Tangier, March 28.

SIR *Richard Munden* coming some days since from the Eastward, drove back out of the *Sreights* a Turks Man of War, bound home, and the *Adventure* and *Bristol* having met with the said Turk, are now in Chase of him, and are come up so close with him, that we doubt not but they will either take or Strand him.

Genova, April 24. The 17th Instant the *Britannia*, *Richard Lestocke*, and the *Fames* and *Elizabeth*, *Thomas Barker*, arrived here from *Legborne*, bound for *London*; The same day the *Kent*, *Lester Saunders*, returned hither from *Oneglia*, as did next day the *Society*, *Robert Nicholas*, and all four intend to Sail with this States Convoy for *Spain*, which may be in few days. The Captains here have Orders to fill their Companies with all diligence, and *Signior Grimaldo* has orders to hasten his departure for *France*, whither he goes in quality of Envoy Extraordinary. The Senate is likewise sending an Envoy to *Spain*.

Prague, April 24. The Regiment of Foot of *Servini*, and five Troops of Horse are it's said marching with all diligence towards *Italy*, being designed to be put, with other Troops that are to be sent from *Milan*, into *Casal*, to prevent the designs which it's still believed here the French have upon that important place. The Bores that were got together are dispersed: some have been taken and executed, and others upon their Submission have obtained the Emperors Pardon.

Strasburg, April 29. There are daily 4000 men at work on the Fortifications which the French are making at *Saar Louis*, and so soon as they are finished, the Garrison that is now in *Waldersfangen*, will be removed thither, and this last place will be Demolished. People still talk of the designs of *France*, and that we shall suddenly see a considerable Army in these parts, but with so much uncertainty that no account can be made thereof. The new Established Chamber at *Meiz*, makes the Princes that are summoned to appear there, very uneasy, for that they know not what resolution to take, whether to submit to the decrees of the said Chamber, or to trust to the protection of the Empire.

Cologne, April 30. The *Brandenburg* Minister at the Dyet at *Ratisbonne* continues with great earnestness to press the States of the Empire to consider of some way to recompence the Elector for the great losses his Countreys sustained, and the vast expences he was at during the late War, which he entred into for their sakes, carried on with so great success, and was obliged to end with so much disadvantage to himself. But this is a matter the Dyet is not very forward to enter upon, believing that if the Elector of *Brandenburg* should receive any satisfaction in this pretention, there are other Princes of the Empire who would make a like claim

of reparation for what they have suffered in that War. Count *Munsfeldt*, the Emperors Envoy to the French King, has been two days at *Munick*, from whence he intended to continue his Journey on the 22 instant to *Ratisbonne*, and from thence to *France*.

Berlin, April 27. Wednesday last being appointed for Sir *Robert Southwell* to have his Audience of the Elector, about Six in the Morning a Gentleman came hither with a Coach and six Horses to carry him to *Postdam*: Being arrived there, he was met by the Elector's first Chamberlin, who was sent with two other Coaches with six Horses apiece, to conduct him to his Audience. At the Palace Sir *Robert* was received by the Mareschal, accompanied with a great many Gentlemen, and by him conducted to the Room where his Electoral Highness was, who came towards the dore to receive him: The first Compliments being over, Sir *Robert* acquainted the Elector with the Subject of his Errand, which he heard with much satisfaction, and told Sir *Robert*, That he would appoint Commissioners to Treat with him thereupon. Then Sir *Robert* had his Audiences of the Electress, and the Electoral Prince, and afterwards was invited by the Elector to Dinner, and in the Evening returned hither in the Electors Coach.

Berlin, May 1. The 26th past Sir *Robert Southwell* had his first Conference with the Baron *Swithin* and the *Sieur Minders*, the Commissioners appointed by the Elector to Treat with him, whom he acquainted with the close Engagements that are between the King his Master and the States General of the *United Provinces*, and the good effects they have had, and that His Majesty, in the great Care and concern he had for the preserving the Peace of *Christendom*, had thought nothing could conduce more to it then a strict League between His Majesty and the Elector, and that His Majesty had sent on the like Errand to other Princes of *Germany*. The Commissioners received this Overture with much respect, declared the high value and esteem the Elector had for His Majesties Friendship and Alliance, and promised a speedy and (as they doubted not) a satisfactory Answer to it. The Elector is very intent upon some Naval Preparations he is making: he has at present at 25000 men in His Service, of which he can draw, when he pleases, 15000 into the Field, the rest being sufficient to Man his Garisons.

