" when prohibited by Proelamation or Order in | having fallen in with a Hundred of the Rebels, well " Council." But it is, neverthelefs, His Majetty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be confirued to extend, to any of His Majetty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vestels or Boats, in the Service of His Majefly, or em-ployed or freighted by His Majefly's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majeily's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board fuch Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of fuch Ship or Veffel during the Courfe of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being ; nor to the Exportation of the faid feveral Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrifons, or to His Majelty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coait of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the Britifh Settlements or Factories in the East Indies ; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the faid Articles, for the Purpoles of Trade, to Ire-land, or to His Majefty's Yards or Garrifons, or to His Majefty's Colonics and Plantations in Ame-rica or the Weft Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majefty's Forts and Settle-ments on the Coaft of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of fuch Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the fame to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the fame shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, to carry the faid Articles to the Flaces for which they are fo entered Outwards, and for the Purpoles specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commisfioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majeily's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

My Lord, I Have the Honor to acquaint your Grace, that Brigadier-General Dunn has reported from Monafterevan, that on the 19th Instant he had fent a strong Patrole, under the Command of Captain

Lieutenant-Colonel Stewart, of the 5th Dragoons, having been detached to Prosperous on the Evening of the 19th Instant, found a Body of Rebels posted on a Hill on the Left of the Town, which fled intothe neighbouring Bog on his Approach : His advanced Guard having been fired upon, as he approached, from the Town, he brought Two Curricle Guns to bear upon it, and fet Fire to Part of the Town. Much Cattle was left behind by the Rebels, which they had pinn'd up near the Mefs Room of the Barracks; together with many Pikes and Drums. Eight of the Rebels were killed.

Yesterday Morning a Detachment from Mount Kennedy, under Command of Lieutenant M'Lann, of the Reay Fencibles, and Lieutenant Gore, of the Mount Kennedy Cavalry, attacked a Body of near 300 Rebels near Ballinarush. The Fire commenced from the Rebels, who were posted behind a Hedge on the Top of a commanding Hill. After an En-gagement of about Twenty Minutes, they gave Way in every Quarter, leaving 20 dead behind them.

It appears by Letters from Cork, that an En-gagement has taken place between a Detachment of the Caithnefs Fencibles, affifted by a Party of the Weftmeath Militia, and a confiderable Body of Rebels. The latter were defeated with the Lofs of above 100 Men. His Majesty's Troops appear to have fuffered but little in the Action.

The North remains quiet.

Dublin Caftle, June 20, 1798.

The Marquels Cornwallis, who embarked at Holyhead Yesterday at Two o'Clock on Board the Lostus Packet, arrived fafe in this Harbour about Five o'Clock this Day. His Lordfhip, on his Arrival in Dublin, was received by the Lord Mayor, Alder-men, Sheriffs, and Commons of the City of Dublin, and proceeded to the Castle, attended by a Squadron of Dragoons. Upon his Arrival there, at Six o'Clock, he was introduced in Form to His Excellency the Earl Camden, who received him fitting under the Canopy of State in the Prefence Chamber, whence a Procession was made, in the usual State, to the Council Chamber.

The Council fitting, his Lordship's Commission was read, and the Oaths being administered to him, His Excellency was invefted with the Collar of the Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, and received the Sword from the Earl Camden. His Excellencyafterwards repaired to the Prefence Chamber, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Perfons of Diffinction upon his fafe Arrival and taking upon him the Government of this Kingdom.
