P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this instant June; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some

Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant June to the Thirtieth Day of August next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fourth Day of January last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twenty-fifth Day of this instant June: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twenty-fifth Day of this instant June, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles above mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt Petre, Arms and Ammunition,

" when

"when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles, for the Purposes of Trade, to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

A Dispatch, of which the following is a Copy, has been received from His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland by His Grace the Duke of Portland, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department.

Dublin Castle, June 21, 1798.

My Lord,

I Have the Honor to acquaint your Grace, that Brigadier-General Dunn has reported from Monasterevan, that on the 19th Instant he had sent a strong Patrol, under the Command of Captain Pack, of the 5th Dragoon Guards, towards Prosperous, from Rathangan, and that Captain Pack,

having fallen in with a Hundred of the Rebels, well mounted and appointed, he instantly attacked and defeated them, taking Eight Horses, and killing from Twenty to Thirty Men.

Lieutenant-Colonel Stewart, of the 5th Dragoons, having been detached to Prosperous on the Evening of the 19th Instant, found a Body of Rebels posted on a Hill on the Left of the Town, which fled into the neighbouring Bog on his Approach: His advanced Guard having been fired upon, as he approached, from the Town, he brought Two Curricule Guns to bear upon it, and set Fire to Part of the Town. Much Cattle was left behind by the Rebels, which they had piann'd up near the Mess Room of the Barracks; together with many Pikes and Drums. Eight of the Rebels were killed.

Yesterday Morning a Detachment from Mount Kennedy, under Command of Lieutenant M'Lann, of the Reay Fencibles, and Lieutenant Gore, of the Mount Kennedy Cavalry, attacked a Body of near 300 Rebels near Ballinacuth. The Fire commenced from the Rebels, who were posted behind a Hedge on the Top of a commanding Hill. After an Engagement of about Twenty Minutes, they gave Way in every Quarter, leaving 20 dead behind them.

It appears by Letters from Cork, that an Engagement has taken place between a Detachment of the Caithness Fencibles, assisted by a Party of the Westmeath Militia, and a considerable Body of Rebels. The latter were defeated with the Loss of above 100 Men. His Majesty's Troops appear to have suffered but little in the Action.

The North remains quiet.

Dublin Castle, June 20, 1798.

The Marquess Cornwallis, who embarked at Holyhead Yesterday at Two o'Clock on Board the Loftus Packet, arrived safe in this Harbour about Five o'Clock this Day. His Lordship, on his Arrival in Dublin, was received by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commons of the City of Dublin, and proceeded to the Castle, attended by a Squadron of Dragoons. Upon his Arrival there, at Six o'Clock, he was introduced in Form to His Excellency the Earl Camden, who received him sitting under the Canopy of State in the Presence Chamber, whence a Procession was made, in the usual State, to the Council Chamber.

The Council sitting, his Lordship's Commission was read, and the Oaths being administered to him, His Excellency was invested with the Collar of the Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, and received the Sword from the Earl Camden. His Excellency afterwards repaired to the Presence Chamber, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction upon his safe Arrival and taking upon him the Government of this Kingdom.

A Dispatch, of which the following is a Copy, has been received by the Right Honourable Henry Dundas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, from Brigadier-General the Honorable Thomas Maitland, commanding His Majesty's

jeſty's Forces in the Iſland of St. Domingo; dated on board His Maſteſty's Ship Thunderer, off Mole St. Nicolas, the 10th of May, 1798.

S I R,

I Embrace the very firſt Opportunity of informing you, that on the 22d of laſt Month I came to the Reſolution of immediately evacuating the Towns of Port au Prince and St. Marc's, with their Dependencies, together with the Pariſh of Arcachaye; and it is now with great Pleaſure I have the Honor of acquainting you, that this Meaſure has been carried into complete Effect without the ſmalleſt Loſs of any Kind, and in a Manner, I flatter myſelf, to give perfect Satisfaction, as far as, under the Circumſtances, it was poſſible, to all the French Inhabitants and Planters, whether theſe choſe to follow the Fortune of His Maſteſty's Arms, or to remain in the Part of the Colony about to be evacuated.

In conſidering the Modes of effecting this very difficult but important Object, there ſeemed to me but two in any Degree practicable; the one, to withdraw the ſmall Britiſh Force and ſuch of the Colonial Troops as it was immediately poſſible to induce to go with us, in a precipitate Manner, after blowing up the Forts; the other, to ſtate fairly my Determination, and, acting as Events occurred, to endeavour in a deliberate Way to withdraw the whole of our Stores and Force, and at the ſame Time to attempt to obtain ſome Terms for the numerous Inhabitants, who, either from Neceſſity or Choice, wiſhed to remain.

