Copy of a Letter from Admiral the Earl of St. Vincent's Commander in Chief of His Majefty's Ships and Veffels on the Coaft of Portugal, to Evan Ne-pean, Efg; dated on Board the Ville de Paris, at Sea, the 21st of February, 1798.

SIR,

SIR,

VOU will herewith receive Letters from Captain Lord Henry Powlett, of His Majelty's Ship the Thalia, and Captain Downman, of the Speedy Sloop, the first giving an Account of the Capture of a French Privateer, and the latter detailing an Action between the Speedy and another of the Enemy's Privateers, which does great Honor to her Captain, Officers and Company.

ST. VINCENT.

Thalia, at Sea, February 6, 1798.

ON the 5th Instant, at Four, A. M. Cape Finif-terre being S. W. Seventy Leagues, I came up with and captured the Antoine French Privateer Brig, mounting 16 Guns and having 70 Men: She was returning from a Cruize to Rochelle, hav-ing captured Five Neutral Veffels.

Speedy, Tagus, February 16, 1798.

My Lord,

I HAVE the Honor to acquaint you, that on the 3d Inftant, at Day-light, being Seventeen Leagues West of Vigo, we discovered a Brig bearing down on us with all Sail fet. At Three P. M. being within Half a Mile of us, the hauled her Wind, and opened her Fire; on which we made all Sail to clofe, engaging her until Half pait Five, when the tacked, and made Sail from us. I immediately tacked, con-tinuing to engage till Half patt Seven, when, from her Advantage of failing and little Wind, the got out of Gun-ihot. Owing to the great Swell, we received little Damage, having only cur Fore Topmail thot through, with some of the Running Rig. ging cut. It falling calm, and the Vefiels fepa-rating against all our Efforts with the Sweeps, I had the Mortification, about Twelve o'Clock, to fee

her fire feveral Guns at our Prize that we had taken the Day before, Owing to the good Conduct of the Mafter, who, with Twelve Men, were on Board the Prize, battened down Twenty-fix Spaniards, and made their Efcape in a fmall Boat. At Day-light a Breeze of Wind fprung up, which enabled us to fetch her. At Eight o'Clock fhe, being within Gunfhot, tacked, and made all Sail from us, rowing with her Sweeps at the fame Time. We chaced her until Noon, when they finding fhe had the Heels of us, fhortened Sail, wore, and flood towards us, with a Red Flag flying at the Main Too Gallant Maft Head. At Half paft Twelve, being within Piftol-fhot, we began to engage her, with the Wind upon the Larboard Quarter. At Two obferving her Fire to flacken, I thought it a good Opportunity to lay her on Board, but at Laftat Infant the work and came her on Board, but at that Inflant fhe wore, and came to the Wind on the Starboard Tack; but finding us clofe upon her Starboard Quarter, and from our Braces aud Bow-Lines being shot away, our Yard coming square, she took the Opportunity to put be-fore the Wind, and made all Sail from us. We immediately wore after her, firing Mulquetry at each other for Twenty Minutes, and fo foon as the lower Maft was fecured, fet our Studding Sails, and continued the Chace until Seven P. M. when we loft Sight of her, from her fuperior failing. I then hauled our Wind, and made fhort Tacks all Night to fall in with our Prize; at Day-light faw her to Windward; at Ten P. M. retook her, with Ten Frenchmen on Board. I learn from the Prize-Mafter, the Brig is called the Pappilon, 360 Tons Burthen, pierced for 18 Guns, mounting 14, 4 Twelve and 10 Nine Pounders, manned with 160 Men. We had 5 Men killed and 4 badly wounded, I have to regret the Lofs of Lieutenant Dutton and Mr. Johnston, Boatswain, amongst the Killed. I beg Leave to recommend to your Lordship's Notice Mr. Marshall, Master, for his good Conduct during the Action. Every Praise is due to the Ship's Company for their good Behaviour. As all our lower Masts, Bowfprit, Main Boam, both Topmalts and most of the Yards shot through, with all the Standing and Running Rigging cut, I thought proper to put into Lisbon to repair our Damage.
