A PROCLAMATION,
For a General Thanksgiving.

GEORGE R.

WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the indispensable Duty which We owe to Almighty God for the recent and signal Interposition of His good Providence, in Addition to the manifold and inestimable Benefits which these Kingdoms had already received at His Hands, manifested by the Blessing bestowed on Our Arms in the late memorable Battle, fought in distant Seas, as well as by the Deliverance of Our Dominions from Invasion and from intestine Commotions, through the Energy and Valour of Our Naval and Military Forces, and the Loyalty and Courage of Our faithful Subjects, which, exerted in a righteous Cause, it has pleased the Divine Goodness to crown with Success, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding that a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these His Mercies, be observed throughout England, Wales, and the Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Thursday the Twenty-ninth Day of November next: And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to the Occasion, to be used in all Churches and Chapels, and other Places of Publick Worship, and to take Care for the timely dispersing of the same throughout their respective Dioceses; and We do strictly charge and command, that the said Publick Day of Thanksgiving be religiously observed by all Our loving Subjects, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and upon Pain of suffering such Punishment as we may justly inflict upon all such who shall condemn or neglect the same.

For a Publick Thanksgiving.

WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the indispensable Duty which We owe to Almighty God for the recent and signal Interposition of His good Providence, in Addition to the manifold and inestimable Benefits which these Kingdoms had already received at His Hands, manifested by the Blessing bestowed on Our Arms in the late memorable Battle, fought in distant Seas, as well as by the Deliverance of Our Dominions from Invasion, and from intestine Commotions, through the Energy and Valour of Our Naval and Military Forces, and the Loyalty and Courage of Our faithful Subjects, which, exerted in a righteous Cause, it has pleased the Divine Goodness to crown with Success, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding, that a Publick Thanksgiving to Almighty God for these His Mercies, be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, called Scotland, upon Thursday the Twenty-ninth Day of November next: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said Publick Thanksgiving be reverently and decently observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, on the said Twenty-ninth Day of November next, as they tender the Favor of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as condemn or neglect the Performance of so religious a Duty; Our Will and Pleasure is therefore, and We charge, that, this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there in Our Name and Authority make Publication thereof, that none pretend Ignorance. And Our Will and Pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerk, whom We ordain to see the same published;

and We appoint them to send Copies thereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds; that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above mentioned, the same may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

GOD save the KING.

Dublin-Castle, November 6, 1798.

SUNDAY last being the Anniversary of the Birth of the late King William the Third, of Glorious Memory, in the Morning the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower; at Noon there was a splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction at the Castle, to compliment His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant; after which His Excellency, attended by the Nobility and Gentry, and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, went in Procession round the Statue of King William. On His Excellency's Return to the Castle the Great Guns at the Salute-Battery, in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, were fired Three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in College-Green. And at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Demonstrations of Joy.

Naples, September 25, 1798.

His Majesty's Ships the Culloden, Captain Trow-
bridge, the Alexander, Captain Ball, and the Fri-
gate Bonne Citoyenne, came into this Port on the
18th Instant in the Evening. His Sicilian Majesty
went out in his Boat into the Bay to meet them, as
did numerous English and Neapolitan Boats. The
Ships gave the Royal Salute to His Majesty.—Ad-
miral Sir Horatio Nelson, in the Vanguard, accom-
panied by the Thalia Frigate, did not make his Ap-
pearance in this Bay until Saturday last the 22d In-
stant, having been becalmed off Sicily.

The King of Naples not only went off to meet the
Admiral, but instantly went on board the Vanguard,
and staid on board until that Vessel was at Anchor in
the Port. The Royal Salute was given by all the
King's Ships, both on His Sicilian Majesty's Ar-
rival on board the Vanguard, and on his leaving the
Ship. The Day being remarkably fine, numerous
Boats with Colours and Music attended the Van-
guard, and all the Shores and Wharfs of Naples
were crowded with a Multitude of rejoicing People;
and when the Admiral came on Shore, the Recep-
tion the Neapolitans gave him was expressive of the
utmost Kindness and Gratitude.

Naples, September 28, 1798.

Every Assistance has been given to the Vanguard,
the Culloden, and Alexander, so that these Ships
will be fit to go again to Sea in a few Days. Yest-
terday His Majesty's Ship Colossus, Captain Mur-
ray, with Four Victuallers, from Gibraltar, came to
an Anchor in this Port.

This Morning Sir Horatio Nelson has received a
Letter from Sir James Saumarez, dated from the
Port of Augusta in Sicily, the 17th Instant, report-
ing all well in the Squadron under his Command,
and that he hoped, having got Water and fresh Pro-
visions, to sail from thence for Gibraltar the Wed-
nesday following.

September 29, 1798.

Captain Gage, in the Terpsichore, arrived here this
Morning. He left Malta the 26th Instant, when
Sir James Saumarez with his Squadron, in Conjun-
ction with the Portuguese Squadron under the Com-
mand of Marquis Nizza, had summoned the French
to surrender and evacuate Malta, which was refused
by M. Vaubois, the Commander in Chief of the
Valette; and that Sir James Saumarez was proceed-
ing with his Squadron and French Prizes to Gibrat-
tar, having left the Portuguese to block Malta, and
having, at the Request of the Maltese Insurgents,
supplied them with a large Quantity of Ammuni-
tion, and Twelve Hundred Stand of Arms from his
French Prizes. The Maltese say, that the French
are in the greatest Want at Valetta.

Vienna, October 27, 1798.

Intelligence was received on Thursday Afternoon,
from General Bellegarde, of the Austrians having,
at the formal Request of the Grisons' Government,
taken Possession of Coire and the important Post of
Richenau, and of Detachments being on their
March to occupy the Rest of the Country.
