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Dublin, April 1. This day iffued out a Proclamation from the Lord Lieutenant, his Grace the Duke of Ormond, and his Councel, declaring and publishing His Majesty's Resolution and Declaration, upon the Advice of the Lords of Hishonourable Privy Councel, for the taking off all Refraints upon the Exportation of all Commodities of the gowth and manufacture of the Kingdom of Ireland, taking e, that nothing be done therein for Trade to or with His Majesty's foreign Plantations, further or otherwise then the Laws allow, or in prejudice to His Majesty's Charter granted whe Canary Company: His Majesty having given Order to his Royal Highnels, Lord High Admiral of England and Ireland, to enable and furnish the Lord Lieutenant, or ber chief Governour or Governours of this Kingdom of Ireland, with fuch Paffes or fafe Conducts as may fecure my of their Ships loaden in any part of Ircland, to France, Holland , Denmark , and Norway , and to any part of the World in Amiry with his Majefty, where a free I rade fhall be permitted, in their going thither and return, and like Passes or safe Conducts to secure any ship or ships bound fr m any of the faid places or Counties, to Ireland, in their going or teturn thence, except to His Mijesty's foreign Plantations or to the paris within the Chaiter of the Canary Com-

C nudering likewise that the Importation of Linen and Woollen Musufactures, and Stockings, and Glover, and cther Commodities out of Scotland into Ireland , exhaufts great fums of money yearly from hence, and may be a great hinltance and interruption to the Manufactures of this Kingdom; All perfons whatfoever, and particularly all Mafters and Owners of any Stip, Berque, Boat, or other Veffel, are frictly charged and commanded, that they not any of them presume not after the Tanth of May next, to Import from any part of Scotland into any part of this Kingdom, any Linen or Woolien Manufactures, or any Stockings or Gloves, or other Commodities whatfoever: His Majesty's Customers, Collector, Controllers, Searchers, and Waiters of all an i every the Ports of this Kingdom, and the fe-veral Creeks and members thereof, being thrictly charged and commanded to make diligent fearch and inqui y upon the arrival of any Ship, &c. to make flay of all such prohibited Commodities, till further direction from the faid Lieutenant, or chief Governour or Governours to whom they are to fend speedy advertisement of such stay made by them, and to apprehend, or cause to be apprehended not only the Mafter of fuch Veffel, er, wherein luch Commodities the be found, but also any perfon or perfons owning the fame, or with whom they shall be found, and to convey them to one of His Mijesty's Justices of the Peace, next adjoyning to the pl coof their apprehention, to be examined, with the proofs of their contempts contrary to this Proclamation : The Justices, if they fi ide cause, to commit fuch per-on Soffending to the next Spice-Goal to the place of their sporthenfin, there to continue till they fall have put in good an i fuffi ient fecurity before fuch Justice of Peace, with sondition to appear perforably before the Lord Lieute-

nan:, or other chief Governour or Governours of the Kingdoni, Ge. within Ten days after fuch Security given, the uttice to fend their Examinations to the Clerk of the Councel, as will more largely appear by the Proclamation

Ertford, April 5. The Bithop of Metz is lately strived here in Post from Vienna, and has had several Conferences with his Highnels the Elector of Magence, intending in few days to pals from hence for Cologne. The Affairs of this City are in a quiet posture, and in all probability like to continue fo, there being a right under Randing pre erved between our Elector and the Elector of Saxe, notwithftanding all endeavours to the contrary

The Sweder Relident Rill continues in the Court of the Elector of Saxony , and the Refident from France here, where our Elector, as 'cis believed, intends ro continue, till fome refult be known of the proceeding of the Affembly at

The Affairs between the Swedes and the City of Bremen are ftill in the dark. By a Letter from a Swedes Minifter to this Court, we are told, that his Majefty of Swedeland had given Order to General Wrangell to take such care in the Quartering of his Souldiers, that the Country might not re-

From Poland we are newly advised, That the Queen there continues dangeroufly ill, with little hopes of recovery 3 that the King had not yet so well recovered his health, as to adventure into the Alr, but was forced to hold a Councel in his Anti Chamber, where he expressed himselt much farisfied with the late Treaty with the Mufcovites, and gave particular thanks to the Commiffioners that were intrufted with it, promiting them speedy farisfaction for their Expences, and induftry in that great work.

Venice , April 8. We are ftill allarum'd with the Turkish Pr. parations both by Sea and Land, for the carrying on their D fign upon Candia; all parts of the Empire being concerned, either for the fitting up of Vellels, levying of M n, or furnishing out Provisions for that Service. Morea, and especially Salonicha, being full of Souldiers, who wait for the opportunity to transport themselves. In the mean time they are in great want of Victuals at Carea, and all tother places in that Island ; which forces their men to shift their Quarters, and frequently their Party; the Grand Visier being un-willing to relieve them out of his publick Stores, till he have fir & formed his Siege , and fee down with his Army be-

The Marquels Ville having not met with Captain General Morofini at Zant , as he expected , is gone for Cephalonia , to take in some Souldiers and Provisions, which he intends to fend away with all expedition to Candia. Our Fleet is fill about Pares, from whence fresh Squadrons are continually relieving one another, and cruifing to hinder the Enemies relief of Canea; they meet frequently with good Prizes; particularly, the Proveditor Barbaro, in his way from Candia, lighted on two confiderable Veffels, laden with Provisions and several Commodities of good value.

We are here haftning our another Convoy with Provisions and other Necessaries for our Fleet. The two great Ships building in the Arsenal, will be in few dayes launched.

