpreis to the Mareichal d'Humieres, to acquaint himi with what he had done here, parted again for Namur, having with him a Party of 20 Horse, who came with him as his Guard's to morrow he will be at Dinant, and from thence will go on Monday with the greatest part of the Garison there, to take poffession of Charlemont. The Works of Dinant are all ruined, but we do not yet know when the French will evacuate it. Hague, Febr. 26. On Saturday last the States of Itolland adjourned themselves till this day sevennight, and the several Deputies are gone home to consult their Principals concerning the method of raising the Money they have greed upon for the defraying the necessary Charges for the present year, as well as the paying the Arrears of Sublidies due to several Princes of Germany. The Prince of Orange had thoughts of beginning his Journy for Flanders yesterday morning, but he changed them, and has deferred that delign till forte other time.

Hague, Febr. 23. The Admiralties have agreed the matter about the building 36 Men of War, of which 10 are to carry Eighty Guns, 8 Seventy, 8 Sixty, and 10 Fifty; and the thing must now be brought before the Council of State, who are to demand of the States General the Monies necessary We are told that the said States for this Work. have made a Resolution for the disbanding some finall Garifons, and for the forming feveral independent Companies now on foot into Regiments. The States have likewise ordered great quantities of Stores to be provided, and to be laid up in their Magazines. The Prince and Princess of Orange are gone for Soeftdike, where they will flay till Tuesday next, when the States of Holland reassemble. Yesterday to Raugrave, Natural Son to the Elector Palatin, and Sir Gabriel Sylvius, embarked in the Catherine Yacht for England. On Wednesday last Mr. Sydney treated at Dinner the Imperial, Spanish, and Brandenburg Ministers residing here, and Monsieur Heugh who is going Ambassador to France from the King of Denmark. From Bruffels we have an account, that the Duke de Villa Hermosa had received orders

from Spain to deliver Charlemont to the French.

Paris, Febr. 24. On Thursday last la Voisine,
who was sentenced by the Chamber, of Poysons to be burnt alive, was accordingly executed. We are told that the King has continued this Chamber for two years longer. Edenburg, Febr. 12. We have an account that the Yacht commanded by Captain Gunman is now in Haymouth-Creek on this fide Barwicke. He failed with the three other Yachts out of Yarmouth Road on Sunday last, but of them we have not as yet any advice. This evening their Royal Highnesses are treated at Supper by the Earl of Murray.

Plimouth, Febr. 13. This day the Woolwich, with a great Fleet of Merchant Ships under her Convoy, came into this Harbor, to call for the Kings Fisher, and the Shipsthat, were here. And this eveming they all failed with a fair Wind to the West-ward. This day also arrived here the Bristol, who has orders to stay here 24 hours, to take care of such

Ships as may happen to lag behind.
