P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His

Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant August; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant August to the Thirty-first Day of October next inclusive:— Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The King has been graciously pleased to give and grant unto Richard Eaton, Clerk, Bachelor of Arts, Rector of Elsing, in the County of Norfolk, His Royal Licence and Authority that he may assume and take the Surname of Browne only, and also use and bear the Arms of Browne, in Compliance with the last Will and Testament of his Kinswoman Mary Greene, of Elsing aforesaid, Widow, deceased, Relict of Thomas Greene, of the said Place, Esquire, and Daughter and Heir of Thomas Browne, Esquire, formerly Lord of the Manor of Elsing aforesaid; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office; and also to order His Majesty's Concession and Declaration to be registered in the College of Arms.

Whitehall, August 18, 1798.

Whereas it hath been represented to His Majesty by the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that on Monday the 30th Ultimo, the Blenheim, Greenland Ship, belonging to the Port of Kingston-upon-Hull, William Mitchenson, Master, on her Arrival in Whitebooth Roads, refused to bring to on the Signal of His Majesty's Ship Nonsuch, and persisted in such Refusal notwithstanding several Shot were fired for the Purpose of enforcing Obedience; that being afterwards surrounded, on her Arrival at the Entrance of the Haven of the said Port, by several Boats from His Majesty's Ships Nonsuch, Nautilus, and Redoubt, (sent for the Purpose of boarding her,) the Crew of the said Greenland Ship, on One of the Boats coming alongside, fired several Shot into her, and violently threw several Spears, Capstern Bars, Handspikes, and other offensive Weapons, and also several large Iron Shot, at and among the Crew of the said Boat; in consequence whereof Richard Bell, Master's Mate, and William Burnock and John Sykes, Seamen, belonging to His Majesty's said Ship Nonsuch, were dangerously wounded, and others much bruised; and the Boats being by this outrageous Conduct repulsed, the Crew of the said Greenland Ship got on Shore and absconded; since which the said William Burnock and John Sykes, have died of the Wounds they received, and the Coroners Inquests have returned Verdicts of Wilful Murder against Persons unknown:

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Perpetrators of the atrocious Murders above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One or more of the Offenders (except such as actually gave the Mortal Strokes to the said Burnock and Sykes) who shall discover his or their Accomplices therein, so that they or any of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

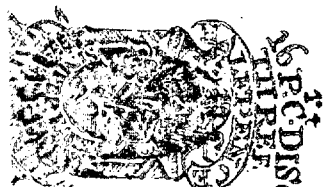
