## Lisbon, Februtity 6.

苑HE Cortes are going to be diffolved, having fully complyed with the Princes delires, which were, to have the former Taxes continued, and a Million of Cruladoes raifed for the defraying the preientn-ceffities. The Prince, Queen, and Infanta are at Salvaterra, a frnall Palace about 12 Leagucs from hence up the Riven which the Prince very much delights in, becaufe of the abundance and va iety of Game that is there. They will. return hither about the beginning of the next month.

Legon, Feb. 19. Some Gentlemen who came lately from France tell us, that in Savoy they overtook a great many Mules laden with Ammunition, and other Military Provifions, that were going for Pignerol; and indeed it is the general expectation of thele parts, that Italy will be fuddenly involved in a War; and therefore the Princes that think rhemfelves moft concerned'begin to talk of making Leagues, in which it were to be wilhed they would make as much hafte, as the cafe feems to require. The 1 oth inftant Thomas Derebam Efq; who comes to Refide as the King of England's Refident at the Court of Flurence, arrised here, and three days fince had his Audience of the great Duke at $P_{1} \int_{a}$, being accompanied with all the Englifh Gentlemen and Merchants that were here. Yefterday the Great Duke came hither, and vill continue here about a fortnight, and then return to Florence. There are now in this Port the Centurion, the Nonefuch, the Mary-Rofe, and the Referve, which two latter are on their departure for Eingland.

Venice, Febr: 23 . On Monday latt the Imperial Ambaffador made his publick Entry into this City, which he did with great folemnity, and the next day had his Audience of the Senate. It is faid he has particular orders to acquaint them with the great care the Emperor has for the preferving the peace of Ialy, and how readily he will contribute his part of what thall be judged neceffary in order thereunto, and that his Imp rial Majefty doubts,not but this Republick will have the fame concern: and a watchful eye. for the preventing, as far as in them lies, whatever may tend to the difturbing of the faid Peace.

Stockbolme. Febr. 21. The King is expected this day at $\mp a c o b j d a l$, from whence he will come privately hither, and after a very fhort ftay, will return to Helmflatt, where he will confunimate his Martiage, and convoke the States of the Kingdom,

Prague, Marck 6. The Rebels in Hungary being lately denied entrance by the Tranfluanians, and thofe Hungardans that are Tributaries to the Turk3, into their Country, ated being in great diflrefs, fent to General Leflie to know whether he had any inftructions to treat a Peace with them, who anfueting, He bed not, they defired a Celfation of Arms,
and the Countries of Litta and Aruafor a rétreat ${ }^{3} 3$ which he denied them alfo, reproaching them with their former abule of the Emp.rors Clemency, when about 18 months fince, upon their Overture of a fubmiffion, he afingned them a Country to retreat into, and was fo far difappointed of his expectation; that they n:ot only continued in their Rebellion, bute likewife feduced all the Inhabitants of that Country. But told them, Tbat to fuch as would lad. down their Arms and fubmit themfelves, be bad rouer to grant a full Pardon. But General Leflie going to Silefis, in his abfence Count Strafoldo granted them the Ceffation they defired; which the Emperor is much offended ar ; and has appointed Count Caprara to go and command his Troops in Hungary. It is the difcourfe ar Court that the Emperor int nds to go to Ratimbonne, and that in the meantime he will have an Enterview with lome Princes of the Empire at Egra. Count Lamberg is going fot Berliz; and from chençe to Denmark.

Cologne, Marth ro. It is the wonder of every body that our Elector fill contipues here, without any thoughts that appear to the World, of his returning to his anticnit Refidence at Boinne, which fome impute entirely to the inclinatiun be has of living retired. The endeavors that have been fo often uled as well by the Imperialits as by the French to prevail with him to admit of a Coadjutor, have hitherto proved unfuccefful, fo that the Pretenders muft it feems have patience till his place be empty.
Cologne, March 19. Our Elector has refulved to demolifi the Fortifications of Rbinbeig, and inltead of them to build a Cittadel. From above they write as if there were fome apprehenfions of the Plague at Ratisbonne, and that thert, had been a motion made to remove the Djer to Augsburg or Francfort.

Bruffels, March 5. Eleven of the twelve Walloon Regiments in the fervice of the $\int$ e Provinces, are fully eompleated to the number of 900 men in cach and the twelfth, which is Count Tilie's, will be full by the end of this month; but we cannotfay fo much of the Spanifh Regiments, which we are told 4000 men are coming from Spain to recruit ; The Germaff Regiments, whichare to be 14 , will be 600 in each except three in Luxemburg, who are to be 1200 in each. In all there are to ${ }^{\circ}$.be 47 Regiments of Foot, the leatt whereof isto confit in $500 \mathrm{~m}, n$, and 190 Troops of Horle, which at prefent are to have $25 \mathrm{~m}=\mathrm{h}$ in each, and if there be occafion they are to be made up 40 befides Officers; and 20 Contpunies of Dragoons, which will be the ftanting Horce bf the Ce Provinces. His Exceliency hasreceived a very confiderable fuppiy by thishalt Polffrom Spain. Ont Commiffouners for regulating the Lifits are fthl at Courtray, though wirhout any freat appearance of bringing matters to an iflive; fur the French feem refolved to come to no conclufion dibut fuch as they themfelves propofe.

