For apprehending Beauchamp Bagnall Harvey, Efquire. GEORGE R.

7HEREAS Beauchamp Bagnall Harvey stands charged with open Acts of Treason and Rebellion, in commanding the Rebel Force in the County of Wexford in Ireland; We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to iffue this our Royal Proclamation, hereby requiring and commanding all our loving Subjects to discover and apprehend the said Beauchamp Bagnall Harvey (who is a thin Man, about Thirty-Five or Thirty-Six Years of Age, and is about Five Feet Six Inches high, and stoops a little, and is of a darkish Complexion, and has dark Eyes, and is marked with the Small Pox) and to carry him before some of Our Justices of the Peace, or Chief Magistrates of the County, Town, or Place where he shall be apprehended, who are respectively required to secure him, and thereof to give speedy Notice to our Privy Council, or one of our principal Secretaries of State, to the end he may be forthcoming, and may be dealt withal, and proceeded against according to Law. And whoever shall discover and apprehend the said Beauchamp Bagnall Harvey, and bring him before fuch Justice of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate, or so discover him that he may be apprehended, shall receive a Reward of One Thousand Pounds; which faid Sum of One Thousand Pounds, the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury, are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty Ninth Day of June, One Thouland Seven Hundred and Ninety Eight, in the Thirty-Lighth Year of Our Reign.

THEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for railing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforts and, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Ma-jesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this instant June; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the faid Bounties and

Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the faid Thirtieth Day of this instant june to the Thirty-first Day of August next inclusive: -Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fourth Day of January last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rofin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Mafts, Yards, Bowfprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Nava Stores, will expire upon the Twenty-fifth Day of this instant June: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twenty-fifth Day of this commence from the faid I wenty-fifth Day of this instant June, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Mass, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or spip or lade any of the Articles above mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty third Year of His Majelty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to ena-• ble His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exoportation of Ealt-Petre, Arms and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, por to prevent any Ship or Vessel. jesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of the China of Vessel and Carlot of the Use fuch Ship or Veffel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the faid feveral Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or

Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the laid Articles, for the Purposes of Trade, to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the fame to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

My Lora's, and Gentlemen

BY the Measures adopted during the present Sefunanimous Assurances which I received from you at its Commencement.

The Example of your Firmness and Constancy has been applauded and followed by My Subjects in every Rank and Condition of Life. A Spirit of voluntary and ardent Exertion, diffused through every Part of the Kingdom, has strengthened and confirmed Our internal Security; the same Sentiments have continued to animate My Troops of every Description, and My Fleets have met the Menaces of Invation, by blocking up Our Enemies in all their principal

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

The extensive and equitable Scheme of Contribution, by which so large a Proportion of our Expences will be defrayed within the Year, has defeated the Expectations of those who had vainly hoped to exhaust Our Means, and to destroy our Public Credit. You have been enabled to avail yourselves of farther Resources from a Commerce encreased in Extent and Vigour, notwithstanding the Difficulties of War, and have had the fingular Satisfaction of deriving at the same Moment, large additional Aid from individual Exertions of unexampled Zeal, Liberality, and Pa-

The Provision which has been made for the Redemption of the Land Tax has also established a System which, in its progressive Operation, may produce the happiest Consequences, by the Encrease of Our Refources, the Diminution of Our Debt, and the Support of Public Credit.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The Defigns of the Difaffected, carried on in Concert with Our invererate Enemies, have been unremittingly purfued, but have been happily and effectually counteracted in this Kingdom by the general Zeal and Loyalty of My Subjects.

In Ireland they have broken out into the most criminal Acts of open Rebellion. Every Effort has been employed on My Part to subdue this dangerous Spirit, which is equally hostile to the Interest and Safety of every Part of the British Empire. I cannot too firongly commend the unshaken Fidelity and Valour of My Regular, Fencible and Militia Troops in Ireland, and that determined Spirit with which My Yeomanry and Volunteer Forces of that Kingdom, have flood forward in the Defence of the Lives and Properties of their Fellow-Subjects, and in Support of the lawful Government.

