Tangier, Jan. 18.

WE have had exceeding stormy weather for these 10 or 12 days past, but, God be thanked, our Mole has suffered little or nothing; the old Work that remains yet undefended with Chefs has received some little damage. We have built a small Work in the Sea upon Piles, to secure us on that side.

The *Alcaide* of *Alcazar* is returned from *Mecklenburg*, where he had been to make a Present to the King, who, hearing the *Alcaide* boast of his success, asked him, *If he had taken Charles Fort*; and being told he had not, seemed to make but small account of what he had done; this they say has made the *Alcaide* (who is now at *Sally*) resolve to attack *Charles Fort*, which has lately received several additions of strength, and has a very good Garrison in it. We are levelling those Lines which are not judged necessary, and making others, and have made a strong Retrenchment within the Eastern Tower, &c.

Genova, Febr. 14. The 7th instant the *Nonuch* and *Cenurion* Frigates sailed from hence for *Legorn*. Yesterday eight French Gallies put in here in their return from *Cyprus*, *Vecchia*, and this evening they sail again for *Marseilles*. The last week 200000 Pieces of Eight were remitted hither from *Madrid*, for the service of the State of *Milan*.

Hamburg, Febr. 19. We are assured that the French are labouring to engage the two Northern Crowns in a close Alliance with them; and it is added that Monsieur *Beugh* the Danish Ambassador now going for France has particular Instructions in this Affair, which many people however doubt.

Cologne, Febr. 26. While the Count d'*Archevêque* the Spanish Envoy is treating with our Elector about the Cession of *Dinant*, we have an account by an Express from *Brussels*, that the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* has resolved, pursuant to the Instructions he received from *Spain*, to deliver *Charlemont* to the French on the 28 instant, the day by them prefixed, thereby to prevent all occasions of difference between the two Crowns, which it is believed the French would be ready enough to lay hold on.

Brugge, Febr. 23. The Prince and Princess of *Orange* are now at *Soestdike*; and the Deputies of the States of *Holland* are gone home, and will be back on Tuesday next. The States General were told have resolved to give the Princes of *Lunenburg* satisfaction, concerning the Arrears of Contributions by them pretended; and it is not to be doubted but they will have the same regard to the like Pretensions of the Elector of *Brandenburg*. The Sieur *Beugh* the Danish Ambassador is still here.

Brugge, Febr. 24. All the discourse here is con-

cerning *Charlemont*, which we hear will be delivered to the French the 28th instant. If it be not, it is said the French, who have now together a Body of 16000 men in the Neighborhood of *Lille*, will march into the Spanish Territories.

Paris, Febr. 28. On Monday last their Majesty and the whole Court parted from hence for *Chalons*, where they will expect the arrival of the Dauphiness; but the Dauphin will go a days journey farther to meet her, and to conduct her to *Chalons*, where the Marriage will be consummated.

Falmouth, Febr. 16. By a small Vessel that came in here the 15th instant from *St. Malles*, we are told that before her sailing from thence, two French Merchant Ships arrived there from the *Streights*, and that they reported that two Algietine Men of War came with them as far as the *Soundings*. The Wind has blown for several days past very fresh at East, and about 40 or 50 Sail of Merchant Ships are put into this Harbor bound for France.

Swansey, Febr. 16. The last week two or three Scotch Ships laden home from *Bourdeaux*, were cast away in this Harbor, the Men all saved. The *Mary of London*, Peter Edwards Master, bound for *Dublin* is put in here by contrary Winds. A small Vessel called the *Francis of Bridgewater*, is cast away near a place called *Domaven*, and all her men lost.

Plimouth, Febr. 17. Thursday last in the evening Captain *Wetwang* and Captain *Kempeborne*, Commanders of the *Woolwich* and *Kings Fishers* sailed with the Merchant Ships under their Convoy bound for the *Streights*. Next day sailed Captain *Wyborne* in the *Bristol*, with several Merchant Ships bound for *Portugal* and the *Streights*. On Sunday the *Fames* Gally and the *Swan* sailed likewise with some Merchant Ships for *Ireland*, where they are to take on board several Companies of foot, and to carry them to *Tangier*.

