DISPATCHES, of which the following are Copies, have been received from His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland by His Grace the Duke of Portland, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department.

# Dublin Caffie, June 16, 1798.

My Lord,

Have the Honor to acquaint your Grace, that this Morning Advices were received from Major-General Nugent. By thefe it appears, that the Rebels, who had been defeated at Ballynahinch, have petitioned for Pardon, and offered to furrender up all their Arms and Ammunition: The Major-General, n Reply, promifed to accept their Submittion, on the Condition of their giving up their Leader, Munroe, and the other principal Traitors who had infligated them to their late wicked Practices; they were to furrender by Twelve o'Clock on the 15th; Munroe was, however, taken by General Nugent early on that Morning.

Major-General Nugent, alluding to the Affair at Ballynahinch, flates the Lofs of the Rebels to have exceeded 500 Men, and that many have been fince made Prifoners. The General particularly flates his Acknowledgements of the Services of Major-General Barber. He mentions, with great Satisfaction, the Conduct of Mr. Boyd, of Ballycaffle. Mr. M'Naghten had fent to warn him of his Danger, which induced him to retreat on Friday laft to Coleraine, where he collected the Dunfevenich and Giant's Caufeway Corps, with which, together with his own, he returned to Ballycaftle, and beat the Rebels out of the Place; and he is now proceeding to punish them, between that Town and Glenarm.

Captain Stewart, of the Glenarm Yeomaary, and Captain Mathews, of the Portaferry Yeomaary, have behaved uncommonly well, in repulsing large Bodies of Rebels who attacked them with great Fury.

General Nugent speaks generally of the Conduct of all the Yeomanry in his District in the warmest. Terms of Approbation, and mentions that he has thanked them all.

### Dublin Caftle, June 19, 1798. My Lord,

I Have the Honour to acquaint your Grace, that Accounts were this Day received from Brigadier General Barnett, flating, that on the 17th Inflant, a confiderable Body of Rebels attacked Kilbeggan, but were repulfed by a Detachment of Fifty of the Northumberland Fencibles, under the Command of Captain Thatcher; One hundred and Twenty of the Rebels were killed, and a great many wounded; the Detachment behaved with the greatett Gallantry.

Brigadier-General Grofe reports from Kilcock, that Colonel Irwine, with a Detachment under his Command, had this Day engaged a Body of above Two thousand Rebels at Oviditown Hill, about a Mile from Hortland. The Lofs of the Rebels was upwards of Two Hundred flain.

The Number of killed and wounded of His Majefly's Troops does not amount to more than Twenty-three. Enfign Sutter, of the Invernefs Fencibles was killed; Colonel Irwine was himfelf wounded flightly in the Cheek; Sir Richard Steele, of the 4th Dragoon Guards, was alfo wounded, but it is hoped not dangeroufly. Colonel Irwine reports to General Grofe, that he is highly indebted to all the Officers and Men who ferved under him, and that he was much benefitted by the Affiftance he received from Colonel Burrowes, who volunteered on the Occasion.

The Accounts received from the North are favourable, and ftate that the Rebels are differred in all Quarters.
