She is the Success of Cherbourg, Nicholas Dubois, Master, with Four Guns and Twenty-four Men: Had been out Four Days without making any Capture. I beg Leave to add, that the Hastings Men came forward on the Occasion with the greatest Zeal and Readiness.
