THIS Day the Right Honorable Sir William Scott, Knight, Judge of the High Court of Admiralty of England, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Second of May last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes (except as in the said Order is mentioned) will expire upon the Seventh Day of November next; and whereas it is judged expedient, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Seventh Day of November next, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Ma-

jefty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto;" but it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America, or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that upon the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man; or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East-Indies, the Exporters of the said Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made; and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which

they were entered outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by his Order in Council of the 28th of last Month, to direct, that all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, then arrived, or that should thereafter arrive, in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Philadelphia, or any Port within the State of Pennsylvania, should make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days, to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Vessel should come to Anchor in the Place appointed for the Performance of Quarantine, and not before; and should strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules and Regulations thereby required to be observed: And whereas His Majesty has received Information, that the malignant and infectious Disorder, of the Nature of the Plague, which exists in the City of Philadelphia, hath extended itself to the Port of Boston and New York; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth thereupon order, That the Quarantine, at present subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from Philadelphia, be extended to all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes coming from Boston and New York, or from any of the Ports within the Provinces of Massachusetts Bay and New York: And His Majesty, with the Advice aforesaid, doth hereby further order, require, and command, that all Ships and Vessels whatsoever coming from Boston or New York, or from any of the Ports within the Provinces of Massachusetts Bay and New York, and all Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, on board the same, that are already arrived, or shall hereafter arrive, in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guern-

sey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days, and do strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules and Regulations now in Force, and required to be observed by Ships and Vessels subject to Quarantine: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General, and the Rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant October; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of

His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for the Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant October to the Thirty-first Day of December next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fifth Day of April last, prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom of any Sort of Rock Salt, will expire upon the Twenty-ninth Day of this instant October: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twenty-ninth Day of this instant October, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or load or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of His Majesty in Council respecting the Exportation of Rock Salt, for preventing Suits in consequence of the same, for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Rock Salt, and for making further Provisions relative thereto:" His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, that nothing herein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carried Coastwise, under the usual Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions, nor the Exportation of the same to Ireland, or to any other of His Majesty's Dominions, under the usual Conditions and Regulations, and upon Security being given by the Exporter, and two other Persons, (of whom the Master of the Vessel shall be one,) by Bond, in such Penalty as shall be directed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the said Rock Salt shall be exported to some Port or Place in His Majesty's Dominions, and none other, and that a Certificate shall be produced, within Six Months from the Date of the Bond, if such Rock Salt shall be entered out for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe; and within Twelve Months, if for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in America or the West Indies; and within Eighteen Months, if for any of the British Settlements or Factories in Asia or Africa, under the Hand of the Principal Officer of the Customs at the Port or Place where such Rock Salt shall be so landed; and if there shall be no Officer of the Custom

toms, then under the Hand of the Chief Magistrate of the Place, testifying that the said Rock Salt has been duly landed at the Port or Place for which the same was entered out.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Thomas Wolley, Commander of His Majesty's Ship Arethusa, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated off Havre the 24th Ultimo.

S I R,

I Have to acquaint you, for the Information of their Lordships, that on the 21st of this Month, His Majesty's Ship Arethusa under my Command, drove on Shore a Lugger Privateer on the Rocks of Cape La Hogue, (where she bilged and upset,) mounting, as we suppose, about Six Guns, carrying Forty Men, and retook a Sloop her Prize. We had one Man wounded by Musquetry from the Shore. The Eurydice had chased her from Guernsey, where she had taken the Sloop, and joined us in the Evening.