The Firſt of theſe Meaſures ſeemed to me (however ſafe to the Britiſh) to be ſo perfectly contrary to the ſpirit of Generoſity and Liberality which has ever actuated the Britiſh Nation, and to certain of being attended with immediate and ſhocking Scenes of Bloodſhed among the Inhabitants, whoſe natural Impetuouſity of character would be encreaſed by contending Paſſions, deluded Hopes, and different Interests, that I determined at once to ſet it aſide; and I began the 23d ultimo, in conſequence of adopting the ſecond, to embark the heavy Stores of every Deſcription; ſtating my full Determination to all the Parties concerned, and ſending at the ſame Time a Flag of Truce to General Touſſaint l'Ouverture, at Gonaives, to acquaint him with my Reſolution, and leaving to his Option, either to obtain the Poſſeſſions we evacuated in a ſtate of Ruin, or in a ſtate of perfect Order, provided he would guarantee, in a ſolemn Manner, the Lives and Properties of ſuch Perſons as choſe to remain.

General Touſſaint immediately agreed to the laſt Propoſition, and ſent to Port-au-Prince on the 28th inſtant a confidential Officer, who, having met Lieutenant-Colonel Nightingall, Deputy Adjutant-General, on my Part, on the 30th of April the accompanying Agreement was mutually exchanged and ratified by both Parties.

The Stipulation in favor of the Inhabitants and Planters afforded them the only Security in my Power to obtain, and with which they were ſo entirely ſatisfied, that although at firſt they had univerſally reſolved to follow the King's Forces, yet, upon hearing of this Agreement in their Favor, many of them who had actually embarked relanded, and I think I may ſafely aſſure you, there are not Ten rich Proprietors who have, ultimately, upon this Occaſion quitted their Properties.

By the 6th Inſtant the whole of the heavy Britiſh Stores of every Deſcription being embarked, and all the French Braſs Guns and Mortars, with ſuch of the Inhabitants as voluntarily wiſhed to go, and all the Merchandize belonging to Britiſh Merchants, I ordered the Pariſh of L'Arcachaye to be evacuated, which was accordingly done the 7th at Noon. The 8th, at Two o'Clock in the Morning, I withdrew the whole of the Force from Port-au-Prince, and embarked it at Fort Bizoton, and on the 9th in the Morning the whole Fleet ſailed to its different Deſtinations.

I have not heard from Colonel Grant, who commanded at St. Marc's, but I have every Reaſon to believe he evacuated that Place on the 6th or 7th of this Month, and I entertain no Doubt but that he is now at the Mole, where I ordered him to proceed with his Garriſon.

You will readily believe, that on ſuch an Occaſion much Military Precaution, and much Exertion in all the Departments muſt have been neceſſary, as well for the Honour and Security of His Maſteſty's Arms, as to enable me to move off within a reaſonable Period.

Of the Conduct of the Officers and Men of His Maſteſty's Britiſh and Colonial Forces, I have nothing to ſay, but what tends infinitely to their Credit.

To the Heads of Departments I feel myſelf extremely indebted for the Zeal and Activity with which they ſeconded my Wiſhes, moſt particularly to Lieutenants-Colonels Nightingall and Littlehales, Deputies Adjutant and Quarter-Maſter Generals, and to Captain Spicer, commanding the Royal Artillery; nor can I here omit doing myſelf the Pleaſure of ſignifying to you what very eſſential Aid I have received from the Zeal and Intelligence of Mr. Wigglesworth, His Maſteſty's Commiſſary General.

To the Royal Navy I am under every Obligation for their cordial Aſſiſtance throughout the whole of this Service; to Captains Couchet and Ogilvie of His Maſteſty's Ships Abergavenny and Thunderer, it is principally owing that I was enabled to carry my Wiſhes into early Effect.

Lieutenant Young, of the Navy, Chief Agent of Tranſports, conducted himſelf in the Execution of this arduous Taſk in ſuch a Manner that I ſhould neglect a very material, though pleaſant Part of my Duty, were I not to ſeize this Opportunity to recommend him in the ſtrongeſt Manner to your Notice. He is a very old Officer, but his Length of Services has neither impaired his Zeal, or diminiſhed his Activity.

THE Honourable Brigadier-General Maitland, commanding in Chief His Britannick Maſteſty's Forces in the Iſland of Saint Domingo, having intimated to General Touſſaint l'Ouverture, commanding the French Army in the ſaid Iſland, his Intention to evacuate the Towns of Port-au-Prince, St. Marc's, and their Dependencies, with the Pariſh of L'Arcachaye; and having propoſed to General Touſſaint l'Ouverture, to ſend a Perſon to Port-au-Prince, charged with full Powers, that this object might be effected in a Manner moſt conſonant to the Interests of Humanity and the Views of each Party; and General Touſſaint l'Ouverture, having conſented

consented to the above Proposals; and having sent to Port-au-Prince Monsieur Huin, Adjutant-General to the French Army, Lieutenant-Colonel Nightingall, Deputy Adjutant-General of His Majesty's Forces, and Monsieur Huin, Adjutant-General to the French Army, did meet on board His Majesty's Ship Abergavenny, the 30th April, 1798, when the following Conditions were mutually agreed on, and have been since ratified on the one Part by Brigadier-General Maitland, commanding in Chief His Majesty's Forces; and on the other by General Toussaint L'Ouverture, commanding the French Army.