The striking and honourable Proof of Alacrity

and Public Spirit, which so many of My Fencible and Militia Regiments in this Kingdom have manifested on this Occasion, has already received the ment.

This Conduct, personally so honourable to the Individuals, affords the strongest Pledge both of the Military Ardor which actuates this valuable Part of Our National Defence, and of their affectionate Concern for the Safety and Happiness of Ireland, which are essentially connected with the general Interests of the British Empire.

With the Advantage of this Support, and after the diffinguished and important Success which has recently attended the Operations of my Arms against the principal Force of the Rebels, I trust the Time is fast approaching, when those now seduced from their Allegiance will be brought to a just Sense of the Guilt they have incurred, and will entitle themselves to Forgiveness, and to that Protection which is My constant Wish to afford to every Class and Condition of My Subjects who manifest their Defire to pay a due Obedience to the Laws.

This temporary Interruption of Tranquillity, and all its attendant Calamities, must be attributed to those pernicious Principles which have been industriously propagated in that Country, and which, whereever they have prevailed, have never failed to pro-

duce the most disastrous Effects.

With fuch Warnings before Us, fensible of the Danger which We are called upon to repel, and of the Bleffings we have to preferve, let us continue firmly united in a determined Refistance to the Defigns of Our Enemies, and in the Defence of that Constitution which has been found, by Experience, to ensure to Us, in so eminent a Degree, Public Liberty, National Strength, and the Security and Comfort of all Classes of the Community.

It is only by Perseverance in this Line of Conduct that We can hope, under the Continuance of that Divine Protection which We have so abundantly experienced, to condust this arduous Contest to a happy Issue; and to maintain undiminished, the Security, Honour, and lasting Prosperity of the Country.

Kilkenny June 24, 1798. Nine o'Clock, P. M.

I HAVE the Honour to inform yeu, that early on the Morning of the 23d Instant, I received Information that the Rebels, amounting to several Thousands, had escaped from the County of Wexford, and formed a Camp at Killymount, and were proceeding to Gores Bridge. I instantly assembled all the Force I could collect, and marched towards them. I did not arrive in Time to prevent their deseating a Detachment at that Place, and taking 24 Men of the Wexford Militia Prisoners. They marched officially

rapidly towards Leighlin. The Troops from thence confifting of a small Party of the Ninth Dragoons, commanded by Lieutenant Higgins, Lieut. Colonel Rochfort's, and Captain Cornwall's Yeomanry, killed Sixty of them. Night coming on, I could not purfue them any further. By the Position they took up near Sharkill, I conceived their Intentions were to form a Junction with the Colliers at Castlecomer. As io. n as the Troops were able to move, I marched with Nine Hundred Men to attack them, and was forry to find, they had burnt the whole Town, and forced the Soldiers who were in it, to retire before my Arrival. Having cleared the Town with the Guns, I attacked them on all Sides. About Four Hundred were killed, the Remainder fled. They were commanded by a Pricit called Murphy, and their Numbers are faid to amount to 5000. Our Loss was inconsiderable. My Force consilled of the Wexford and Wicklow Militia, under the Command of Lord Loftus and the Honourable Col. Howard. The Dragoons were commanded by Major Donaldson of the Ninth Dragoons, and Major Barnard, of the Romney Fencibles, with feveral Yeomanry Corps from this County and Carlow, who, as well as the other Troops are entitled to my warmest Praise for their Bravery and Alertness, on this and every Occasion.

Dublin Castle, June 23, 1798.

This Day, at half past Three o'Clock, the Earl Camden, late Lord-Lieutenant of this Kingdom, left the Cattle, in order to embark on board His Majesty's Yacht, the Dorset, on his Return to England.

