General having writ to the several Provinces to communicate to them the advice of the Council of State concerning the building 36 Men of War, and the demand they made of Mony for that service; the States of Holland have approved the same, and have resolved forthwith to raise their Proportion of the Sum required. The Stat. s of Holland have likewise agreed to the State of the War for this present year, as it has been formed by the Prince of Orange and the Council of State, without making any alteration therein. Notwithlanding all the instances of the Cologne Minister, the States are resolved not to part with Maseycke and Hasselt, till they have Satisfaction from that Elector, which is a matter that may occasion some difference between them, and the grather for that the Prince of Orarge has fent orders to the Garifons in those places, to summen in the neighbouring Country to pay their Arrears of Contributions, and in default thereof to proceed to Military execution. And on the other fide the Elefor of Cologne, to whom those places belong, as Bishop of Liege, has commanded his Subjects not to pay the faid Contributions; and that in case Force he employed against them, they do resist the same with Force. The Lord Bodmyn, the King of England's Envoy Extraordinary to Denmark, has fince his arrival here waited upon the Prince, and received the Visits of most of the Foreign Ministers; and it's believed hisLordship will in a day or two purfue his journy to Copenhagen. The Princess of Grange has been very ill of the Chollick, but her Highness is at present much better, and in a fair way of recovery. Lieutenant-General Spaen continues still here to sollicite the payment of the Arrears of Subsidies, which the Elector of Brandenburg his Matter, pretends to be due to him from this State.

Falmouth, March 12.
