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Genova, January 31.

Yesterday morning arrived here the *Kent*, *Lester Saunders* Master, from *Newfoundland*, the *Edward* and *John* from *Hamburg*, and the *Success* from *London*; they came under the Convoy of the *Newcastle* and *Reserve* Frigats, who are gone by for *Legorn*.

Ratibonne, Febr. 8. A Memorial having been presented to the Dyet, made up of 14 Articles, containing the particulars in which the French have contravened the Peace; the States have had several Debates thereupon, and have resolved to appoint Deputies to confer with the French Minister here; and if those Conferences have not the desired success, then to send an Ambassador to *France*; which Resolution has been sent to the Emperor for his approbation.

Copenhagen, Febr. 6. The Swedish Ambassador the *Sieur Gu densterne* is come to *Lundun*, and is in few days expected here to conduct the new Queen of *Sueden* to *Malmoe*, or some other place in *Schonen*. Count *Anthony of Oldenburg* is going to marry with the young Princess of *Tarante*, Cousin-Germain to the Queen.

Hamburg, Febr. 16. The 8th instant died the Princess *Elizabeth*, Sister to the Elector Palatine, Abbess of *Herford*; the young Princess of *Aubalt* succeeds her. The Bishop of *Munster* has appointed a general review of his Troops near *Coesfeldt*, with what design we know not. We have an account that the Dauphiness is arrived at *Ausburg* in her way to *France*.

Hamburg, Febr. 20. The Elector of *Brandenburg* has finally been prevailed upon to draw his Troops out of the Dutchy of *Mecklenburg*, and thereupon the Duke of *Zell* has likewise recalled his. The Suedes are expecting that *Stade* will be delivered to them in very few days; but they are like to find the place very bare, for the Duke of *Zell* is taking away all the Cannon, &c. The French pretend that the late Duke of *Hanouer* did not make good the Conditions, on account of which he received the Subsidies from them, and demand satisfaction of the Bishop of *Osnabrug*, now Duke of *Hanouer*. From *Denmark* they write as if there were some disturbances in *Sueden*, and that the King had caused his Forces that were in *Schonen* to march towards *Stockbolme*, of which we must expect to hear farther.

Cologne, Febr. 6. The Count *d'Archinto* the Spanish Envoy, who came hither some days since, has not as yet had Audience of the Elector. The States of this Archbishoprick have granted his Electoral Highness the Sum of 100 thousand Crowns to be disposed of as he thinks fit. Our Letters from *Metz* of the second Instant tell us, that great quantities of Ammunition were brought thither from *Verdun* and other places, and laid up in the Magazines there; that there was an intention of adding some new Fortifications to that place, and that Monsieur *de Louvois* was expected there, to confer with some of the most eminent Engineers about it. From *Prague* they write, that in the County of *Glotz* in *Bohemia* both Gold and Silver Mines had been discovered.

Cologne, Febr. 19. The 7th the Count *d'Archinto* had Audience of the Elector, and since he has been in frequent Conferences with his Ministers. We are told that Monsieur *Sourdis* who commands the French Troops in the Country of *Cleves*; has received orders to quit *Wesel*, so soon as the Arrears of Contributions are paid, and that thereupon the States of that Country have given him Bills of Exchange for 130000 Crowns, payable at *Paris*, and for 40000 at *Amsterdam*, a Sum which will very much impoverish that Country. Monsieur *Spaen*, Lieutenant-General of the Elector of *Brandenburg's* Forces, was expected at *Wesel* the 7th instant.

Brussels, Febr. 23. Yesterday Monsieur *Mombrun* came hither, and in the afternoon had Audience of his Excellency, whose orders he demanded for the delivery of *Charlemont*, which his Excellency told him he should have, and assured him, That the King of *Spain*, as he desired nothing more than that the Peace established between the two Crowns might be every day more and more confirmed, so he would always be very punctual on his part to do all things that might tend thereunto, and particularly would faithfully perform whatever was stipulated by the Treaty of Peace. His Excellency added, That the march of the French Troops made some of the Provinces uneasy, fearing they intended to come and quarter upon them, and therefore desired they might remove farther from their borders.

