WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 4th Day of November last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, (except as in the said Order is mentioned) will expire upon the 7th Day of this instant May: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 7th Day of this instant May, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to

extend, to prevent the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The humble Address of the Ministers and Elders, in their Synod assembled, of that Body of Dissenters from the Church of Scotland, commonly called Burgher Seceders.

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's very loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Members of the associate Synod of Presbyterian Dissenters, deeply sensible of the Blessings of a Constitution which secures to all their Civil and Religious Rights, and of the Virtues of a Sovereign, who for so many Years has been an Example to his People, can no longer contemplate in Silence those awful Dispensations of Providence, under which so many Governments have been shaken and overturned, and a great Military Power raised in the Centre of Europe, which, after menacing Conquest and Revolution to all around, it now seems to direct it's concentrated Animosity and Violence against these Realms, threatening with final Ruin all that has been there accumulated by the Efforts of Ages, for the Comfort and well being of Man; and at the same Time labouring insidiously to unnerve their Inhabitants, by disseminating and promoting Disaffection to your Majesty, Aversion to the Constitution, and Hostility to the Faith of the Gospel.

At such an eventful Period we beg Leave to lay at the Foot of your Majesty's Throne our humble Assurances, that we will unite in the general Effort which the Nation must now make for preserving it's Existence; and that we will, in the Congregations under our Pastoral Charge, zealously use that Influence which, under the mild and equal Laws of our Country, we enjoy, to rouse them to a Sense of their present Danger and Duty, and to recall to their Remembrance the Examples of Attachment to the illustrious House of Hanover, which their Fathers in the Secession have shewed in former critical Emergencies; and while we call on them to look to that God who holds in his Hand the Destiny of Nations,

and

and to trust in his superintending and gracious Providence, we will urge them to act like Men who have to contend for all that is dear to them, and to preserve from formidable and inveterate Foes themselves, their Families, their Possessions, and those invaluable Institutions which, according to their respective Natures, have proved the Sources of Civil Liberty here, and, we trust, the Means of eternal Salvation hereafter.

We humbly beseech your Majesty to accept these Assurances of our constant and inviolable Fidelity, of our Abhorrence of every traitorous Conspiracy, as contrary to the Holy Scriptures, and our avowed Principles, and of our sincere and fixed Resolution to exhort all within the Sphere of our Influence to persevere in their Duty and Allegiance.

Sire, we will not cease to pray, that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of Glory, may encompass your Majesty with his Favour as with a Shield; that he may abundantly bless your Majesty's Royal Consort, the Prince and Princess of Wales, and all the Royal Family; that he may sanctify to all your Subjects the present alarming Dispensations of Heaven; and that he may crown with Success the Exertions of your Majesty's Navy and Army, for securing us from Invasion, and thus laying a Foundation for your Majesty's negotiating an honourable Peace.

S I R,

I Have the Satisfaction of enclosing, for the In-
formation of my Lords Commissioners of the Ad-
miralty, a Letter I Yesterday received from Lieu-
tenant Price, Commanding Officer on the Islands of
St. Marcou, in which it will be found, that, by his
firm and steady Resistance, against a very consider-
able Force, those Islands have been saved falling
into the Hands of the Enemy.

The calm Weather had for some Days prevented
His Majesty's Ships under my Orders from checking
the Progress which the Flotilla from La Hogue
might attempt to make, and, judging from the in-
formation I received from Lieutenant Price on the
Morning of the 6th, that it was on its Way to the
Islands, I necessarily approached them as near as
the State of the Weather would permit me to do;
On the same Afternoon, however, I was obliged to
anchor, but, taking Advantage of a light Breeze in
the Evening, I again weighed and stood in. At Ten
o'Clock that Night, it again falling quite calm,
and fearing the Flood Tide would carry us too far
to the Eastward, the Ship once more anchored, the
Islands bearing W. by S. Six Miles.

A little

A little before the Dawn of Day the Enemy commenced the Attack, and the Boats were soon afterwards seen placed, and keeping up a constant Fire. A light Breeze springing up at that Time from the N. N. W. with an Ebb Tide, the Signal was made to weigh, and Captains Talbot, of the Eurydice, and Haggett, of the Orestes, were directed by me to stand in as fast as possible, and attack the Enemy in the Manner they should judge most effectual towards destroying them, on arriving up. While going down, however, it was perceived the Enemy was making his Retreat in a very hasty and confused Manner, and I am not altogether without Hope, that the near Approach of His Majesty's Ships in some Measure confirmed the Enemy in his Inclination of abandoning an Enterprize, which, from the very able Conduct, and well-directed Fire of Lieutenant Price, he would, at all Events, have been ultimately obliged to do. It again falling calm, and the Ships not having Steerage Way, rendered Pursuit on our Side impossible, and enabled them to make their Retreat to La Hogue.

It would be great Injustice in not joining with him in his very well bestowed Commendation on the Conduct of the several Officers and Men under his Command.

