GEORGE R.

7HEREAS Robert Watson, late of Spa Fields, in the County of Middlefex, commonly called Doctor Watson, stands charged with Suspicion of High Treason; We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby requiring and commanding all Our loving Subjects to discover and apprehend the faid Robert Watson, otherwise Doctor Watson (who is about Five Feet Three Inches high, Thirty-three Years of Age, grey Eyes, high Forehead, dark Hair, bald on the Top of the Head, very thin, of a fallow Complexion, marked with the Small Pox, looks old for his Time of Life, and is lame of the left Leg; was born at Elgin in North Britain, and speaks a strong Scottish Dialect, was convicted at the Old Bailey in November, One Thoufand feven hundred and ninety-four, of publishing a feditious Libet, and received Sentence of Imprisonment for Two Years in Newgate), and to carry him. before some of Our Justices of the Peace, or Chief Magistrates of the County, Town or Place where he shall be apprehended, who are respectively required to fecure him, and thereof to give speedy Notice to Our Privy Council, or One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, to the End he may be forthcoming, and may be dealt withal, and proceeded against according to Law: And whoever shall discover and apprehend the faid Robert Watson, otherwife Doctor Watson, and bring him before such Justice of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate, or so discover him that he may be apprehended, shall receive a Reward of FOUR HUNDRED POUNDS; which faid Sum of Four Hundred Pounds the Lords Com-

missioners of Our Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly.

#### Whitehall, May 25.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, bave, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the sollowing Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artisticers or Manufacturers themfelves.

#### Statute 5 George F. Chap. 27.

F any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Atificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted shall offend again he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be

paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where fuch Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to feduce any fuch Artificer, or that any fuch Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majelty's Dominions, for the Purposes afore-faid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And, if such Person shall resule to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Affizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid; he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13. IF any Person shall contract with; or endeavour to seduce any Artisser in Wool, Moham, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufac-tures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or feduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED

HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forseiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forseit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such

Forseiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in. or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majelly's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall sind on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly sold to the bell Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize

and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Ossence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inslicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesly, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office

under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and For-

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound

directly for some Port in Great Britain or Irelands any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

Dublin-Caftle, May 22, 1798.

HIS Day the Right Honourable Lord Viscount Castlereagh acquainted the House of Commons, that he had a Message from His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant to that House, signed by His Excellency; and he presented the same to the House, which was read by Mr. Speaker, and is as follows:

CAMDEN.

AM to acquaint the House of Commons that in Consequence of the Disorders which have taken Place in the neighbouring Counties and of the Pre-parations which appeared to be making by the Difaffected in this Metropolis and its Vicinity, the Magistrates thought it proper to apply to the Lord Lieutenant and Privy Council to place the City under the Provisions of the Act passed in the Thirtyfixth Year of His Majesty's Reign, more effectually to suppress Insurrections and prevent the Disturbance of the public Peace: This application has been complied with, and I am now, with the utmost Concern, to inform the House of Commons, that I have received Information that the Disaffected have been daring enough to form a Plan for the Purpole of possessing themselves, in the Course of the present Week, of the Metropolis, of seizing the Seat of Government, and those in Authority within the City. In consequence of this Information, I have directed every Military Precaution to be taken, which feemed expedient. I have made full Communication to the Magistracy for the Direction of their Efforts, and I have no Doubt, that by the Measure which will be purfued, the Defigns of the Rebellious will be effectually and entirely crushed.

I have taken the earliest Opportunity of making this Communication, and have the fullest Confidence that I shall be supported by the Commons, in such Measures as shall be necessary finally to suppress the Rebellious Conspiracy which exists in this Kingdom.

In confequence of which the following Refolutions were unanimously agreed to by the House of Commons, who immediately, with their Speaker, proceeded on Foot to the Callle, and presented them to His Excellency.

Resolved.

That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, to return His Excellency our fincere Thanks for the Message he has sent this Day to the House.

The Intelligence it communicates fills us with Indignation and Horror, whilst it rouses in us a Spirit of determined Resolution and Energy.

We rely upon the Vigilance and Vigour of His Excellency's Government, which, we truft, will continue unabated, till the Conspiracy, which so fatally exists, be utterly dissolved. Sensible of the Danger which surrounds us, we are fully prepared to meet it under His Excellency's Auspices; and we feel assured that his successful Efforts in the Cause of our Sovereign and the Constitution will soon be crowned with universal Graitude, not only from the Loyal, who have stood their Ground with Firmness, but from the Deluded, who have been traitorously seduced.

To which the Lord Lieutenant returned the following Answer:

The Manner in which the House of Commons has expressed it's Approbation of my Conduct calls for Expressions, on my Part to which no Language I can use is equal. The Wisdom, the Firmness, and the Spirit which have been manifested, during the whole of the eventful Period, by the House of Commons, and the peculiar Promptitude, Alacrity, and Unanimity, which have been evinced, must tend, in the most effectual Manner, to crush Rebellion, and to save the State.

A Message to the same Effect having been sent by the Lord Lieutenant to the House of Lords, their Lordships voted the following Address, with similar Demonstrations of Unanimity and Zsal, and prefented it to His Excellency in the same Manner.

We cannot repress our indignant Emotions at those desperate Designs which have been communicated to us, nor sufficiently applaud the Vigilance and Vigour which are exerted to deseat them. With firm and collected Resolution we express a sull Confidence that His Excellency will proceed in His Measures with unrelaxed Effort; we engage to him our sull Support, strengthened by the increased Activity of the Loyal, and the Repentance of the Deluded. The well-directed Force of Government, cannot fail to extinguish the Conspiracy which differences the Kingdom; and His Excellency will soon reap the Fruits of his unremitting Attention to public Safety in the Approbation of His Sovereign, and in the Gratitude of the People.

To which His Excellency returned the following Answer:

Your Approbation of the Measures I have taken, so ardently, immediately, and unanimously conveyed, assord me the highest Gratification: You cannot doubt of my vigorous Perseverance in what you have approved; nor can I hesitate as to the speedy Success of those Efforts, which are so warmly seconded by the Energy of the Legislature, and by the loyal Spirit which is so conspicuously and generally displayed.