Hamburg, April 30. Great Preparations are making at *Copenhagen* for the Divertisement of the Princess of *Denmark* before she leaves that Court. On the 3 of the next month the Swedish Ambassador is to have his Audience of leave of the King, and on the 6th the Princess will begin her Journey to *Schonen*. On the Tenth of *May* the King of *Denmark* parts from *Copenhagen* towards these Parts, to give Order as is said, for the making some new Fortifications in the Country of *O. denburg*,

Oldenburg. The Elector of *Saxony* is perfectly recovered, and on the 26th Instant gave Audience to Monsieur *Ruffeau* the French Minister. Count *Berka* is on his way from *Prague* to the Court of *Denmark*, and Prince *Herman* of *Baden* is likewise coming from thence to several Princes of our Neighborhood.

Brussels, May 3. Yesterday arrived our Spanish Ordinary, and brought an account of the Kings having made seven new Counsellors of State, of which our Governor, the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* is one: The other six are the Marquis de *los Veles*, Viceroy of *Naples*, the Inquisitor General, *Don Melchior de Navarra* (who was disgraced in *Don Juans* time) the Duke of *Albuquerque*, the Conde d'*Oropesa*, and the Marquis of *Mancera*; and that several of those that had been most in *Don Juans* Interests were removed from Court, and among them the President of *Castile*.

Brussels, May 7. The King of *Spain* has finally declared his resolution of conferring the Government of these Countreys upon the Duke of *Fuliers*, which that Prince has accepted of, and sent the King his Letters of thanks, to the great satisfaction of all people here, because of the union and good correspondence this will beget between these Provinces and the Princes of *Germany*.

Hague, May 7. The States of *Holland* have not as yet been able to come to a Resolution in the matter of the Moneys, The Prince of *Orange* intends suddenly for *Breda*, to see how the new Fortifications that are making there advance.

Paris, May 8. On Monday last the Dauphiness appeared in this City for the first time, the Queen brought her hither, and shewed her what was most worthy to be seen, and in the Evening they walked in the *Tuilleries*, which drew thither a great Concourse of Persons of quality. It is said that the Chamber of Poysons is now going to take in hand the affair of the Duke of *Luxemburg*, and that when that is finished the said Chamber will be dissolved.

Exeter, April 22. These Parts are in great Peace and Quiet: The Papiſts are strictly enquired after in order to their being Proceeded against according to Law; and there is so great an Union amongst the Gentry of this County, that they have unanimously declared, They are resolved to live and dye in the Defence of His Majesty and his Lawful Heirs and Successors, and the Religion Established in the Church of *England*, against all Opposers whatsoever.

Whitehall, April 30. His Majesty has thought fit to constitute Sir *Job Charleton* Kt. one of the Judges of the Common-Pleas (from whence Mr. Justice *Raymond* is gone up to the Kings-Bench) by whose removal the place of Chief Justice, and one of His Majesties Council at *Ludlow*, for the Marches of *Wales*, being become void, the King has conferred the same upon Sir *George Jeffreys* Kt. Recorder of the City of *London*.

The two persons that were apprehended the 28 Instant in *Westminster-hall* upon suspicion of their being concerned in the attempt made upon Mr. *Arnold*, having been seen by him, he declared that

he did not suspect them of the Fact, and no Proof coming in against them, they had been discharged; but appearing to be Papiſts who have presumed to stay in Town contrary to His Majesties late Proclamations, they are to continue in Prison till they have satisfied the Law.

Whitehall, May 1. Yesterday the King and the Duke returned hither from *Newmarket*. In the Afternoon Colonel *Mansel* and several other persons were examined before His Majesty in Council. And His Majesty was pleased to direct, That the Committee of Examinations should in his absence proceed in the farther Examination of them as they shall see cause.

At night the King and the Duke, attended with several of the Nobility, went into the City to *Skinner-Hall*, where they did Sir *Jonathan Raymond*, one of the Sheriffs, the honour to Sup with him, and returned hither extremely satisfied with their Entertainment, which was very noble and in all particulars suitable to the occasion. And this morning His Majesty went to *Windsor*.