It may not be deemed improper to mention, that I this Morning saw some Pieces of Paper taken from the Vessel which has been towed in, and that amongst them there is a Sort of Return of the Crew, by which it appears that it consisted of 144 Men; the total Force, therefore, may have been very considerable, and there is every Reason to believe has suffered great Loss.

SIR,

I beg Leave to represent to you, that in consequence of the Information I received Yesterday, and the Movements of the Enemy at La Hogue, I conjectured they would attack us in the Night, about high Water, I therefore dispatched a Guard Boat, belonging to the Sandily, with Mr. Moore, Midshipman of the Eurydice, in her, to watch the Motions of the Enemy. About Twelve o'Clock he got amongst them, and made the Signal of their being in Motion, and about the same Time we clearly heard the Enemy talk, but it was so dark we could not discover them.

At Day-Break I observed their Line drawn abreast of the S. W. Face of the Western Redoubt, and having all my Guns I could bring to bear well pointed, I began a steady well-directed Fire on them, until the flat Boats came within Musquet Shot; when I observed Six or Seven of them go down, whilst the others took out the living Part of the Crews; one I am towing into the Islands, and the Remainder, consisting of 43, are returning into La Hogue. I am clear, from the crowded State of their Decks, that they must have received great Damage and Slaughter; but I am sorry to add, we had one Marine killed, and three severely wounded, and one Seaman wounded.

Lieutenant Bourne took every Method in his Power to assist me, but from the Situation of the Attack, the East Island was deprived for some Time

of doing much, but with the Shells from the 68-Pounders over the Length of the West Island, latterly did them great Damage, by flanking the N. W. Side of the West Island.

I beg leave to represent likewise to you that Lieutenants Maughan and Enfor with the Marines, Sergeant Henderson, and the Party of Artillery, and the Seamen under my Command, behaved as well as Officers and Men could do.

Copy of a Letter from Lieutenant Charles P. Price, dated on Board His Majesty's Gun-Vessel Badger, Isles St. Marcou, the 9th of May, 1798, to Ewan Nepean, Esq.

I beg Leave to represent to you, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that, on the 6th Instant, observing the Enemy forming their Gun-Boats and Flats in Divisions in the Road of La Hogue, I considered it a certain Appearance of an Attack, and ordered every Person to remain under Arms to receive them; I, at the same Time, sent a Guard-Boat off the Mouth of La Hogue to watch their Motions. Mr. Moore, Midshipman of the Eurydice, who commanded the Boat, acquainted me, by Signal, about Twelve P. M. of their approaching us, and soon after we heard them distinctly giving Orders to the Men; but the Night being very dark, and calm, we could not see them. At Day-Break I observed them in Line, drawn abreast of the South-West Face of the Western Redoubt, and having every Man in Readiness, I opened a brisk Fire, of Seventeen Pieces of Cannon, on them, when they immediately returned the Fire from Fifty-two Gun Brigs and Flats, for Two Hours and some Minutes. The Gun Brigs remained to batter within about Three or Four Hundred Yards; and the Flats rowed up to us with great Resolution until they were within Musket Shot, when our Guns, loaded with Round and Grape, or Case, for about One Hour, cut them up in Chips before they could retreat; and our Fire on the Boats attempting to save those sinking, must have occasioned great Slaughter, as they were crowded with Soldiers for the Purpose of storming us. I conjecture, from the small Flat, No. 13, I have towed in Bottom up having 129 of the 2d Company of the Battalion of Boulogne Marine on Board, that there were Six or Seven Thousand Men embarked; and of the Fifty-two that began the Action, I could discover only Forty-three able to retreat.

Lieutenant Bourne took every Method in his Power to assist me, but from the Situation of the Attack the East Island was deprived for some Time of doing much, but with the Shells from the Sixty-eight Pounders over the Length of the West Island, but latterly did them great Damage, by flanking the North-West Face of the West Island.

I am pleased to acquaint you, that Lieutenant Enfor, who commands the Party of Marines under my Command, behaved, with his Men, in a very extraordinary good Officer-like Manner, having the whole

Whole Face of the Redoubt to attend to. Lieutenant Maughan, with a Detachment of Twenty-two Marines, lent me from the Adamant, commanding the Two detached Guns and a Blockhouse, did great Execution; and it is impossible for me to describe the steady good Behaviour of Serjeant Henderson, with the Nine Artillery Gunners, Marines and Seamen.

I am sorry to announce the Death of Thomas Hall, private Marine, killed; Richard Dunn and Peter Williamson, Marines, wounded, and Thomas Banks, Seaman, wounded.

But considering our receiving the Fire of near 80 heavy Bow-Guns, from 30 to 18 Pounders, for upwards of two Hours, I look upon our Damage as not great. We had four Guns dismounted, but I got them fit for Service before Night.

Enclosed I send you Lieut. Bourne's Letter to me, the Morning after the Action.
