Majesty's Ship under my Command displayed the I utmost Degree of Zcal, Alacrity, and allant Spirit; Mr. Martin, (the First Lieutenant, an old and good Officer,) with Lieutenants Price, Ellison, and Hole, of the Marines, conducted themselves much to my Satisfaction, and I experienced very great Affiftance from the fleady good Conduct of Mr. Emory, the Master.

As a very heavy Gale of Wind came on immediately after our boarding La Resolue, the Second Lieutenant, Mr. John Price, with Twenty-one Men, were all that could be thrown on board of her, with the Loss of our Two Cutters. That Officer deferves very great Credit for his active Exertion in clearing her of the Wreck of her Masts and Rigging, and in keeping Company in so violent a Storm; as our Object was to disable our Antagonist before her Consort could affist her. La Resolue had only Ten Men killed, and a great Number wounded; but I La Resolue had only Ten am inexpressibly happy to add, that in the Action of the 12th, we had only One Man wounded; and the Affair of the 13th did not deprive their Country of the Services of a fingle Man of the brave Crew of the Melampus.