His Excellency Marquis Cornwallis; and the Earl Camden, proceeded on Horseback, attended by their respective Suits. They were escorted by numerous Bodies of Yeomen Cavalry, and attended by a great. Number of the Nobility and Persons of Distinction, the Lord-Mayor, Sheriffs, Aldermen and principal Citizens in their Carriages, followed by a Concourfe of People to the Water-lide. The Streets were lined by the Yeomen Infantry. Lord Camden received the strongest Demonstrations of Affection and Respect in passing through the Streets from the People, who testified their Regard by repeated Wishes for his Welfare and Happinels.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Sir Thomas Williams, Commander of His Majesty's Ship Endymim, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated off Wexford, the 22d of June, 1798.

I Beg to acquaint you, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty that, when cruizing at the Entrance of St. George's Connnel with the Squadron under my Command; I received Information on the 19th, that the King's T.oops were to commence their Attack on the Rebels at Wexford on the 20th or 21st. I immediately proceeded off that Harbour with the Ships named in the Margin*, and Five Cutters which I had collected, Lieutenant Carpenter, Sen. Lieutenant of the Endymion, was immediately dispatched in Command of the Cutters and Ship's Launches, manned and armed with Carronades in their Prows to blockade the inward Part of the Entrance of the Harbour, and to prevent the Escape of the Rebel armed Vessels, and others, of which they were in Possession, to the Amount of Forty or Fifty Sail. On the 21st I was joined by the Chapman and Weazle Sloops, which, being of light Draught of Water, anchored much nearer in than the Frigates could venture, and there by gave more effectual Protection to the Cutters and Launches destined to attack the Harbour and Fort as the entrance of it, which fired on them. On the Arrival

of Captain Keen, of the Chapman, I directed him to conduct the Operations of the Cutters and Launches, and endeavour to possifs himself of the Harbour and Fort, the Tides being fo low, and the Wind blowing out, that neither of the Sloops could get in The Launches proceeded to attack the Fort, of which they foon poileffed themselves, upwards of 200 of Rebels precipitately retreating from it, leaving behind them their Colours flying and Three Six-pounders. The Launches then immediately pro-ceeded up the Harbour; and, upon their Arrival at the Town, had the Happiness to find the King's Troops were just marching into it, they having eatirely defeated the Rebels in Two separate Attacks on the 20th and 21st, and who are now flying in all Directions, Two of their Generals, Hay and Roche, taken Prifoners.

As the Object of the Squadron remaining at Anchor here is now fully accomplished, it is my Intention to get to Sea to-morrow, if possible; and I am happy to be informed, since the Reduction of Wexthat the Appearance of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels off the Harbour, and the Measures purfued by them, has been attended with the happiest Confequences, and greatly contributed to check the further Progress of the horrible Massacres that have been committed in the Town of Wexford, difgrate-

ful to Humanity.

There being a Number of Boats and small Vessels along the Coast, belonging to the Rebels, which I conceived would be employed in facilitating the Escape of the Fugitives, I have ordered the Boats of the Squadron in, and destroyed about 100 of them; in tome, Piles were found concealed.

The Public Service has greatly benefited by the judicious Arrangements of Captain Keen and Lieutenant Carpenter, and by the Zeal and Activity manifested by them and the Officers and People employell in the different Ships, Boats and Launches under their Command, and otherwife.

HAVE the Honour of acquainting you, for their Lordships Information, that His Majesty's Ship, under my Command, arrived here this Morning, in Company with the Caroline French Privateer, and the Henry of Liverpool, her Prize. The above Ships were captured by the Phænix on the 31st Ult. in Lat. 49 Deg. 02 Min. N. Long. 15 Deg. 38 Min. W. The Caroline is a very handsome Ship, coppered, only Eight Months old, and fails exceedingly fast. She is pierced for Twenty Guns, carrying Twelves and Sixes, most of which were thrown overboard in Chace, and 105 Men, had been Ten Days from Nantz, without making any other Capture than the Henry, and a Danish Ship. The Henry is a valuable Ship, bound to Jamaica, and was captured by the above Privateer on the 3d Ult. on which Day we also sent in an American Ship, which had been taken fomé Days before.