Which Monsieur *Mombrun* assured his Excellency they should do, and that the Most Christian King will strictly observe the Peace, and that it will not be his fault, if the differences about the Limits be not speedily adjusted. He farther told his Excellency, That the King would be at *Valenciennes* the 15 of May next, and that he intends to pass part of the Summer in visiting his new Conquests. This morning Monsieur *Mombrun*, who the last night sent an Express to the Marechal *d'Humieres*, to acquaint him with what he had done here, parted again for *Namur*, having with him a Party of 20 Horse, who came with him as his Guard; to morrow he will be at *Dinant*, and from thence will go on Monday with the greatest part of the Garison there, to take possession of *Charlemont*. The Works of *Dinant* are all ruined, but we do not yet know when the French will evacuate it. The French work hard on the Fortifications they are making at *Mabuge*, of which the Count *de Montal*, late Governor of *Charleroy* has the Government, which argues they design to make that a very important place.

Hague, Febr. 20. On Saturday last the States of *Holland* adjourned themselves till this day seven-night, and the several Deputies are gone home to consult their Principals concerning the method of raising the Money they have agreed upon for defraying the necessary Charges for the present year, as well as the paying the Arrears of Subsidies due to several Princes of *Germany*. The Prince of *Orange* had thoughts of beginning his Journey for *Flanders* yesterday morning, but he changed them, and has deferred that design till some other time.

Hague, Febr. 23. The Admiralties have agreed the matter about the building 35 Men of War, of which 10 are to carry Eighty Guns, 8 Seventy, 8 Sixty, and 10 Fifty; and the thing must now be brought before the Council of State, who are to demand of the States General the Monies necessary for this Work. We are told that the said States have made a Resolution for the disbanding some small Garisons, and for the forming several independent Companies now on foot into Regiments. The States have likewise ordered great quantities of Stores to be provided, and to be laid up in their Magazines. The Prince and Princess of *Orange* are gone for *Soestdike*, where they will stay till Tuesday next, when the States of *Holland* shall assemble. Yesterday *Count Raugrave*, Natural Son to the Elector Palatin, and Sir *Gabriel Sylvius*, embarked in the *Catherine* Yacht for *England*. On Wednesday last Mr. *Sydney* treated at Dinner the Imperial, Spanish, and *Brandenburg* Ministers residing here, and Monsieur *Heugb* who is going Ambassador to *France* from the King of *Denmark*. From *Brussels* we have an account, that the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* had received orders from *Spain* to deliver *Charlemont* to the French.

Paris, Febr. 24. On Thursday last *la Voisue*, who was sentenced by the Chamber of Poysons to be burnt alive, was accordingly executed. We are told that the King has continued this Chamber for two years longer. The King has appointed the Marquis of *Glermont*, the Marquis de *Chiverny*, the Count de *St. Maure*, the Count de *Torigny*, and four other persons of quality, some of whom are always to attend the Dauphin, and are to have each a Pension of 2000 Crowns. On Monday next the King begins his Journey to meet the Dauphiness.

Edenburg, Febr. 12. We have an account that the Yacht commanded by Captain *Gunman* is now in *Haymouth-Creek* on this side *Barwicke*. He sailed with the three other Yachts out of *Yarmouth Road* on Sunday last, but of them we have not as yet any advice. This evening their Royal Highnesses are treated at Supper by the Earl of *Murray*.

Plimouth, Febr. 13. This day the *Woolwich*, with a great Fleet of Merchant Ships under her Convooy, came into this Harbor, to call for the *Kings Fisher*, and the Ships that were here. And this evening they all sailed with a fair Wind to the Westward. This day also arrived here the *Bristol*, who has orders to stay here 24 hours, to take care of such Ships as may happen to lag behind.

Lime, Febr. 14. By a Vessel that arrived two days since from *Guernsey*, we have an account, that they are about repairing the Cattle, and that the Work goes on apace.

Portsmouth, Febr. 15. Friday in the evening the *Swan* Frigate sailed from *Spithead* for *Ireland*.

Portsmouth, Febr. 17. Yesterday in the afternoon the *Antelope* came into this Harbor, in order to be refitted to go to Sea again.

Whitehall, Febr. 17. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Sir *Robert Southwell* Kt. to go His Envoy Extraordinary to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, who will begin his journey very speedily.

Whitehall, Febr. 18. This day the Lord *Stourton* took the Oaths of *Allegiance* and *Supremacy* before His Majesty in Council. And the Lord *Hunsden* took the Oath of *Allegiance*, but refusing that of *Supremacy*, was ordered to be prosecuted according to Law.

Sir *Francis Pemberton*, late one of the Justices of the *Kings Bench*, has received his discharge under the Great Seal.
