Whitehall, March 10. Esterday was published His Majesties Procla-Y mation, For the Apprehending of Robbers or Highway-men, and for a Reward to the Apprehenders.

And this day, That Against Duels.

CHARLES R.

E minding to Secure all Our Loving Subjeds in Travelling and going about their Lawfu' Occasions, do hereby Publish and Declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure to be, And We do hereby Command all Our Officers of Justice, and other Our Loving Subjects, That they use their utmost diligence and endeavor for the Apprehending all Robbers or Highway-men, to the end they may be proceeded against according to Law. And for the Encouragement of such as shall Apprehend any such Offender or Offenders, We are Graciously pleafed, and do bereby Declare, That such person or person sons who shall at any time before the Second day of March next, Apprehend any Robber or Highway-man, and cause him to be brought into Custody, shall within Fifteen days after his Convistion, have a Reward of Ten pounds for every such Offender so Apprehended and Convitted: And all and every Sheriffs and Sheriff of the respective Counties and Sheriffswicks where such Convicton shall be had, are, and in hereby Required, up-on the Certificate of the Judge, or Two or more Justices of the Peace before whom such person or persons shall be Convided of such Apprehension and Conviction, to pay unto the person or persons who shall Apprehend such Offender or Offenders, the Reward aforesaid, within the time aforesaid, for each and every Offender so Apprehended and Convicted as aforesaid, out of Our Moneys received by such Sheriff or Sheriffs in that County where such Conviction shall be, which shall be allowed unto him or them upon his or their Accompts in the Exchequer; for the Allowance whereof, this Proclamation foall be a sufficient Warrant. And lastly, We do hereby Charge and Command all Lieutenants, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bayliffs, and other Officers and Persons whatsoever, to take notice of thu our Rayal Proclamation, and give due Obedience thereunto, and also to be Aiding and Assisting in all things tending to the Execution thereof, so they tender Our Displeasure, and upon pain of being proceeded against as Contempers of Our Royal Authority.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Fifth day of March 1679. In the Two and Thirtieth Year of Our Reign.

Hereas it is become too frequent, especially with Persons of Luality, under a vain Pretence of Honour, to take upon th m to be the Revengers of their Private Quarrels by Duel, and single Combate, which ought not to be, upon any Pretence or Provocation whatsever; We considering that the Sin of Murther is detestable before GOD, and this way of prosecuting saturation, Scandalous to Christian Religion, and the manifest Violation of Our Laws and Authority, out of Our Pious Care to prevent Unchristian and rash effusion of Bloud, do by thu Our Royal Proclamation strictly Charge and Command all Our Loving Subjects of what Luality Soever, That they do not either by themselves, or by others, by Message, Word, Writing. or other ways or means, Challenge, or cause to be Chalenged, any person or persons to Fight in Combate, or single Duel, nor carry, accept, or conceal any such Cha!lenge or Appointment, nor actually Fight any Juch Duel muth any of Our Subjects or others, or as a Second, or otherwise accompany or become Assist nt therein. And We do hereby, to the intent that all persons may take care to prevent the Dangers they may incur by alting or assisting in any such Duel, Declare Our Royal Pleasure, That We will not Grant Our Pardon to any person or persons that scall Fight, or be any way aiding or con-cerned in any such Duel where any person shall be slain, or die of his Wounds. received therein, but will leave all Juch persons to the utmost rigour and severity of the Laws; And further, That We will not suffer or endure any person or persons to be or remain in Our Court, who shall presume to intercede in the behalf of any person or persons that shall Offend contrary to this Our Proclamation. And for the better avoiding all such Duels, We do bereby fraitly Charge and Command all person and persons whatsoever who is all receive or know of any Clallenge sent or delivered as aforesaid. That they do forthwith give notice thereof to some of Our Privy Council, or otherwise to some Fusice of Peace near the place where such Offence shall be committed, upon pain of Our highest Displeasure, and being left to be proceeded against according to the strikest rigeur and severity of the Laws.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Ninth day of March 1679. In the Two and Thirtieth year of Our Reign.