Some few days fince a Turkish Vefiel fell into our hands laden with Wax and other good Merchandizes of Albania, to a confiderable value, taken up at Duraggo, an unusal place for lading of Goods: The Captain and several other Turks taken in the Ship, inform us, That the Tarks intend to fet up & S ale of Trade in that place, for the advantage of Albania, and that the defigne has been already propoied to the Grand Seignior; and in all probability may be effected.

Some Letters from Aleppo tell us of fome diversion the Turks are like to finde in Melopotamia, where 40000 Men have taken Aimes under the Command of a itout perfon and an able Soulaier, the Son to a Cheriff there, who has been already encouraged with some fuccess, having taken in feveral places of strength, out of which they have forced the Turkish Garrisons.

Vienna, April 12. The Abbot Protimofchi, Envoyé from His Majefty of Poland, continues ftill his addre s and application to this Court for fuccours, but has not yet received any pefficive answer from his Imperial Majesty, but 'cis generally believed, he will in the end receive the farisfaction he defires : 'Tis faid, he has Orders to make his Applications likewise to the Diet at Ratichen, where the Sates of the Empire fill continue their Allembly.

Our Letters from Transilvania and Walachia feem to perswade us, that neither the Turks or Tartars intend: any invafion upon Poland ; but of their future invention we may be able torqueis further by a Courrier, whose return is

This Court is grown of late very thin by the departure of the Princes of Lorain and Sultbach, with the Marqueffes of Durlach and Baden, and the Bilbop of Meig, with feveral other persons of quality, all of them being returned to their particular Refidencies and Charges.

All our Military Officers are by the late Order from the Councel of Wat, repairing to their respective Commands, where they are to put their Milicia into fuch a postere, as to

be ready to march upon the first Orders.

Hague, April 24. The Motion made some time fince by De Wisse in the Assembly of the States General, for the lend ing onely two Plenipotentiaries to the Tresty in the behalf of all the P. ovinces, with some other Proposals, that as awas thought might have given observation to the desired work, were absolutely rejected and thrown by. The several Ptovinces are since proceeding to the Nomination of their Departies. On Friday last it was agreed by the States here, that the Heer Beveringh should be fent as Plenipotentiary from hence, to affift at the Treaty ; and an Express was disparche to him, to acquaint nim with their Nomination. Monsieur Courtin is every day expected with the fame Character from France. The King of Denmark bith fent full power to the Heers Clingenbergh and Charinius, for the same purpose. The firk being Refident Extraordinery , the other Ordinary, from that Court.

Forn Rosterdam they tell us, that the Veffels lying before the Briel , are to be paid off , and 'tis believed , will be speedily resdy to put to Sea. The Men of War at Helvoecflays, lie all of them upon the Stream , whither De Ruyter, Van Neff, and Liefde, with other Captains, are gone, to fee

Vice-Admiral Tromp was some time fince at Rotterdam in much Galiantry , being lately matried to Madam Helmont, a rich Widow of Amsterdam. The Burgers and Sea-men at his appearance in the Streets, following him with their Acclamations, and thronging after him, with Vive Le Tromp; which is ill referred both here and in other places.

From Amflerdam they tell us, that the great Veffels can-no: yet paffe the Pampus for want of water, nor are like to do , while the Wind continues Estward ; and that the Ships at Hoorne, Buchuyfen; Medenblick , and Friefe, are kept in upon the same account. About 12 or 13 of their Frigats lie ready to fall at the Texel, with a Fleet of about 60 Merchants, defigned by the North for Spain and the Streights. The Veffels intended for the East and West Indies, will

not go out till the Fleet be ready.

Falmouth, April 14. Yesterday Captin Ware Commander of a private Man of War, brought into Scilly two Prizes, one laden with Salt, the other with Wines and Brandies : We are affured that the Sickness is gotten much into the French Fleer, and that particularly out of one of their Ships, called the Prince, of 70 Guns, and 600 Men, have been taken ou: 300 persons, infected with the Plague.

Teal, April 18. This Afternoon arrived here two Ships from Virginia, one trem Barbadoes, two from Lieben, and about twelve West Country-men, under the Convoy of Man of War.

Ditto, April 20. Here is this day arrived an Offender from Bilbea, another of the fame place from the Greet full of Souldiers bound homewards, they fpeak also of fourteen larger Veffels coming from the Groyn, laden with Souldiers for Flanders.

Southwold, April 19. Here are now pading by this place a lufty Ficet of 300 Sail of Laden Colliers , with their Convoys, to the Southwards; which we suppose will speedily

arrive fafely in the Thames.

Dover, April 20. Here is this Afternoon arrived a small Shallop, a Privateer of 12 Tuns, and about 30 Men, Peter Kenton Commander ; having at Sea met with two Fr Privateers one of five, the other of two Guns ; with whomhe engaged for about two hours, board to board; and in the end forced them both to quit the Dispute, and with all the Sail they could make, to lave themselves; after fome fruites pursuit, he returned hieler; having onely four men hurtin

the fight.

Whitehal , April 20. On Wednelday laft, being the 17th Inftant, the fail Commission was opened in the Inner Star-Chamber in Wesimiaster; where were present, according to a Summons from the Right Honourable the Lords of His Majesties most Honourable Privy Council, to them in that part directed; the Right Honourable the Earls of Bridgwater and Aylefbury , the Lords Lucas and Crew , together with Sir William Loneher, Sir Humphry Winch, Sr Thomas Littleton, Sir Thomas Gower, Sir William Thompson, Gi'es Strangwayes, William Garway, John Jones, &c.

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