Brufels , March 15. On Saturday in the ceve-
ning the Parquis de Valparai, 0 , and the Lady Frances F-mard, were married in the Chappel of the Court, in the prefence of the Duke and Dutchefs de Villa Fieymbla, and the Duke and Dutchefs of dorfolk. From France we have an account, that a great many Troops march-towards Daupbine and Languedor, and among others five Regiments of Suiffers, which makes'every body conclude there is a defign upon Italy, and that Kings Journy towards thefe parts is fixed for the fecond of Maj; he will pafs through all his Conquefts as well in thele Countries as in Germany, and be abread moft of the Summer, and people can hardly think it will be a journy only of pleafure. The French feem not as yet to have any thoughts of guitting Dinant. From Spain we have an account. that the Duke de Medina Celi was declared firf Minifter of State.
Brufels, Mareb 22. The French have lately feized teia Villages in the Country of Aloft, which they fay are a dependence of the fimpire, to whom they uill gire an account of their proceedings hereis; Thus they give this Court every day new caule of perplexity? and his Excellency is Fending Monfieur $d y V_{a} l$ to $p$ aris about it. The matter of the Limits remains undetermined, atd it's feared the Commifioners will be forced to part without coming to any determination in it. We have certain advice that the French Troops in Lorrain are marching towards Allace. To morrow the Durchefs of Modena parts hence for Ojfend, where the will embark for England.

Hague, March 22. The States General have offered the Elcetor of Brandenburg 82000 Crowns for Arrears of Subfidies he pretends due to him; but he is not fatisfied therewith, and demands a much greater Sum, The States of Holland having a de-
 rable Colonf, Have writ to the feteral Admiralties and to the wreft India Company at Amfterdam to have their adrice thereupon. The Sieltit dmerongen the Dutch Minifter at the Elector of Brandenburg's Court, writes, that his EleCtoral Highnels was expeefing with fome impatience the arrival of the Envoys that are on their way to him from the Emgeror and the Kipg of Emgland.
Taris, Ma ch 20 . Oi Monday laft the'ring and the whole Courtaritred at ${ }^{\text {Bra }}$. Germnins, from whence the Eing intend ed to go this dayro Yarfilles, to fee his new buildings there sf and we are affired that in Mar his majefty will begin his journy for Plandersh and- perhaps from thenoe go for Lorrain and A facr, but that's not certain. The Jaft week Monfieer de B ifthand was leized in the County of Avignen; be was in the late War Colonel of the ciumpaipme Reginent, and thad the misfortune at the Army to kill another Offcer in a Duel (to which he that was killed gave hoth the Provocation and the Challenge) he then made his efcape, and loft his Regirment, as it's believed havill now do his life, to the trouble of moft people, who lament bis misfortune, as being a very gallant mian. Some days fince bappened as fad as extraordinary an accidert at drles, a young Lady of good quality, being courted by too Gentlemen, and the having declared her felf in favor of theone, the other one day meets them as thoy were walking abroad, and with a Poniard firt fabs to the heart his Tival, then tris wilfris; and laftly himelf,and fo died all three cogether. The Chamber of Poylons continges its purfuits, and hardly a day paffes but one or another is feized by its order. The general difcourfe begins pow to be of a War in 7taly.

Paris, Marcb 27. On Wed̉nefday arrived an Exprefs with the Duke of Mantue's Ratifications of the Treaty concerning CazaI, for which the King gives -him four Millions, and befides undertakes to caule the Troops that are now in Garion there to quit it:
at the fame time our Troups mircin that way. The Duke of Savcy Arms, which does not a little difquict the Genouefs, Fourteen Men of War are fitting out at Thoulon, and orders are fent thither for the equipping 14 more, to be employed in the Mediterramean. The Maltba Gallies have taken the Turkifh Convoy that was carrying the Tribute from Egypt to Conftantinople. The Kings journy to Flanders is put off till fuly, and fome think it quite broken. The Count $d^{\prime} E f$ tree is at Rocbefort, where he is fitting out five Capital Men of War, 3 Frigats, 2 Galliots, and 2 Firefhips.

Drate, Marcb 18. People here were amazed to hear what a formal Story was publiihed in the Intelligence of two Whates fighting, and a great many people being drowned, which was a perfect fiction.
Deaie, Ma ch 18. The Leopard, the Forffigbt, the Ruby, the Fbentx, the Nerrt ch, and the Solda loes, with the Merchants Ships, are ttill in the Desmens.
Dealc, Mace 19 This morning the Raby, Captain Ullew Commander, wayed and failed our of the Downes, having on board the Portugal Ambaffador, who is returning home. The $L_{\text {eopa }} \cdot d$, Sir foim Berry, on board of whom is the Drke of Grafun and Sir Patmes Fairborre, Lieutenant-Governor of Tangie, and the whole Fleet of Merchant Ships are now likewife under Sail, the Wind at North and by Ealt.
D ais, Mdrcb 20. Yefterday towards night the Wind dulled xand Sin-7a, Berrys with the scandoronemand other Merchans Ships under his Convoy came to an Anchor again in the Drwnesr. Fhere is now a fmall breath of Wind at Sourth and by Eaft.