CONDITIONS agreed upon between Lieutenant-Colonel Nightingall, Deputy Adjutant-General to His Britannic Majesty's Forces, and Monsieur Huin, Adjutant-General to the Army of General Toussaint L'Ouverture, who are respectively invested with full Powers for that Purpose.

1st. The Towns of Port-au-Prince, Saint Marc's and their Dependencies, with their present Works, and the Parish of L'Arcahaye, shall be left to General Toussaint L'Ouverture in the State agreed upon between us; viz. All the Iron Guns to be rendered unserviceable, except Three or Four, by verbal Agreement between us, in a given Time, which shall be fixed at the Period when the British Forces can conveniently be withdrawn.

2d. As an express Condition, and in Consequence of the first Article, General Toussaint L'Ouverture engages, in the most solemn and positive Manner, to guarantee the Lives and Properties of all the Inhabitants who may choose to remain.

3d. In order to facilitate and accomplish these Conditions, it is agreed that there shall be a Suspension of Arms for a limited Time, not exceeding Five Weeks from this Day.

Done on board His Majesty's Ship Abergavenny, in the Road of Port-au-Prince, this 30th Day of April, 1798.

S I R,

I Herewith enclose, for their Lordships Information, a Copy of a Letter which I have received from Captain Dickinson, Commander of His Majesty's Sloop Victorieuse, giving an Account of his having been attacked off Guadaloupe by Two French Privateers, One of which he captured, and the other escaped, from his not being able to pursue her without leaving his Convoy.

S I R, *Victorieuse, St. Kitt's, May 12, 1798.*

I Beg Leave to inform you, that on the 7th Instant, passing to Leeward of Guadaloupe in His Majesty's Sloop Victorieuse under my Command, with the Trade of Trinidad for St. Kitt's, we saw Two French Privateers to the Windward, who had the Temerity to bear down and attack us, with an Intention of carrying us by boarding. The one was a Schooner of 12 Guns and 80 Men, the other a Sloop of 6 Guns and 51 Men. The Sloop very shortly struck, being nearly sunk, and proves to be the Brutus, commanded by Citizen Roufel, belonging to Guadaloupe, ten Days out, and had not taken any Thing; had 4 killed and 4 wounded. The Schooner, I am sorry to say, got off, though extremely damaged, and lost many Men, owing to my not being able to chase far from the Convoy.

S I R,

I AM to acquaint you for the Information of their Lordships, that Captain Warren, in His Majesty's Sloop Scourge, on the 1st Instant, chased on Shore on Saint Martin's, a French Privateer Brig of Fourteen Guns.

The Crew, after setting Fire to her, got on shore, and she blew up before the Boats which were sent from the Scourge could get to her, and was consequently totally destroyed.

By the Matilda, Captain Misford, 29th and 31st of March, 1798, to the Northward of Antigua, La Vantour Sloop, of Ten Guns and Sixty-four Men; and L'Aigle Brig, of Twelve Guns and Eighty-six Men.

By L'Aimable and Scourge, Captains Lobb and Warren, 6th and 8th ultimo, off Porto Rico, La Triumph Brig, of Fourteen Guns and Eighty-eight Men; also Chasseur Schooner, of Two Guns and Eighteen Men; and on the 20th, by L'Aimable alone, L'Espeigle Schooner, of Two Guns and Eighteen Men; by the Requin, commanded by Lieutenant Sennhouse, the 1st Instant off St. Bartholomew's, Mutine Sloop, of Six Guns and Forty-four Men.

The King has been graciously pleased to give and grant unto the Right Honourable Adam Lord Viscount Duncan of Camperdown, Admiral of the Blue Squadron of His Majesty's Fleet, and Knight of the Russian Imperial Order of Saint Alexander Newsky, in Consideration of the great Zeal, Courage, and Perseverance uniformly manifested by him during the arduous Period in which he commanded the Fleet in the North Seas, and particularly of his able and gallant Conduct in the glorious and decisive Victory obtained over the Dutch Fleet on the 11th Day of October last, his Royal Licence and Authority, that he, and his Issue, may bear, as an honourable Augmentation, in the Centre of his Paternal Arms, a Representation of the Gold Medal conferred upon him by His Majesty upon Occasion of the said Victory, pendant from a blue and white Ribbon, ensigned with a naval Crown, and subscribed "Camperdown;" and that the same be first duly exemplified according

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brasses, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And, if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next

next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of

the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
