e1, he abhorred and di owned all fuch practices, 'and humbly begged His Majelties pardon for what was path, proming to behave himfelf more dutifully, for the future. Which humble fubmiffion of the faid Lord *Shandois*, the King gracioufly accepting of, His Majel'y was pleafed at the fame time to affure him of His Favour, and that He did approve of him to go as His Ambaffador to Tarkey.

After which, His Majefly declaring, he refolved to use all means possible to find out the Author of this report, required all the Lords of the Council, and the Judges there prefent, to give an account, whether they had heard of any dif-courfes relating to the faid or any like matter; To which they all answered, they had heard of nothing concerning it but a flying and imperfect rumour of late discoursed of; one of the Lords of the Council only acquainted His Majefly, that a G ntleman had told him of fome particular difcourfe he had lately heard of that matter.

His Majefty thereup in commanded Mr. Secretary Fenkins to examine the faid Gentleman, or any other who should be named by him, in order to trace the faid falls report up to the first Author and Inventer of it.
