of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's " Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in confe-" quence of the fame; for authorizing His Majelly 4 to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwife " of Por Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from aking or having on Board any of the faid Wood called Lignum-Vitæ, which may be necessary for the Use of the faid Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, nor to prevent the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum-Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the faid Wood called Lignum-Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Wood called Lignum-Vitæ to the Places for which it is fo entered Outwards, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the faid Wood called Lignum-Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards .- And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

By the KING, PROCLAMATION; For apprehending Robert Watson. GEORGE R.

HEREAS Robert Watson, late of Spa Fields, in the County of Middlesex, commonly called Doctor Watson, stands charged with Suspicion of High Treason; We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby requiring and commanding all Our loving Subjects to discover and apprehend the said Robert Watson, otherwise Doctor Watson (who is about Five Feet Three Inches high, Thirty-three Years of Age, grey Eyes, high Forehead, dark Hair, bald on the Top of the Head, very thin, of a fallow Complexion, marked with the Small Pox, looks old for his Time of Life, and is lame of the left Leg; was born at Elgin in North Britain, and speaks a strong Scottish Dialect, was convicted at the Old Bailey in November, One Thoufand feven hundred and ninety-four, of publishing a feditious Libel, and received Sentence of Imprison-ment for Two Years in Newgate), and to carry him before some of Our Justices of the Peace, or Chief Magistrates of the County, Town or Place where he shall be apprehended, wno are respectively required to fecure him, and thereof to give speedy Notice to Our Privy Council, or One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, to the End-he may be forthcoming, and may be dealt withal, and proceeded against according to Law: And whoever shall discover and apprehend the said Robert Watson, otherwise Doctor Watson, and bring him before such Justice of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate, or so discover him that he may be apprehended, thall receive a Re-ward of FOUR HUNDRED POUNDS; which faid Sum of Four Hundred Pounds the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly.

One Thousand eight hundred, and until the End of the then next Sellion of Parliament, and amend an Act made in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this W. Fawkener. Kingdom, or resident therein, in certain Cases.
