Francfort, April. 4. The Marquis de Bareith of the House of Brandenburg having formerly raised a Regiment of Horef r the Emperor, and being fines disbanded though he had kept it at his own the received has taken so great a distribution thereat, that he has accepted of a Commission of Colonell of Horse in the French service, which Monssier Verjus the French Minister at Ratisforme lately delivered to him.

Strasburg, April, 5. The Sieur Vauban, the French Engemer, is come again into these parts to visit the new Fortifications, which are carried on with all the deligence possible. The French are preparing to quit Lutzelstein. They Fortific Nancy, which they say will be made one of the strongest

places in Europe.

Copenhagen, March 27. The Treaty conterning the evacuation of Wismar is not yet toncluded; however, it's believed the Marriage will be confummated about the middle of the next Month.

Hamburg, Mareb 31. It is strongly reported here, that the Northern Crowns have accepted the Alliance proposed by France, which most people do not however give oredit to, especially as sor Benmark. The Queen of Sweden leaves Copenhagen the 5th of 6th of May, and will be received at Helmstadt by the King of Sweden on the 8th. The King of Denmark is coming into Holstein, which gives this City new Umbrage. On Saturday last arrived here Sir Robert Southwel, Envoye Extraordinary from the King of England to the Elector of Brandenburg, he was received by Sir Peter Wyche, His Majestys Minister here, and by Samuel Missenden Essist the Deputy and the rest of the Company of Merchant-Adventurers residing here, with great Civilities and Respects, and is this day entertained by them at the English House. The Senate has Compliment-

ed him by their Deputies, and made him the ulual Present of Wines, and on Thursday he continues his journey to Berlin.

Cologne, April 5. The House of the Dean of this Cathedral is preparing for the reception of Prince William of Furstemberg, who is expected here in few days from Paris. People discourse variously concerning his coming hither. Both French and Spanish Otheers are making Levies in these parts. There are Letters from Liege which say, that the French pretend to the Lands Lying between the Sambre and the Meuse, which belong to the Chapter of Liege, as being a dependance on Charlemont.

Cologne, April. 9. The Dutchels Dowager of Honouer arrived here two days fince; the report that was firead abroad of her being with Child, proves a militake, as her own Servants declare. The Prince of Furstemberg is expected at Liege bestore he comes hither, where he will it's faid endeavor to dispose that Chapter to seave Dinant in the hands of the French, who in consideration thereof will assist them to recover Hasself and Maseycke from the Dutch. From Prague we have an account of new disturbances among the Boord in Bohemia, who they say have got severed reformed Officers among them, and that the Emperor had ordered a Regiment of Horse to march to quest them.

Hagne, April, 12. The States of Holland have agreed to the raining of 1045000 Gilders, to build the 18 Men of Warr which are defigned to be finished this year, but as for the way of doing it, they are not yet come to any Refolvtion, and according to all probability it will take up much of their time the next week, when they are to seperate till the latter end of the next Month. The Well-India Company have made their report to the States General concerning the improving the Island of Tobago into a Plantation. The Envoy of the Elector Palasine, is to have an Audience to morrow of the vates General, whom it's faid he has orders to press very carnelly to pay the arrears of Subsidies they owe to the Emperor, upon which the Elector His Master has an Allignment. The Minister of this State at Stockholme writes that he had not yet been able to exchange the Rustifiations of the Treaty of Peace and Comm ree between that Crown and this tate. The Princ set of Orange is now so well recovered that the begins to go abroad.

Taunton, March. 30. At the Alizes, held here Mr. Thomas Dare was indicted for Seditious and da gerous words, &c. and being found guilty received judgment to pay 500 l. to the King 20 continue in Prifon till he had to dene, and so frand bound f r three years to his good behaviour. And accordingly, he was immediatly committed to the County Goal. At the faid Affizes the Grand Inquest made the following Presentment.

To the R ghelinorable Sir Thomas Jones Kt. one of His Majorine Judices of the Kings Bench, and one of the Judges of the Western Circuit; The Presentenent of the Crand Inquest of the Country of Sympton, for the Assizes held at Taunton for the County aforesaid, the 29th day of March in the 32 year of His Majesties Reign, 1680.

Hereas there was a Petition lately delivered Town of Taunton, Goldmith in the name of the Inhaby cants and Freebolders of the County of Somerfet, for the Sitting of the Parliament; we do utterly disown the faid Petition, and never consented to it, and do by no mans either approve of the Petition or the manner of pro-cuting bands to the same being of opinion that such manner of procuring hands fends to Sedition, and the alteration of the Government. And we do hereby Declare, that we, vith our Lives and Fortunes will defend His Majefi s most Sacred Person, His Heirs, and lawful Succeffors, and the true Protestant Religion established by Law, and now pratifed in the Church of Eng-1 nd against all opposers whatsoever

We render His Masely our most kumble thanks, for the recalling His Royal Highnels; as also for his de-claring his full Resolution, that the Laws against Popish Reculants hall speedily and effectually be put in execution, signified in a late Letter from the Lords of His Majesties most Honourable Privy Council, directed to the Fustices of the County; and also in your Lordships charge at the

beginning of this Assizes.