Edenburg, Febr. 17. On Saturday three of His Majesties Yachts arrived in *Leith* Road. On Sunday at night his Royal Highness took his leave of the Council, after having dispatched several Business of importance concerning the *Highlands*, &c. (of which an Express is sent to give the King an account, and whereof you shall have a farther information in our next.) Yesterday morning the several Judicatures and the Magistrates of this City waited upon their Royal Highnesses to take their leave of them; After which their Royal Highnesses with many of the Nobility and Gentry, were entertained at Dinner by the Lord Chancellor. About three in the afternoon their Royal Highnesses went in their Coaches, followed by the Kings Horse Guards, and the Coaches of the Nobility and Gentry to *Leith*, the Militia and Trained Bands of this City making a Lane for them to pass through, and the great Guns from the Castle firing till their entering into *Leith*, where the Footguards were

were placed in the like order all the way to the Peer. Their Royal Highnesses having taken their leave of the Nobility and Gentry of both Sexes, and principal Citizens (who express much trouble for their departure) went into a Pinnace that carried them on board the Yacht, the people who were there in an extraordinary multitude taking their farewell by loud Shouts and Acclamations, which his Royal Highness was pleased to return by standing up a long while in the Pinnace and waving his Hat, the Cannon playing all the while from the Peer, Citadel, and the Ships in the Harbor. About eight a clock at night the Yachts weighed, and were seen this morning without the land of the *May*. Several Noblemen and Gentlemen of Quality wait upon their Royal Highnesses for *England*.

Before their Royal Highnesses departure, the Honor of Knighthood was in their presence conferred upon the Lord Provost of this City, by the Lord Chancellor, pursuant to an Order he had received from His Majesty for that purpose.

Whitehall, Febr. 18. His Majesty taking notice of the good Effects which His late Proclamation, For the better putting in execution divers Statutes made against Prohibited Goods, hath had, and being resolved to give all farther encouragement thereunto, was pleased this day in Council to order, That Copies of His said Proclamation, as also of that Clause of the late Poll-Act, which Prohibits the Importation of several French Commodities, be delivered to the Judges now going the Circuits (as likewise to the Judges of Wales) who are required to give the same in charge in the most effectual manner at the Assizes, and to countenance the Officers of the Customs and others, who shall make Seizures of any the said Prohibited Goods, and to cause all those to be punished, who have been guilty of any Assaults, Rescues, Riots, or Tumults, in order to hinder or obstruct the execution thereof. It was likewise ordered that the Commissioners of the Admiralty do require the Commanders of the Kings Ships not to receive on board, in any the Roads or Harbors of this Kingdom, any such Prohibited Goods, and to cause due Punishments to be inflicted on those that shall act contrary thereunto; and that the said Commanders be aiding to the Officers of the Customs, and others who shall Seize, or Search for any Prohibited Goods. And the like Charge is to be given to all the Vice-admirals.

Whitehall, Febr. 20. Information having been given to the Council Board that *Thomas Dare* of *Taunton* Goldsmith (the person that presented the *Taunton* Petition to the King about the Sitting of the Parliament) had spoken dangerous and seditious Words tending to the disturbance of the Peace and quiet of this Kingdom, it was ordered that he should be sent for up into Custody.

Richard Pepper was by the Board committed to *Newgate*, for endeavouring to corrupt the Kings Evidence against *Thomas Thwing* a Priest, and *Mary Pressick* now in *Newgate*.

And *Philip Bisse* was sent to the *Gatehouse*, for dangerous and seditious words.

Whitehall, Febr. 21. His Majesty has been pleased to declare *Sir Palmes Fairborne* Lieutenant-Governor of *Tangier*, in the room of Colonel *Dungen*, and accordingly he is preparing for his speedy Voyage thither. Upon his arrival, the Earl of *Inchiquin*, the Governor, has obtained leave to come

for *England*, in whose absence *Sir Palmes Fairborne* is to command in chief. The *Fame* and *Swan* Frigates are sailed for *Kinsale*, there to take on board four Companies of the Earl of *Dumbarton's* Regiment, and to carry them to *Tangier*, and four Companies more of that Regiment are appointed for that Service, which *Sir Palmes Fairborne* will touch at *Kinsale* to take on board the Ships that go with him. There is also a Supply of Money provided for the Garrison.

Whitehall, Febr. 22. His Majesty at the request of the Right Honourable the Earl of *Offory*, General of His Majesties Subjects in the service of the States General of the United Provinces, has been pleased to give leave that the Drums do beat for the raising of Volunteers to recruit the English Regiments in the said service, and such as shall come in will be well entertained, and find embarkation ready.
