

They in Garrison at *Charlemont* had possessed themselves of *Carris* and the Castle of *Amont* (which they say are Dependencies of *Cosentment*), having obliged the Spanish garrisons to leave them. Mr. *Carr* has received a Commission from His Majesty of *Great Britain* to be Consul for the English Nation in these Provinces, and will reside at *Amsterdam*. There is a discourse that a new Regiment of Guards will be formed of disbanded Officers. The States of *Holland* meet again to-morrow.

Plymouth, March 5. Yesterday came into this Port the *Exchange of Padstow* from *Ireland*. We have had for these eight days past very tempestuous weather, though God be thanked we hear not of any great losses at Sea, only a Dutch and French Vessel laden with Wine and Brandy were cast away some days since near *Mounts-Bay*. Yesterday was burnt by the Officers of the Customs, a Parcel of Linnen Cloth, and Canvas, and 15 Tun of French Wine was Staved, pursuant to the Act of Parliament.

Stockton, March 5. On Saturday and Sunday last were cast away on this Coast two Vessels, one of which was a Scotch Bark laden with Barley for *Rotterdam*.

Weymouth, March 6. Here is arrived the *Benjamin* of this place, in seven weeks from *Malaga*, and in three from *Cadiz*, from whence she came in company of the *Four Brothers of London*, Captain *Warner* Commander, and 7 or 8 Ships more. Vice-Admiral *Herbert* came out at the same time and conveyed them part of their way. Captain *Warner* it's supposed is past by for the *Downes*.

Weymouth, March 8. Yesterday came in here the *Dolphin* of this place from the *Streights*, having on board the Master and 5 or 6 Seamen, belonging to the *Virgin* of *St. Malo's*, bound for the *West Indies*; which having sprung a Leak at Sea, was lost, but the men saved by the *Providence* of *London*, bound for the *Barbadoes*, whom the *Dolphin* met about 90 Leagues to the Westward of the *Lizard*, and took the said French men on board her, and landed them here.

Whitehall, March 9. Last night His Majesty and his Royal Highness did my Lord Mayor the Honor to Sup with him at his house in the *Old Fury*. Between 8 and 9 a Clock His Majesty and his Royal Highness attended by several of the Nobility, went thither, a great many Lights and Flambeaux being plac'd in the Balconies to light in the Streets they pass'd, and the Trained-Bands, that had the Guard, making a Lane from *Cheapside* to his Lordships house, where the Lord Mayor, accompanied with several of the Aldermen and the Sheriffs, received them at the Gate, amidst the Shouts of the people. The entertainment was very great and noble, there being several Tables in distinct Rooms. At that prepared for the King and the Duke, His Majesty was pleas'd to command the Lady Mayores, the Sheriffs Ladies, the Lord Mayor, and several of the Nobility, to sit down with Him, the Aldermen attending His Majesty, who, after Supper, was pleas'd to confer the Honor of Knighthood upon *W. Gullson* Esq; a near Relation to the Lord Mayor. The King and the Duke (who were extremely pleas'd with their Entertainment and the whole Carriage of it) returning to *Whitehall*, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs, waited upon them thither, and the City Guards to the *Temple*, being followed with great numbers of people making loud Acclamations of long Life and Health to the King and the Duke, while others were demonstrating the same dutiful Affections towards them by making Bonfires, and ringing of Bells.

This morning the Lord Mayor and the Sheriffs came to *Whitehall*, and waited upon His Majesty, and afterwards upon his Royal Highness, to return them his most humble Thanks for this great Honor they had been pleas'd to do him; which he assured his Majesty and his Royal Highness he was extremely sensible of.

Whitehall, March 10. This morning between 4 and 5 a clock His Majesty and his Royal Highness parted from hence for *Newmarket*; as her Majesty likewise did about two hours after.
