This morning the Lord Mayor and the Sheriffs came to Whiteball, and waited upon His Majesty, and afterwards upon his Royal Highness, to return them his most humble Thanks for this great Honor they had been pleased to do him; which he assured his Majesty and his Royal Highness he was extremely fenfible of.
